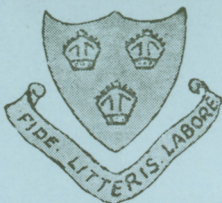

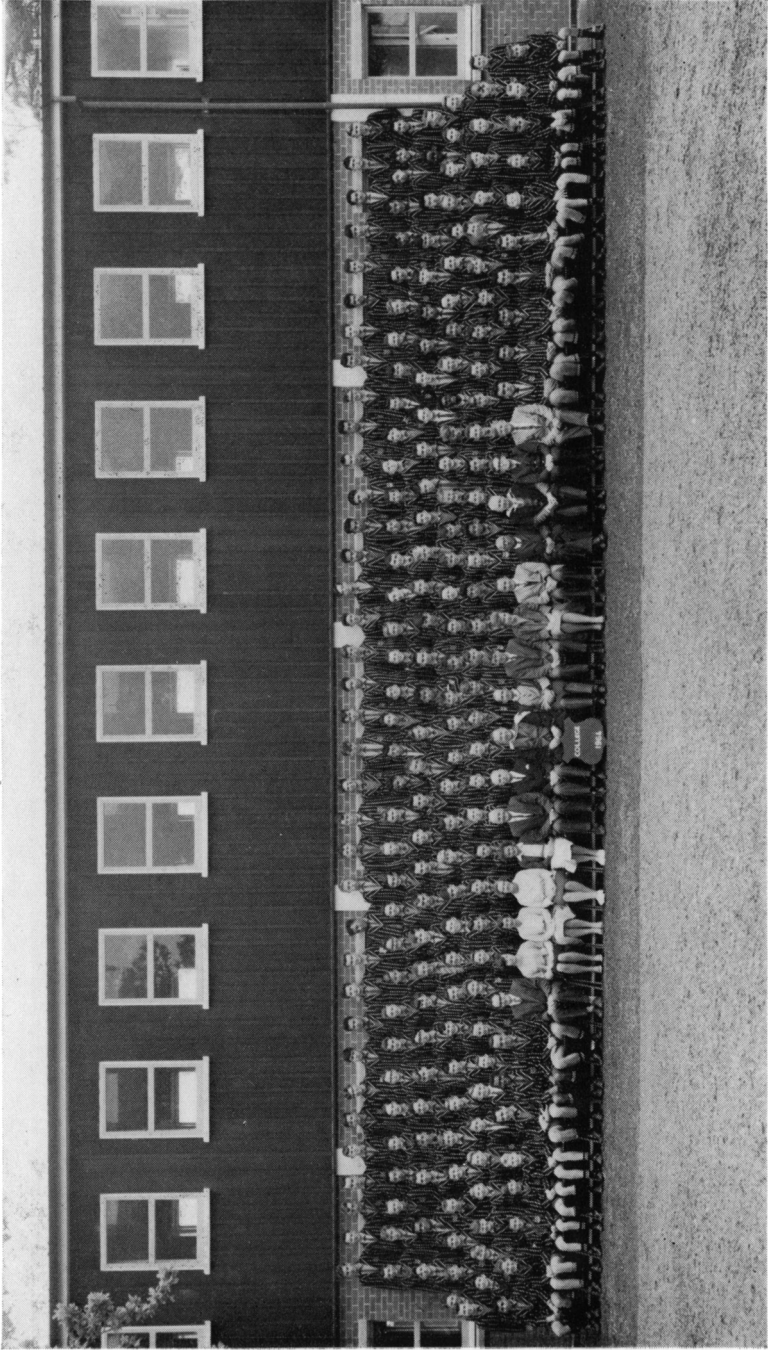


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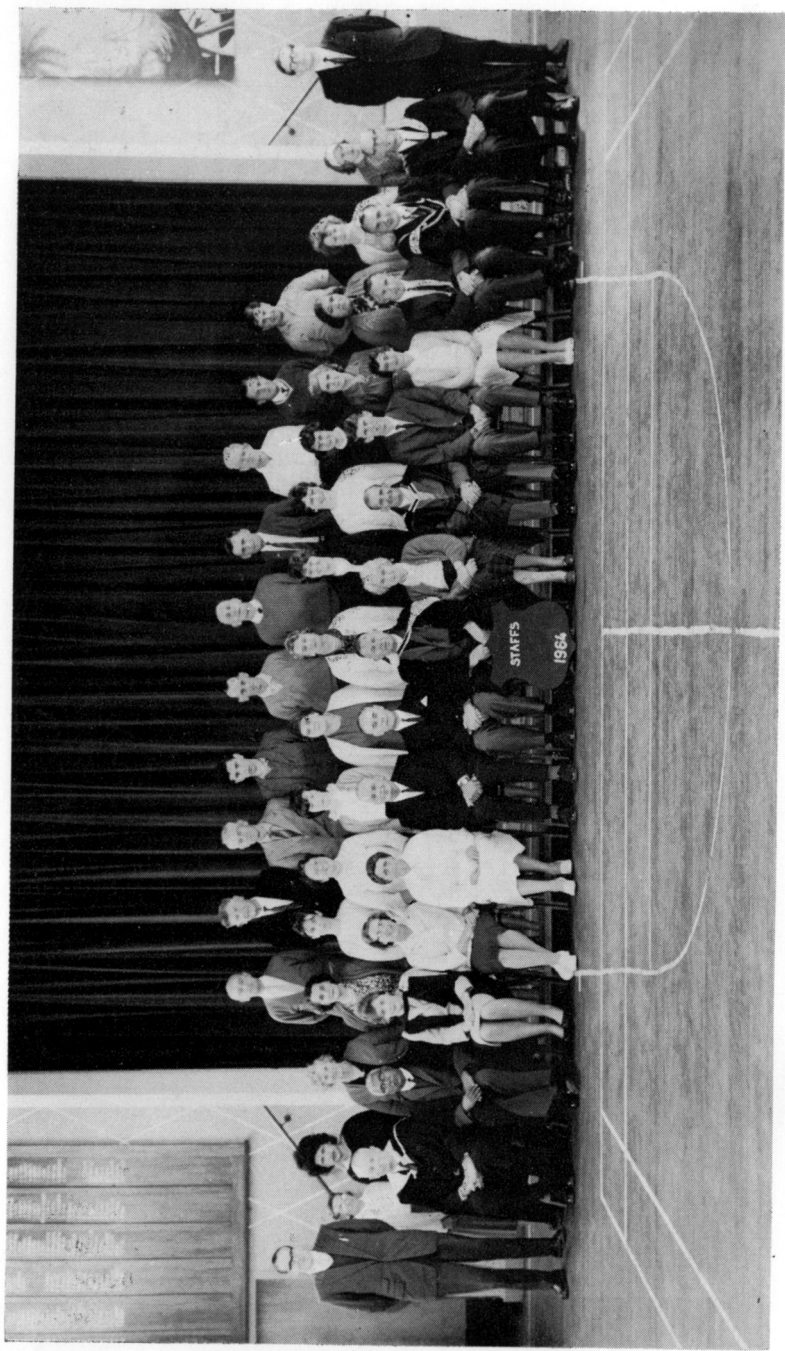

FOREWORD

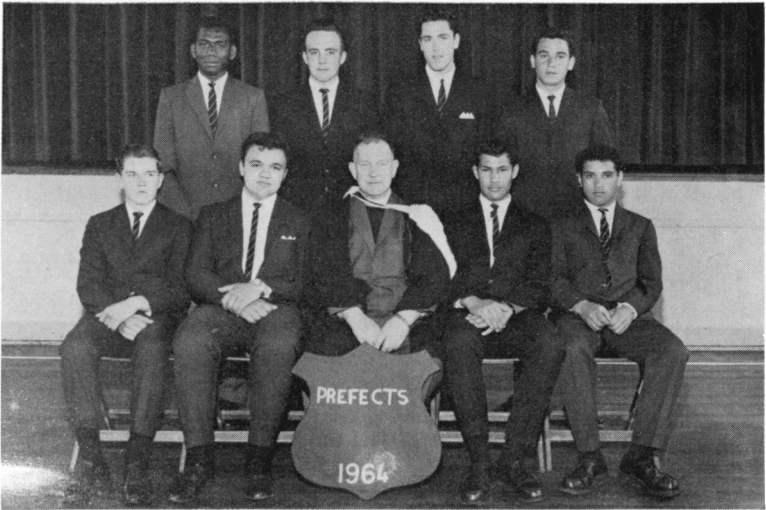

PURCHASES AND GIFTS:

Thanks to the generosity of the Maori Affairs Department, we have been able to procure a full supply of equipment for the Polynesian Club. In addition, the Social Studies Department has been able to purchase many items, including another duplicator.

