FOREWORD

Once again we have pleasure in placing on record in this little Magazine the doings of the year. This is the first year of a new decade, and one may be forgiven perhaps for thinking back just now over previous ten year periods. It will be the third of them for me next year. I came in 1941 as First Assistant, was appointed in 1942 as Headmaster, and in 1944 as Principal.

Many changes have taken place, but I think the 1960's are likely to see the most far-reaching of them all. In the 1940's we had to re-establish the school after the military occupation; re-fashion the curriculum in accordance with developments in the Education System of the country; and clarify our policy in regard to the primary department, non-Europeans on the roll, relationships between College and farm, administration of the Trust at Paerata. The Roll was steady at 110 boarders.

In the 1950's we were able to bring our facilities and equipment up to a high standard; to increase the Roll until it reached a maximum of 180; and to consolidate our work and policy in all departments.

The 1960's are likely to see our expansion programme fulfilled, so that we shall be able to meet the needs of the community more adequately. I must not prophesy, but I hope that by the end of this decade we shall have a roll of 250 to 300 boarders, an Engineering course available, and a record in the School for scholastic, Sporting, and Vocational achievement that will match that of any school in the Dominion. This year has been a good beginning.

At the funeral the College was represented by five members of the staff and representatives of the pupils, both Old Boys and present students.

To his sorrowing parents we extend our very sincere sympathy, and say that Keith's passing has met with universal

regret.

We also record the passing of a member of the College Board, Mr. S. J. Clark of Kitchener Rd., Pukekohe. Mr. Clark was well-known in the District, was actively interested in the Methodist Church of Pukekohe, and was of great assistance to the Board in matters pertaining to the farm and the gardens.

He passed away after a prolonged illness, but to the end his good spirits never flagged. To his sorrowing wife and family we

express our sincere sympathy and best wishes.

STAFF:

(choir) and Mrs. M. J. Goldsmith, L.T.C.L. (piano).

Mrs. J. Mowbray of Ardmore has taken lessons in voice production and Mr. R. Kerr has given instruction in Maori for part of the year.

There have been changes during the year in the College office. Able assistance has been given by Mr. A. Vivian, Mrs. Vivian, Miss M. Hunt, Miss M. Walker, and Mrs. M. Luxton. Permanent staff appointed by November are: Bursar, Mr. A. Allan; Office Assistant, Mrs. M. Forbes.

Miss Stuart, Assistant Matron, was replaced by Mrs. J. Brighouse.

The College Gardens have been extended, and are under the control of Mr. B. Smythe, C. Blacklaws, and G. Wright. They are proving a valuable asset to the College.

A new drive has been made, ultimately to carry traffic for farm purposes, and to be available to the public, giving access to the sports field.

This has meant the demolition of the old poultry houses and runs, and the erection of a large *poultry house* near the gardens. Mr. A. C. Tremain, Mr. M. B. Knott, and staff have been responsible for the work.

Three *new class rooms* will be erected in the new year, making available specialist rooms for music and social studies; an adequate library; and changing rooms with showers and stores for sports gear. The wooden building at present used for library, and stores, will be moved to another site and will be used as Recreation Hall and boys' common room.

At the end of 1959 the *Prefects* held their first Dance, to which came prefects of neighbouring schools—a most successful and enjoyable function.

For the first time we have held a *College Dance*, in October of this year, to which were invited senior pupils, staff, and families, and parents. A report of the function is reprinted in this issue, from a local paper, but special mention must be made of the College nine-piece *dance band* which supplied the music. Mr. Cheeseman and Mr. Smith are to be congratulated and thanked for their assistance and encouragement.

Plans are in hand for the forming of a *Brass Band* in 1961. There will be three competent bandsmen on the staff to give trained assistance. It is hoped that boys, old boys and friends will assist in the procuring of suitable instruments.

The College is greatly indebted to *Mr. and Mrs. Dynes* and family for their valuable assistance at all times in the social functions. Their catering has always been of a very high order, and their willingness to help has made it possible for us to hold these functions more frequently than formerly.

Some of the occasions for which they have catered are—suppers for College Dance, Prefects' Dance, Social Club kitchen evening, socials for staff and Board, afternoon teas for Commemoration Service, Speech Day, Athletic Sports Day and sundry sports teams visiting the College; Old Boys Reunion lunch, dinner, morning and afternoon tea; dinners for Board Meetings.

