YOUTH CLUBS:

The Ambulance Division has had to go into recess on account of Staffing, and the formation of another club.

The Scout Troop has flourished, thanks to the interest taken by a Staff Scout Committee, and the quality of boy-leadership in the Troop.

A Boys' Brigade Company has been formed under the leadership of Mr. A. Vivian, assisted by Mr. D. Hallum.

Dancing classes have been given to fifty senior boys again this

year — by the Dorice Dower School of Dancing, Auckland.

The Billy Graham Crusade meetings held in Auckland at Easter time were well attended by the boys of the College. Many inquiries were made, and it is felt that generally much good was done.

EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS:

The first part of the *new driveway* has been formed. It runs from the main road, along the northern side of the Sports Field to its eastern corner. Authority has now been given to continue its formation past the Orchard and fowl-runs to the main drive leading to the Dairy.

All the trees along the northern side of the Sports Field have been felled, and some of these are to be milled for College purposes.

The Farm Manager's house was completed last May. This

brings the number of residences at the College to eleven.

Approval has been given to the making of an *Arts and Crafts room* by the Workshops. This will make it possible to extend our work to include pottery-making, modelling, as well as painting, carving, lino-cutting, etc..

Plans are being considered for the building of a new *poultry* house on the site of the present ones.

The Board is giving attention at present to the next stage in our Extension programme. It is possible that this will include the erection of *extra class-rooms*, thus relieving other rooms for *recreation* and *library* purposes.

MAKING THE COLLEGE BETTER KNOWN:

In an endeavour to let more people know that the Methodist Church has a boys' Boarding School, and that it is a School of which they might well be proud, we this year went further afield than we have been before.

In another part of this Magazine there is an account of the Tour around the North Island, in which fifty-two boys with Staff

presented Concerts and took Services in many places.

Then in the August Holidays, the Principal and Mrs. Marshall travelled two thousand miles by car to bring the College to the South Island. Twenty groups of people were addressed. These included two Synods, (North and South Canterbury); showing coloured slides of the College in ten places (Dunsandel, Willowby, Geraldine, Temuka, Timaru, Waimate, Oamaru, North Beach New Brighton, Bryndwyr, and the public meeting of North Canterbury Synod); Conducting Church Services (Durham Street, Dunsandel, Ashburton, Woodlands Street, Timaru, Rangiora, Bryndwyr).

The reception given to the College parties was very warm. The boys undoubtedly benefitted greatly, and the whole venture from a College point of view has been an unqualified success.

THE Tour

That is what has been on the lips of most boys in the school for many months—ever since in fact it was known that this year the boys were going to have one. **THE** Tour!

At a quarter to one on Thursday, July 9, 52 happy, singing boys left the College by chartered bus. The weather was unkind, and the prospects were dim for a comfortable trip; but that did not stop the boys from giving three cheers for the College as they passed the Office.

The party consisted of choir boys, non-choir boys taking part in the plays, and the adults: The Principal and Mrs. Marshall, Miss F. Stark, Mr. E. A. Crane, Mr. M. B. Knott, and Mr. J. Shaw the driver.

The trip extended through from Thursday to Tuesday, July 14. Over 600 miles were covered. There were good attendances at all places, and the hospitality everywhere was excellent. Mr. Marshall had made all arrangements beforehand, so that when we arrived at a town where we were to stay, we found the Methodist Minister waiting for us, with a list of billets in his hand, and most of the people there with their cars. We were taken to our homes, given a meal and made to feel very much one of the family, then taken to the Hall where we were to put on the Concert. After it was all over, we were taken back for supper, and according to reports, more often than not found we had a hot-water bottle for

We put on the Concert that night to a full hall again, and felt that the kindly remarks of the Minister, Rev. G. Goodman, made a fine climax to the Tour. On Tuesday we set off for home, 300 miles through Taihape, Taupo, and Hamilton. The mountains were beautiful. We made an unscheduled stop on the Desert Road, so that the boys might feel snow, and have a fight in it if they

liked. They liked.

The first of the Tourists arrived back at 8.0 p.m., the main force coming in about half an hour later.