There have been numerous gifts to the Library, both in books and money.

A new Tractor was purchased for the use of Grounds Staff and Production Department.

We wish to express our sincere thanks to the following for most generous gifts and grants on the Educational side:

An anonymous donor, to establish the *Kingswood Scholarship* (£120 per year) to encourage boys to proceed to the highest level of Scholarship; the *Auckland Savings Bank Scholarship* (£50) for the Maori boy who should be encouraged to qualify from Form VI; the *Maori Education Fellowship* for its very valuable contribution financially in order to enable suitable Maoris to continue with their studies at top level; the *Wesley College Board* for substantial grants and Bursaries to help boys of any race to attend the College, and thus benefit socially and scholastically.

BUILDING PROGRAMME:

The Board of Trustees has given serious consideration to future developments at the College, and is now committed to an extensive building programme:

The Farm Manager's house is being moved from the far side of the farm to the new drive-way; a new brick house is being erected

on that drive-way, to be occupied in the meantime by the Vice-Principal; the three Masters' bedrooms at the end of School House are to be made into one self-contained flat for the use of a single master; steps are being taken to add to Harding Hall staff accommodation with the erection of an attached house; other plans are still at the discussion stage.

The new *tennis courts* should be ready for use in the new year.

THE FARM:

Changes have taken place in the management of the Farm recently. Mr. J. L. Browning was Farm Manager from 1955 to 1962. He was at the same time Instructor in Agricultural subjects in the school. In 1963, he became full-time Instructor in Agriculture and Science subjects, and was Farm Supervisor with Mr. M. Snook as Farm Foreman. In June, 1964, Mr. Snook was appointed as Farm Manager; and Mr. Browning remained a full-time member of the Teaching Staff. Mr. Browning has given very fine service to the College in all of his various capacities. The Board is grateful to him for his management of the Farm over many years. He has always been willing to assist in College activities, even when he was busy on Farm matters. He is now Senior House Master, in charge of Winstone House; he is a football coach; and is advisor to the College Y.F. Club.

MEDICAL MATTERS:

The College has been well served indeed through various Matrons over the years. With the erection of Harding Hall, it was decided to appoint three Matrons who would have overall control as far as the health and general well-being of the boys are concerned. Mrs. Haddock looked after Harding Hall, Mrs. Pitman took special care of the small boys, Miss Senn was responsible for the middle school and the Hospital. For health reasons both Mrs. Haddock and Mrs. Pitman left during 1964; and were replaced by Miss Vincent until October, and Miss Adams for a short time. Miss Senn has been in charge of the medical work, and has given very devoted and skilled service. New appointments have been made in Term III: Miss P. Jenkins and Mrs. D. H. Richardson. To all Matrons and to Doctor Hughes the College expresses its sincere thanks.

MR. C. A. NEATE, M.A., Dip. T.

During the year, applications were called for the position of Principal of Wesley College, to become effective from February 1st, 1965. Of the 21 applicants, Mr. C. A. Neate was selected.

Mr. Neate is well-known in educational circles, particularly in the Auckland District. He is at present First Assistant at Pukekohe

High School, and has held positions at Rawene and Titoki District High Schools, and was Head of the Science Department at Te Kuiti High School. From 1961 to 1963 he was adviser to the Education Department of Sarawak. He has been player and coach in many outside activities, including Rugby, Swimming and Life-Saving, Tennis; is a Captain in the Cadet Corps; is a member of the Rotary Club of Pukekohe, and has taken a prominent part in the formation of the first Interact Club in New Zealand.

Mr. and Mrs. Neate and their two sons will be made very welcome at the College. I can assure them of warm friendships, loyalty and co-operation on the part of staffs and students, and opportunities unlimited to serve amongst young people under the blessing of the Church.

FOR THE RECORD

An account of College affairs at Paerata from January, 1941, to December, 1964.

1941—Principal, R. C. Clark; 1st Assistant, E. M. Marshall. Roll: total of 107 on Roll during the year, not necessarily at the one time. Classes: Standard I to Form VI. From December, the N.Z. Army took over buildings and grounds because of Pearl Harbour (Dec. 7).

