

FOREWORD

Once again we publish our little Magazine which is intended to be a permanent record of the activities of the year at the College, and an opportunity to express appreciation to the many who faithfully contribute to its welfare — Board, Staffs, boys and many others.

We are now well into the second thousand of Students who have enrolled since 1941. This represents more than double that number of parents and families with whom we have had to do. We are so placed geographically that we are not able to organize a Parent-Teachers Association, or to encourage a "corporate" interest in the College as far as the local community is concerned. We are consequently deprived of certain advantages, among them the opportunity to discuss with parents as a group the affairs of the school —its policy, development, and requirements.

There is nevertheless quite a community of interest in the College in all kinds of places in and out of New Zealand. It is not of course very vocal, but it is apparent when we study the areas from which boys are being enrolled, and from the interest taken by the Old Boys.

Some outstanding examples come to mind: The parents of boys from Hong Kong; the Samoan Old Boys whom we met in Apia last June; I addressed the Rotary Club of Wellsford a year or two ago, and the Club invited some of our Old Boys to the meeting — about 25 came! Every year the Port Albert folk send teams to us and entertain us right royally in return.

The Old Boys' Association is a very important body interested in the College as a group, with one of its main purposes the maintaining of a lively and practical interest in its welfare and progress.

This year has once again shown developments and extensions, and the Board's finances are considerably stretched. It is fine to see the College grow, and we are grateful to the Board of Governors for its practical and wise interest in it.

OBITUARY:

We regret to learn of the passing of Mr. N. W. Gilling, B.A., in tragic circumstances at Orewa last August. Mr. Gilling was formerly First Assistant at the College, and always maintained a lively interest in its welfare.

We have to report also the sudden passing of one of our boys last Easter at the College. He was Christopher Long. He collapsed and did not regain consciousness.

To relatives and friends of Mr. Gilling and Christopher Long we extend our deepest sympathy.

EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS:

The major development has been the erection of the new Dormitory block which will be ready for occupation in December.

There are two storeys, each dormitory containing 25 beds (built-in, rubber mattresses), with dressing tables, bed lights; a sick bay, locker room, reading room, staff flat, common room.

Its erection has meant the destruction of part of the western plantation and the tennis courts. Water has been brought across from a well on the other side of the farm, and underground cables for telephones and power have been installed.

New tennis courts are to be made ready for use in the new year.

The filtration plant, given to the School by the Old Boys' Association, has been in full use, and has proved to be a great success. It is doubtful if we shall be able to enlarge the baths for some time, but it is hoped to provide better dressing-room facilities soon.

Gardens, Orchard and Poultry have now come under the control of Mr. B. Smyth and his staff; and in accordance with a long term plan steps have already been taken to make these revenue-producing as well as an aid in the provision of the Hostel.

Old trees have been removed from the orchard and young ones planted; the poultry population is being stepped up to 500 birds; and the acreage in gardens is now 12 acres. Thanks to

timber and iron made available from some houses demolished at Mt. Wellington, we have been able to build orchard, implement, and vehicle sheds at little cost.

The Library is now being brought up to standard, and is being used extensively by the boys. We are grateful to the School Library Service for their valuable assistance.

The wooden building, which formerly housed the library and a class-room, has been removed to an orchard area, and is now Art Room. Band Room and Hobbies Room.

Heaters have been installed in the hall and some class-rooms. These were provided from proceeds from concerts and entertainments.

ELECTIVES

The following activities were carried out to give practice in speaking: speeches; impromptu and prepared debates; a panel discussion on "Youth Problems of Today"; chain speaking on various topics of New Zealand life.

2. THE SCIENCE CLUB

Term 1 started with a "full house", the topics to be chosen by democratic vote from Textile Chemistry (Dyeing and Bleeching), Space Travel, Basic Tuning of Internal Combustion Engines. Term 2, and the budding-engine-tuners and speed-kings had their day. This proved to be so contrary to the usual conception of "Hot rods" with the considerable amount of applied science, we lost a number of members to whom compression ratios and thermodynamics did not completely coincide with their ideas of the nature of a "Grand Prix". When Boyles and Charles's Law came into it then it was truly the "last straw"! and so to the less arduous "private study"! This allowed a number of real scientific purists to join from the lower forms and such was the insatiable thirst for more and more detail the term ended with about three quarters of the job done.