It was a memorable trip. We owe thanks to many people—to all the Ministers of the Churches concerned, to the hosts and hostesses, and to other helpers in each place. We are grateful to those of our own number who did so much—to Miss Stark who produced the plays, and accompanied on the piano; to Mrs. Marshall who assisted with wardrobe; to the ladies who helped with costumes before we took to the road; to Mr. Laurie for his training of the choir; to Mr. Knott and Mr. Crane for their care of us on the trip; and to Mr. Marshall who arranged it all, and was responsible for our well-being throughout.

A happy and successful tour such as this we shall not forget, and it is hoped that it will not be too long before we shall find



SPORT IN THE COLLEGE

Sport provides the main out-of-class interest for the boys of Wesley College. In Summer a walk round the College would reveal boys endlessly hitting tennis balls against the brick walls of the shelter-shed, playing table-tennis in the basement, smashing shuttlecocks over the net in the hall, playing tennis on the three courts, running round the softball diamond, or practising cricket at the nets. In Winter marbles has an irresistible appeal from the youngest even to the Sixth Formers, and table tennis continues unabated; but the main attraction is the excitement of pitting scrum against scrum and of eluding opponents to carry the ball over the line in the grand game of rugby.

In order to provide the continual competition that sport requires there are two organisations: inter-House sport and inter-School sport.

Inter-House Sport and the Winstone Cup:

To stimulate interest in inter-House sport, Mr. G. Winstone many years ago donated a cup. Throughout the year School and Simmonds House compete for this Winstone Cup by playing nine rugby and nine cricket games (three in each of the three grades); tennis, table tennis, softball games in three grades; and points are allotted to competitors in the athletics, and swimming sports and the cross-country race for inter-House competition. As badminton is a new game it is not played as yet on an inter-House basis. Also to encourage entrants into our speech and debating contest, points are gained for their respective Houses by the winners.

Inter-School Sport and the S.A.S.S.S.A.

Most of our inter-school sport—cricket, rugby, swimming, tennis, athletics, cross-country, and table tennis—is organised by the South Auckland Secondary Schools' Sports Association. In this competition we play against Papakura, Pukekohe, and Papatoetoe High School; Waiuku, Onewhere and Maramarua District High Schools, St. Stephens School.

Our First XI however, is in a competition organised by the Franklin Cricket Association. Both of these associations make continual use of our three rugby and two cricket grounds, and often the inter-school athletics sports are held on our grounds.

In addition we have a number of sporting commitments outside the Franklin area. Various rugby teams play against Huntly College, and our First XV plays against Ardmore Teachers' College 2nd XV, Port Albert, and Trinity College, while our First XI plays against Henderson High School.

In order to organize and control all this activity coaching, refereeing, and umpiring must be provided, gear has to be looked after, boys have to be transported all over the place, and records have to be kept. Our thanks are due to the following coaches for the arduous and faithful service they have given throughout the year.

RUGBY, 1959

FIRST XV:

Our First XV has had a very successful and enjoyable year, and the enthusiasm of the boys to represent the school in the "Firsts" has at times embarrassed the selector. The success of the team was largely due to the forceful running of the outside backs, as it was their dash, combined with the spectacular penetration of the first five-eighth that gave the team 30 of the 41 tries scored.

The backs were largely successful because of the excellent service given to them from the half-back, M. Bennett who passed accurately and ran very elusively. D. Cocker, at first five-eight was a good link with the outside backs and his quickness to see an opening earned him 8 tries. Pihama, the second five-eight was top scorer of the team scoring 45 points, 39 of them with his boot. D. Tupou, centre, was a very able captain, and with his deceptive swerve was able to score 8 tries. Vuibau, on the left wing, ran fearlessly, scoring 8 tries: the occasion when he broke through two tackles on his own 25 and ran 75 yards to score against St. Stephen's 1st XV must surely be the classic try of the school's history. Te Kuru played well on the right wing, and Thompson at full back saved many a try by his superb tackling.