1942—The Army vacated premises by Feb. 1st. Principal, R. C. Clark, who resided at Mt. Wellington. Headmaster at Paerata, E. M. Marshall. Roll to August included boys transferred from St. Stephens, which had been taken over by Hospital Board. Total, 112.

From September 15:

15 boys were retained at Paerata, Forms III, IV, V. with E. M. Marshall in charge, and I. S. Miller as Farm Foreman and House Master; Miss Hemus as Matron; and Miss Ramsay

as Cook. The "brick" house was the Dormitory; the wooden house below was commissariat and for Matron. The room off the shelter-shed (the Lab.) was class-room. N.Z. Army personnel came in in September. Then 120 nurses came from U.S.A., and 600 men who were encamped on the farm, and in huts near the Chapel. 20 small boys were transferred to Mt. Wellington where a Preparatory School under R. C. Clark, Std. 1 to 4 was established.

- 1943—Principal, R. C. Clark. No boys at Paerata. The farm was managed by Miller and Summerell. Wadham acted as custodian at Paerata, and one other who occupied the Principal's house. The Preparatory School continued at Mt. Wellington with roll of 21.
- 1944—The College reopened in February, although Americans were camped on the farm, up to 1300. Principal, E. M. Marshall, 1st Assistant, N. W. Gilling. Farm Manager, N. O'D. Alexander. Matrons, Miss A. M. Cliff (Senior), and Miss P. Grove. Classes, Form I to V. Preparatory School continued at Mt. Wellington. School opened on Feb. 7 with Roll of 27 (53 by April).
- 1945—300 acres (D and E Blocks) sold, leaving at Paerata 392 acres.
- 1947—R. C. Clark resigned from service with the Board. W. E. V. Lowe appointed Principal of Preparatory School. Roll reached 32 in number.
- 1949—New Class-rooms built at Paerata.
- 1951—Preparatory School at Mt. Wellington closed down. Some boys transferred to Paerata.
- 1953—The College became an Accrediting School.
- 1956—The Assembly Hall completed.
- 1957—Dining Hall enlarged to seat 250; and Dormitory Ablutions modernised.
- 1962—Harding Hall (1st stage) completed to give Dormitory for 50 boys.

THE CHAPEL AND CHURCH MATTERS

We are amongst the very fortunate schools of the country in that we have a Chapel in which to worship. This magnificent gift is more than ever appreciated today. The present roll fills it almost to capacity, and special services must be taken in the Hall or with a depleted number of boys.

Those who look after the Chapel and its affairs work quietly and efficiently: Mr. G. L. Buxton at the organ, assisted by Robin Marshall, Ivan Wirepa, John Marshall; Mr. and Mrs. Starkey with cleaning and providing flowers; the Monitors, Becroft, Graham, Wirepa, Smeed; the readers, Bridge, Ryan, Kenilorea, Hiele, McGowan, Thompson, Mori-

son, Dalgety; the Guest Preachers, Rev. T. Carr, Mr. E. A. Crane, M.A., Mr. H. Charan, B.A., Dip. Ed., Mr. E. Fraser, Rev. C. T. G. Luxton, Rev. A. Hall, M.A., Mr. A. J. Campbell, M.A., Dip. Ed., Rev. P. S. Barker, Rev. A. Jolly, Rev. H. Toothill, Rev. O. E. Burton.

Evening Prayers have been taken by the Principal, assisted by Mr. Cranc and Mr. Charan. Morning Assemblies have been conducted by the Principal; and nearly all evening services on Sunday have been led by Mr. Marshall.

The Women's Fellowship has continued with its activities, meeting at the Principal's house each month. The Forum that follows the Fellowship has been well attended throughout the year, addresses being given by Mr. M. Brown, Mr. D. Jeffcoat, Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Campbell, Miss E. Senn, Mr. E. Crane, Mr. and Mrs. M. Haddock.

Special Services held in the Chapel have been arranged by the Methodist Women's Fellowships of Auckland; the Auckland Men's Fellowships; The Old Boys' Association. A unique presentation of the Morality Play, "Everyman", was put on by the Papatoetoe Players in the Chapel. The evening's programme was completed by the singing of numbers by Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Buxton, and by Mrs. P. A. Campbell; as well as by a half hour's programme by the Franklin Orchestral Society, conducted by Mr. B. Hogan.