We wish to acknowledge with gratitude the gift of many books to the *library*, both in kind, and through purchases from money given for the purpose. Mrs. G. Winstone and an anonymous donor have been particularly generous in this matter this year.

CHAPEL AND CHURCH AFFAIRS

Once again we record with appreciation the work done by so many . . . boys and adults . . . in looking after Chapel affairs; from the preparing of the Chapel itself to the conducting of services and leading in worship.

Miss P. A. Marshall has continued to give faithful and most acceptable service as principal organist and Society Steward. Other organists have been Miss E. Marshall, Mrs. M. J. Goldsmith, J. Marshall, and G. Bennett.

Evening Prayers have been conducted by the Principal, Messrs. E. A. Crane, J. D. Hallum, A. Vivian, A. C. Tremain, and Robert Te Whare. The Sunday Services have been taken regularly by Rev. L. Divers of Pukekohe, and the Principal. We wish to express appreciation to a number who have taken services as well during the year: Revs. W. Payne, C. Luxton, Messrs. E. A. Crane, E. Fraser, and the Preachers' Band.

Many Special Services have been held through the year, bringing in total many hundreds to the College. When the whole school shares in these services, the Assembly Hall has to be used; but with only the choir of 70 in attendance, the Chapel is made available. These Services are listed in the "Diary", but a summary here may not be amiss: Scout Founders Rally for Scouts and Guides of the Franklin area; the Franklin District Rally, for the congregations from Papatoetoe, Manurewa, Papakura, Bombay-Tuakau, Pukekohe, Waiuku; the Easter Service for the Women's Missionary Auxiliary for the Franklin Area, followed by a Garden Party; Boys' Brigade Enrolment Service; Anzac Day Service; Old Boys' Service; District Rally to welcome and hear Rev. Principal Greeves: the Annual Men's Fellowship Service for the Auckland District; Carol Services at the end of the year. We deem it a privilege to give a welcome and hospitality to these many groups, and believe that it is a very good experience for the boys who participate.

Then the Choir have travelled extensively to take Choral Services, the preacher in each case being the Principal. Miss P. A. Marshall has conducted the Choir, and the special items sung have been "With a Voice of singing", "Jesu, Joy of man's desiring", Blake's "Jerusalem", "Yes, God is good", "God be in my head"; and the places to which they have gone have been: Papakura, Huntly, Matamata, Central Mission in Auckland, Takapuna, Pitt St., St. Paul's in Hamilton. On one occasion also they were invited to sing over 1YA in the Children's Service.

The Sunday School, under the leadership of Miss E. Marshall, has now been confined to the infants, meeting on Sundays at the Principal's house.

The boys' *Bible Classes* have been held on Sunday mornings, the combined session being given to hymn singing under the leadership of Miss P. Marshall; and the class-groups being led by the Principal (Divinity class), Miss P. Marshall, Mr. E. Crane, Mr. J. D. Hallum, Mr. A. C. Tremain.

A Special Divinity Class has met weekly for study of texts in preparation for the Local Preachers' Examination, and in the Third Term this has been augmented by those who wish to be prepared for Church Membership. The Principal has conducted these classes, which have numbered from 8 to 15. In the new year, it will be necessary to have classes during school time, so that there may be more adequate training given for Local Preachers' work. As well as the studies that have been taken, there has been opportunity for boys to take part in Church Services at the College and in Pukekohe Circuit. They have done very well, and are to be congratulated.

The Women's Missionary Auxiliary continues to flourish. Many interesting addresses have been given, and the financial returns have been very satisfactory. The present officers are: President, Mrs. E. M. Marshall; Secretary, Mrs. E. Crane; Treasurer, Mrs. M. B. Knott.

Although we are isolated as a College, and our Church activities are limited by College Calendar and routine, we feel that here there is unlimited opportunity to serve the Church if we wish, and not far away are other Churches who always welcome us. We feel that we "belong", as far as the Pukekohe Circuit is concerned, and are happy to be associated with it in its activities.

THE STAFF SOCIAL CLUB

The Staff Social Club continues to fulfil a very useful function in College life, providing the occasion for much pleasurable relaxation and opportunities for widening our contacts with people outside our community.