It is hoped to continue after exams in Term 3 and actually produce some real "noises".

The master concerned, Mr. C. Smith, came forth with many interesting ideas and was strongly backed up by the enthusiastic boys in the group.

Our first accomplishment was a puppet set which gave the boys elementary instruction in the building of bigger sets. Then an exact scale model of our stage in the Hall was made. This, done up in miniature sets, was the miniature of what the stage would look like when we had our completed sets on stage for our annual school concert. The latter was our ultimate aim of the year.

As well as making these things for our own use we were asked to make some props for outside production. The boys took great delight in this extra work and turned out an odd assortment of giant mushrooms (in season), a giant egg that split in the middle, allowing someone to crawl out, and there was also a donkey's head that afforded some amusement to everyone except the wearer.

Finally, after a lot of hard work throughout the term, the actual stage sets for our school production were taking shape. They looked the real thing, what with opening doors and windows, a roaring fireplace and the most exquisite 19th century decor.

Thus ended our work for the year, leaving many boys with a more than rudimentary knowledge of the techniques of stagecraft.

4. THE BRASS BAND

Well, another successful year has just flown by for the Brass Band of 1962.

This year the band had the advantage of being able to start straight off without having to wait for the purchase — or the loan — of instruments, and our Band Master (this year, Mr. A. C. Tremain) got us away to a grand start.

It was a great help having thirteen or so of last year's boys back, eager to begin, and to help tutor the up-and-coming Cornet Champions of New Zealand, (we hope). Our roll this year includes twenty two in the playing band and two or three other unfortunates who are unable to play due to shortage of instruments.

While speaking of instruments, we have increased still more, our number, by three cornets and one tenor trombone, acquired through the interest of Mr. Tremain.

Our music library, too, has been expanded by the purchase of a set of tutor books from Australia, two marches ('Star Lake' and 'Deeds of Valour') and two hymn studies ('By the Cross' and 'Pilgrim's Prayer').

This year we accepted once more the invitations to play at Silverdale, our School Concert, and the Combined Schools Concert at Papakura. An item was also presented at a concert in Pukekohe, in aid of the Maori Foundation Fund. We have also taken part in several services, both in our own Chapel, and the Papakura Salvation Army Church.

To sum it up, the band has again been a notable success. The inspiring comments made by so many people, boosted the boys' ego, and the warm applause flamed a glow of pride in most of us.

I would like to take this opportunity also, on behalf of the Band Members, to thank Mr. A. C. Tremain especially, for his service towards us, and also Mr. A. M. McCulloch, Mr. C. Smith and Mr. Harford for their help in so many ways, which all of us have appreciated.

5. THE NAVIGATION CLUB

Great interest was shown by the club members in all phases of the work which was very occasionally enlivened by navigational anecdotes drawn from the writer's fourteen years experience in the subject.

6. THE GYMNASTICS CLUB

Our school gymnastics club for 1962 was a very vigorous and enthusiastic organization. Under our leader, Colin Armstrong, many hours of physical training and getting fit were spent.

The club consisted of 30-40 members from Forms 1 to 6. It met for 80 minutes every Tuesday morning. Boys assembled in sandshoes, shorts, and singlets and warmed up in teams for 30 minutes. The warm-up included press-ups, number-running, and

many other strengthening and agility exercises.

After this, each of the 4 teams went into a certain group activity; two teams used a box each, another team used weights and skipping ropes and the last team used stools and saddles. From time to time the whistle would blow and groups would change activities, thus giving each team a turn at every type of activity.

It was easy to note how most members improved in the activities. We learned to use our muscles in many different ways

and to make our bodies more versatile.

By June there were enough good members with which to form a demonstration team. Thirteen members were selected and regular practices began. In these practices the members trained themselves for perfection in many types of box work and tumbling, and a high standard of performance was reached.