Because of the departure of the Principal who has also been Chaplain, next year arrangements are being made to appoint a Chaplain who in time will be resident at the College.

THE CHOIR

The seventy volunteers who form the 1964 choir have proved to be keen in their attendance at sectional practices, and eager to sing well as a unit in public performances. Raw tone, gained during the Christmas holidays away from regular singing, must have deterred some choir supporters early in the choral season, but the improved tone and balance evident at the Annual Concert and later choral services we hope restored faith in the traditional singing ability established by Claude Laurie and Patricia Campbell.

The choir took part in: five choral services, a concert at Orewa, the Annual Concert, two services in the chapel, "Honouring Age" in the College Hall, Franklin Jubilee Celebrations in Pukekohe, and the South Auckland Inter-Secondary Music Festival.

Special thanks to Mr. Knott and Mr. Baigent who have helped to supervise and transport the choir in bus, truck and van.

Mrs. Catherine Buxton, the accompanist, has given willingly of her skill and time, in playing for rehearsals, three choral services and the concerts, as well as for the massed school singing each Wednesday afternoon.

The Choir is grateful to those who have assisted and supported us, and our sincere thanks to those kind enough to express words of appreciation.

THE STAFF SOCIAL CLUB

The Social Club still continues to fulfil a very useful purpose in the life of the College. In the relaxed, and at times hilarious, atmosphere round our two bowling mats frayed nerves are soothed and healed, and friendships are made and sustained. On the badminton court leaping and diving and oft-times falling bodies tone up their muscles, increase their agility, and stave off the effects of advancing age. In between games one can always "cool off" with a sedate game of table tennis.

By the end of last year the Club had paid off the £80 advanced for the purchase of our two bowling sets, so we decided to borrow from the school a further £20 and with it purchased four good quality badminton racquets. Throughout the year subscriptions and donations have enabled us to pay back £10 of this and at the same time to purchase the shuttlecocks, table tennis balls, and biscuits essential for the smooth working of the Club.

The Club was pleased to invite the Pukekohe Methodist Men's Fellowship to share its activities on one occasion. Also we were associated with a Pukekohe Methodist Circuit Bowls Evening held in the hall.

The Club, though active and very worthwhile, is so largely by the support given to it by friends and relatives of the staff. It would be even stronger and more enjoyable if more of the large staff—teaching and farm—supported it more enthusiastically.

The farm continues to play a useful part in its twofold purpose of supplying revenue and of providing a practical link with agricultural subjects taught in the classroom.

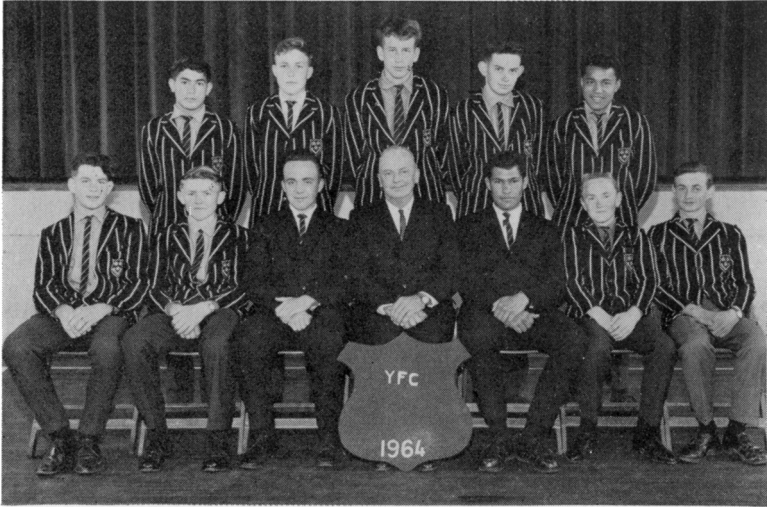
During the last year considerable improvements have been made to the dairy. Renovations to the milking machine resulted in what is now virtually new plant and equipment, while additional concreting at entrance and exits has considerably improved surroundings. All this lends itself to greater production under hygienic conditions.

The town milk quota again shows an increase, and with the increased prices for milk, fat lambs and wool—despite some easing tendency—revenue should be buoyant.

STAMP COLLECTING

As a hobby, stamp collecting is both interesting and instructive.

For a beginner, there are very cheap stamp albums, which supply an adequate area for most stamps of every country. There are also expensive, looseleaf albums, for which it is possible to buy spare pages.