Our normal Tuesday evenings are devoted to bowls, badminton, table tennis, and billiards, each game attracting its special devotees. Towards the end of the year it became more difficult to maintain the interest of many of the members, and falling attendance was only countered by allowing half of the prefects to attend from 8.30 p.m. onwards.

This year we widened our contacts with other clubs. About a dozen of our bowlers had enjoyable visits to Papakura Methodist and Karaka Church Bowling Clubs: on two occasions we had the pleasure of playing bowls with the members of the Wesley College Board at the College: the members of the Pukekohe Mens' Fellowship, with their wives, greatly enjoyed their visit: once we invited a team of adults and boys from the Drury Badminton Club and the games played at the College, and at Drury on a return visit, gave our badminton players much enjoyable experience, and greatly helped to improve our standard of play.

Before the end of the year we hope to visit the Piggeries at Taupiri, and as usual we shall be having our Y.F.C. display at


the end of the year.

THE BOYS' BRIGADE



SIMMONDS HOUSE NOTES

Steady progress has been the lot of Simmonds House this year. We ask no blare of trumpets to herald the outstanding efforts nor do we ask any roll of drums as a solace for the ineffective incidents. Our sincere thanks are due to W. D. G. Cocker who has given an unparalleled example in his capacity as House Leader. His general attitude has been one of firmness mingled with understanding which has been appreciated by seniors and juniors alike. He has been most meticulous in his attention to detail and the welfare of the House has been his prime consideration.

Sixty-three boys, in nine squads—under the leadership of S. Stevens, B. H. Passau, D. P. Harris, L. G. Helms, R. K. W. Field, W. G. Vernon, G. A. G. Tonga, G. H. C. de Jongh, and J. A. Cameron—constituted the main Simmonds House at the beginning of the year. In addition, one of our number, J. C. Winstone, was put in charge of a small boys' group, which included three from Simmonds House. With the Head Prefect, I. Vuibau, wearing a maroon jersey and the House Leader, the opening roll was 77. Eleven boys have left during the year while eight boys have come to us, so that we finish the year with a roll of 74.

Miss A. M. Greene, our Matron, has again made herself especially responsible for the welfare of our House and has spent long hours in marking the beds as well as in compiling very full and detailed weekly reports. Her contribution is much appreciated.

Mr. H. H. Marshall, assisted by Mr. J. Cheeseman and W. D. G. Cocker, have carried out daily inspection of the parades, while I have given marks for the tidy or untidy state of the lockers.

The scheme has worked smoothly and efficiently. Although there has been a rather wide disparity between some of the squads, there has been an over-all improvement during the year. The competition between Squads 1, 2 and 3 has been particularly keen.

Determined efforts have been made in the field of sport and particularly in the Winstone Cup Competition which has been a very keen one this year.

In Swimming, Carter 2, Crickett, Venimore 1, Gillman, Brown, Qoloni, Vernon, Buchanan, Newton, Harvey, Willdridge, Pearsall, Wellington, Williams, Cameron, Tonga, Winstone and Stevens were placed in events although we fared badly in both the Championships and the Inter-House Competition.

Athletics were kinder to Simmonds House. Field 1 won the Intermediate Championship with Helms and Kirner third and fifth respectively; Cameron, Cocker, Tonga and Vuibau followed the winner of the Senior Championship in that order; Harvey and Malaquin were third and fourth in the Junior section. All House Competitions in Athletics were won by Simmonds House.

In the South Auckland Secondary School Sports' Association Meeting, held at Papakura, Cocker, Cameron, Stevens, Tonga and Vuibau were included in the College Senior Team; Field 1, Helms and Pearsall went with the Intermediates; while Harvey, de Jongh 2 and Malaquin were with the Junior Team. Cameron and Cocker were placed third in the Senior Shot Put and Hurdles respectively. Field 1 broke the Intermediate High Jump record and was second in the Hurdles. Malaquin was second in the Junior High Jump.

Representation in the L. V. Bryant Memorial Meeting was more restricted. Cocker, Cameron and Tonga were in the Senior Team; Field 1 and Helms in the Intermediate; Harvey and Malaquin were chosen in the Junior. Cocker was placed 3rd in a heat of the 120 yards Senior Hurdles.