The forwards played well in the lineouts, though they still have not gained the art of quick, co-ordinated scrumming. C. Cocker was a tower of strength as a leader and as hooker. He was well supported in the front row by B. Passau and Taylor. Moon, Cameron, and Tonga,

locks, gave good service in the lineouts and scrums, Moon making some determined bursts with the ball. The team was well served with its breakaways, Hosking, Walford, and G. Smith, Hosking particularly



being on hand to carry on some fine attacking movements and score three tries. Ward always played a vigorous game as No. 8, tireless not only on attack but also often upsetting the opposing backs with his cover-defence.

In the inter-school games College lost only two games. The first game against Pukekohe High School was lost narrowly by 6-5, but the second was won convincingly by 16-3. Both games against Papakura High School were won 6-0, and 11-8; and there were two victories against St. Stephens 2nd XV 9-3, and 34-6. For the first time Thames High School visited the College, and an enjoyable game ended in victory for the College 19-13.

The most exciting match of the year was against St. Stephens 1st XV when College almost succeeded in breaking the unbeaten record of St. Stephens by losing only 6-3 after a very evenly fought game.

College defeated Old Boys by the convincing score of 28-3; and also retained the Port Albert Shield by defeating Port Albert 19-6 and 11-10.

Actually the team seemed to play its most inspiring football when it was being beaten. This was particularly so against St. Stephens; against Port Albert when College was losing 10-0 until about 20 minutes before the end of the game when it piled on 11 points; and against the two Restricted Junior teams of Papakura (lost 11-0) and Ardmore Teachers' College 2nd XV (lost 12-6). It was not true, however, when a weekend 1st XV lost to Trinity College 19-16.

In addition to our internal Athletics Sports our athletes have taken part in three athletic activities outside the College.

I. The Franklin Athletic Club: Near the end of last year, through the good offices of Mr. Pearsall of Pukekohe, we were permitted to enter into the Junior Section of the Franklin Athletic Club. So keen was this Club to sponsor athletics that each Thursday evening two or three members of the Club, particularly Mr. Neville Harris, and Mr. J. Montgomery, would come out to the College and coach the boys in all branches of athletics.

Each Monday night a truckload of boys would travel into Pukekohe and throughout the season competed in both the Points and Championship competitions of the Club. At the conclusion of the season the following boys were awarded prizes or certificates for winning these events:—

12 years and under: W. Pearsall—1st in 100 yards (Points).

Four boys from the College were chosen to represent the Puke-kohe Athletics Club in Inter-Club Competition. They were P. Hansen, R. Thompson, M. Ward, and J. Cameron. The boys all ran well but owing to the better ability and more experience of the other runners, only Cameron was able to gain two thirds in the 100 yards and long jump.

These were held at Pukekohe on October 3rd. Of the six schools competing in the Junior race of two and a quarter miles, Wesley came fifth. M. Passau, after leading the field for two-thirds of the race, finished up 10th of the 36 runners.

Of the five schools competing in the Intermediate race, Wesley came 4th. Hosking and Helms performed creditably, coming 8th and 10th respectively. Walford was the best of our Senior runners, coming 8th in a field of 24, over a course of three and a quarter miles.

THE FARM

This year has seen the first stage of development of a new farm entrance. With the growth of the College some concern was felt at the amount of heavy traffic using the main entrance. Some anxiety had been felt regarding the danger to pupils, as well as interference with the College functions, and the dust nuisance.

The proposal to bring in an entirely new entrance for farm use, and the decision as to its point of entry from the main road, was governed by the access it gives for future housing of College staff and the improvement it gives at one end of the Sports Field providing a better merging of actual ground with the farm.

The farm this year has not been without its periods of set backs, leavened by periods which give cause for satisfaction. Difficulties should never be regarded as discouraging, as this is something common to life, but rather as something to be overcome. After all it is by facing our problems, and overcoming them that we are given a greater cause for satisfaction.

Continuing a policy of improvement in our farm machinery and equipment, we have added a new chain saw, and tractor trailer to our list; while the draw-bar hitch-plough is being converted to three point linkage. All this helps towards greater mechanisation on the farm.

We hope that next year's Club members have as successful a year as we have had, and we wish them the best of luck in their Club activities.