To start a collection it is possible to buy packets of up to 1000 stamps from overseas quite cheaply. These give a person a good start, and from thereon the collector can collect stamps from letters and other means.

On many stamps there is a watermark. This is used to stop counterfeiting, and enables a forgery to be easily detected by placing the stamp face downwards on a black surface. As stamps should never be held with the hands, special stamp tweezers should be bought.

For sticking the stamps into the album, special stamp hinges can be bought very cheaply in packets of 500. These hinges are very easy to take off the back of the stamp and do not rip or deface the stamp as glue would.

Thus stamp collecting is an interesting hobby even for those with little money, and it helps one build up one's knowledge of the world.

Marshall as George the waiter agrees with Penfold that he has heard odd stories of the ghost, "but never put much count to 'em". Hirst, however, (D. McGowan, that is) a consistent "practical joker" and amateur actor, takes a bet that he can "dress up" as Jerry Bundler and scare Penfold (who has retired to bed) and the other guests in the room.

He appears to George first, in the bar when the latter goes down there to pour drinks. Hirst then changes from his "ghost-suit" and rushes into the lounge badly shaken (as George had been), saying that he too has seen the ghost.

He later "retires to bed to soothe his shattered nerves", to return, dressed as the ghost, in full highwayman's attire, just as the gas is turned off and all the guests are preparing to leave. Dr. Leek takes fright (as do they all!) and drawing a pistol, shoots the "ghost". Somers, who is "in" on the joke, appears from outside just as the tragedy is discovered by Malcolm.

Thus ends the play—and the life of Hirst.

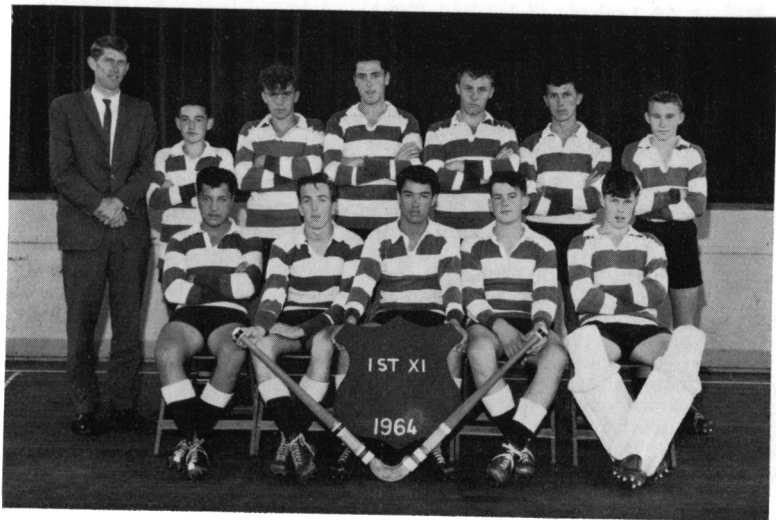

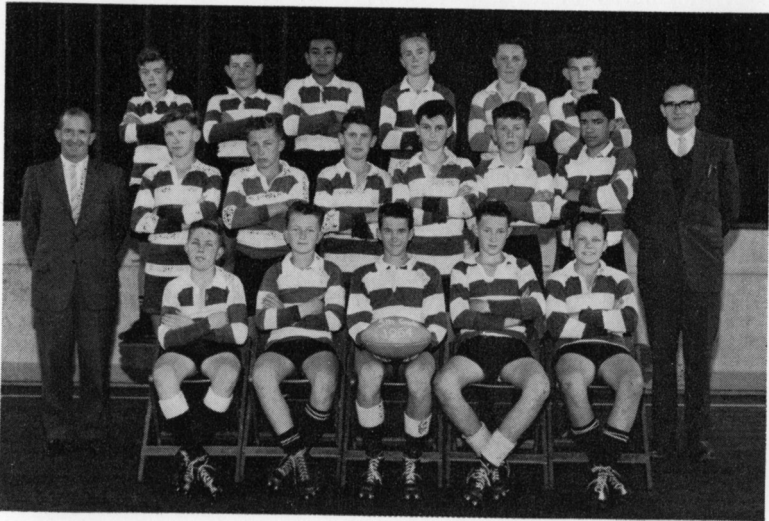