A further Athletics event in which Simmonds House played a part concerned the activities of the Franklin Athletics Club. Meetings were held regularly on Monday evenings during the first term. Cocker featured as the winner of the 100 yards Junior Men as well as of the Shot Put. Cameron took honours in Hop, Step and Jump, Broad Jump and Discus Throw. L. Helms, in the 14 to 15 years class, won the Broad Jump while Field 1 gained distinctions in the Broad Jump and 220 yards as well as in the Junior Men's High Jump event. Finally, Pearsall featured in the 13 year old events—220 yards and 440 yards.

The College First XV, this year, included the names of nine Simmonds House players—Harris, Cameron, Passau, Crosbie, Stevens, Vuibau, Hunia, Tonga and Cocker. Passau 1, Passau 2, Cocker, Stevens and Kirner represented the School in the First Cricket XI.

The Annual Cross Country Senior event went to School House with Fraser (7th) and Moor (10th) being the only Simmonds House boys in the first ten places. In the Intermediate Event, which Helms won in record time, we had, in addition, Pearsall (2nd), Dobbs (3rd), Gower 1 (5th), Rossiter (7th), Strickland (8th) and Patterson (9th). In the Junior race, the first ten places included six of our boys—Field 2 (2nd), Liddington (4th), Happy (5th), Walch (6th), Archer (8th) and Berge (10th).

These notes would be incomplete this year if some reference were not made to the impending retirement of Mr. H. H. Marshall. He has done much for Simmonds House and has been responsible, in no small way, for building up a unity of House spirit which is so essential if there is to be progress. He has been firm but friendly towards the boys of the House and his rich store of experience gleaned over many years as a successful teacher has formed a strong bulwark for the maintenance of stability. Every member of this House would say "Thank You" to Mr. Marshall for what he has done and would express the hope that Mrs. Marshall and he will have a very happy retirement.

Once again, I would record my appreciation of all the help that has been given to the House by the Principal, Rev. E. M. Marshall. At all times, he has been ready to assist and advise for the benefit of all. Our worthy opponents in School House are accorded a special word of thanks for the interesting games they have made possible in the tussles for the Winstone Cup.

EXTRACTS FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S REPORT,

December 9th, 1959

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1959, and to remark that this is the 116th year since the founding of the first Trust from which we have grown; and the 37th since Wesley College was established at Paerata.

During the year, we have been able to carry out most of the proposals made at this time last year, e.g. strengthening the Squad system in the Houses; developing the Prefect system along the lines of better leadership; integrating the Intermediate Department with the Secondary Department of the school; improving the Domestic management of the Hostel; allotting more time for instruction to Form VI students.

There have been some unscheduled and unheralded changes made during the year. One was the adoption of an 8-period day, with 4 on Saturday mornings, so that the total for each week is 44 forty-minute periods. It is understood that some Forms have a day or half a day on the farm or jobs per week. Saturday morning school has clashed with Saturday morning sports with other schools, but our neighbours have been very considerate, and by compromise we have been able to continue inter-secondary school sports without any great difficulty.

The Board has agreed in principle to the building of more class-rooms as soon as finance will permit. This marks the next stage in development, the ultimate goal being a school of 250 to 300 boarders. The first step has already been taken, with the making of an Arts and Crafts Room, which will be ready for use next year. What is contemplated next is the taking of a large room for a Library, the provision of other rooms for music and Social Studies, and the making available of a large recreation room.

I have to report that in Sports the College has done well, thanks to their own keenness, and to the help given them by the masters who do the coaching. I wish to pay tribute to the South Auckland Secondary School Sports Association for providing such an excellent opportunity for us to participate in so much. We are fortunate that we are now in the midst of a group of fine schools, large and small, that take great pleasure in competing against each other in a spirit of excellent sportsmanship. When I first came here, there were just three schools, Pukekohe, St. Stephens, and ourselves . . . and our 3-cornered competitions were keenly contested but were strictly limited in scope.

I wish to express my thanks to all members of the Staff for a loyal year's service both in school and outside. There are many calls on the time and energy of staff, and without their full co-operation and interest, the College would be little more than a dead institution.

We say farewell now to Mr. Claude Laurie who has been associated with the College since 1938, when he came as Instructor in Pianoforte. In 1946, he took over the training of the choir, and later the classes in Music Appreciation. Music in the College has reached a very high standard, thanks to the hard work done by Mr. Laurie. Since 1947, we have been presenting public concerts, at first in the Concert Chamber of the Town Hall, Auckland, more recently in our own Hall and in the surrounding district. We have been taking part in numerous Services both in Auckland and Hamilton . . . and this year in other parts of the North Island . . . in which the Choir sing anthems and lead the Congregational singing. Mr. Laurie has been Conductor and Organiser throughout, carrying out his work in very limited time at the College. The boys have responded well, and the results have been excellent. Had he been able to continue as a full-time teacher here, we would have deemed ourselves fortunate. We express to him now our grateful thanks, sincere appreciation, and best wishes for the future.