Their performance in the first concert which was held in the Silverdale Hall, went off well although things were a little cramped. At the School Concert there was more room and the team went much better in front of a much larger audience.

THE HOBBIES CLUB

The Hobbies Club is one which all interested boys have a chance to join. The Club consists of 38 members who have obtained permission from their parents to order material through the school. The fee for the year is five shillings, and out of that money tools, equipment and magazines are bought.

At the beginning of the year our Hobbies room was only a small dark room under the dormitory block, and it was not nearly big enough for our needs; but the problem was soon solved because we were given a bigger and better room at the end of the first classroom block. However, more and more boys are becoming interested and by next year we hope to have a much better and bigger room under the science lab.

Boys are building boats and planes from about a foot to two or three feet long. Some boys are making models that need only electric engines, whereas others are building models that are driven with diesel engines, either started by hand or with glowplugs.

If you were to enter the workshop one Saturday afternoon, you would hear the roaring and buzzing of an engine, and a few minutes later a crowd would come rushing out of the door to watch the maker try out his new model, or to hear his new engine go if he is running it in. The swimming baths are sometimes opened for the sailing of launches and vachts, and the field is always available for the flying of planes and gliders and the running of racing cars.

Our Hobbies Club captain is David Schultz, and our secretary is Garry Watson. Mr. Crane is in charge of the club and he has been very good to all members and helped as much as possible.

The Club has been very successful this year and there have been some very fine models made; but next year we hope it will be bigger and even more successful.

THE FARM

The year has been a difficult one with drought conditions prevailing in the early part of the year, followed by excessive rain in the winter. The scourge of facial eczema made its appearance late in May, and this has been reflected in lambing percentages and wool growth.

New to the farm are twenty-six Border Leicester ewes and one ram, which are being run in comparison with Romney ewes of the same age. It is hoped that apart from their use as a teaching aid, they will provide useful knowledge for the farm, when a comparison is made of lambing percentages and wool weights.

While the dairying season has not been as good as hoped, and only the latter part of the year has shown really comparative figures with the last few years, nevertheless it has been possible to increase our quota for town supply by four gallons. The next year should begin with production at a high level.

Gorse spraying of gullies has continued with good results. Several new fences have been erected. These certainly improve the general appearance of the farm, and a continued policy of renewal of fences will be carried out.

Our best wishes to members of the departments who have co-operated so willingly.

ATHLETICS School Athletics.

The 37th Annual Athletic Sports were held in brilliantly fine weather on Saturday, 17th March, 1962. The ground was in good condition and, although only two track records were broken, times were very good in all events. A large crowd of parents and friends was present and all thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon's attractions.

An innovation this year was the Inter-House Tug-of-War; this proved a popular event and could well be included as a regular feature of future programmes, as it used to be.

Ten Championship events, as has been the custom over the past few years, were finalised before the sports. These included the Junior Discus and Junior Shot Put. Becroft broke the record in the former event by throwing the discus 87ft. 9in., while Blake established a new record in the Shot Put by a put of 32ft. 3in. Harvey, in the 120 yards Hurdles Intermediate Championship, clipped .6 of a second off the previous record to cover the distance in 17 seconds and Simmonds House was able to better the existing record in the Intermediate House Relay by half a second to establish a new record of 51.2 seconds there.

Thirteen boys in both Junior and Intermediate sections fought out the respective Championships, while, in the Senior division, with only 28 Seniors at the College this year, fourteen notched points in the Championship tables. There was no outstanding athlete in any of the Championships. Hunia took the honours in the Seniors with 10 points (one first, three seconds and a third), with Malaquin two-thirds of a point behind to take second place; Parker, Armstrong (1) and Paki, were on 9 points. The Intermediate Champion was de Jongh with 13½ points, followed by Harvey, one point behind. Te Wiata and Munce were third equal with 9 points. Becroft and McGee shared the top place in the Junior Championship on 10 points, followed by Hihira on 9.

Tabloid sports played a very large part in the House Competition and all three Houses shared points evenly.