This College Board has its own policy, and for years has been building in accordance with that policy. That is why the Preparatory School at Mt. Wellington was closed some ten years ago, so that all the Board's resources could be concentrated on Paerata. That is why in due course, there will be further developments in extending the Hostel and class-room facilities, but in accordance with a plan. Any gifts of money or property will be used likewise. It is a long-term policy, and each year something is being done about it in the way of extensions and improvements. It is remarkable what has been accomplished in the last ten years, thanks to wise planning and generous help.

We believe that this is the general pattern that should be followed by the whole Church. We as a Connexion have a serious responsibility and an important mission in educational matters. Our sister Churches are very well aware of what the Church can and does do. Our own Church in other countries is also rising to

the occasion.

I therefore have much pleasure in reporting that this has been a good and successful year for the College. We have endeavoured, and I believe successfully, to carry out our duties with a full sense of our responsibility to parents, the Board, and the Church. We have also looked after the social and community implications of that responsibility. Above all, we have been concerned to care for all on the estate in matters of religion. We believe that this is of prime importance. If what we have said and done is true, we have also helped the Church to come to one mind in regard to this kind of educational work, namely that it should advance, that it should be in the minds of our people, and that every opportunity should be taken to implement plans as soon as possible.

RUGBY. 1960

FIRST XV:

Our First XV this year has continued to maintain the high standard of Rugby that has been a tradition of the school for many years. Of the 15 games played it won 8, lost 6, and drew 1, with a

total of 180 points for and 103 against.

The strength of the team was mainly in the backs, and of the 41 tries scored 31 were scored by the backs. M. Bennett, half-back and captain, gave excellent service to his team, with well-directed passes, determined running and skilful kicking. J. Pihama was always a nippy first five-eighth and reliable goal-kicker, scoring 58 points. D. Cocker, at centre, was the "star" of the team and was always most difficult to stop when going at speed. He was top scorer with 17 tries, and 11 points with his boot, scoring 62 points. Te Kuru showed good penetration on attack.

The forwards improved as a combination throughout the season, and were often superior to their opponents in the lineouts. Tonga, vice-captain, was always a good leader of his forwards, and scored four tries. Smith made many fine attacking movements from the side of the scrum. B. Passau and Harris worked vigorously in the scrums and lineouts and rendered good service.

In the Franklin inter-Secondary Schools Competition, College lost the same number of points as the winners, Pukekohe High School, but played two fewer games. We defeated Papakura High School three times, 17-5, 19-3, 9-3, defeated Pukekohe High School once 12-6, drew once 3-3, and lost once 3-6, and were beaten by St. Stephens 2nd XV, 3-8.



College played three games against other schools. In the first we travelled to Thames and defeated Thames High School 18-8. In the second Church College, Hamilton, visited us at Wesley and defeated us 9-0. The greatest game of the year, however, was when College played St. Stephens 1st XV at St. Stephens. College, although losing 6-9, was ruthless on defence and vigorous on attack, and St. Stephens admitted that it was the hardest and most exciting game they had played on their ground for years.

In addition College played its usual annual fixtures. We congratulate Old Boys on defeating College this year by 11-6. In our first match against Port Albert at Wesley, College lost 8-15, but we were able to turn the tables, and retain the Port Albert Shield, when College won a very exciting game at Port Albert by 19-16. This game proves that, as in the game against St. Stephens 1sts, College plays most inspiring football from a losing position. The team was down 16-14 until a few minutes before the end of the game when W. Cocker scored and J. Pihama converted. This year College won its annual match against Trinity College by 11-0. The biggest victory of the year was against Ardmore Training College Junior B team when College won 49-3.

The First XV is very indebted to the keen interest taken in the team by Mr. C. Blacklaws, a member of the garden staff, and ex-N.Z. League Rep. who bore the major burden of coaching. Much of the success of the team this year is due to the inspiration aroused by his enthusiasm, care, and encouragement.
