

FOREWORD

The appointment of Mr C.A. Neate M.A., Dip. Tchg. to the Principalship of Pukekohe High School was received by those at the College with feelings both of congratulation and joy on his appointment and with regret that the College was to lose such a dynamic leader.

Mr and Mrs Neate and their family have contributed immeasurably to the welfare of the College. Tangible evidence of the Neate' labours is the upsurge of interest in the College and its continued building programmes; perhaps the major intangible is the change in attitude of the boys in both

work and play.

The loss of Mr M.B. Knott brings to a close a lifetime of devoted service to the College. The contribution made by both Mr and Mrs Knott in their ever welcome, ever ready smiles and quips, and in their genuine concern for the welfare of each individual boy, will live in the memories of large numbers of our Old Boys.

The demand for places at the College remains stable; and with the conversion of the Harding Hall music room, and the use of bunks, the

College roll now stands at 237 boys.

Our examination results here continued to improve with a record number of passes by both accrediting and external examination in University Entrance. With Bursary passes, and our highest ever percentage of School Certificate passes, the academic rating of the school continues at a high level.

Of equal importance is our widening of horizons. The introduction of civics to all forms; the continued emphasis of scripture as our basic subject for class position; the expansion of activities periods for the promotion of skills in electronics, photography, mechanics, chess, astronomy, gymnastics and radio communications; and the re-introduction of Maori as a language study.

To members of the non-teaching staff, who closed their ranks so nobly during our periods of difficulty, I express my wife's and my own thanks over a year of initiation and mistakes; to the Wesley Training College Board I express my appreciation for help freely given, and for the shared

optimism as to the future development of the College.

To the Prefects and the boys, my thanks for a co-operative school and a year of continued hard work and hard play. To the members of the teaching staff, our humble and sincere thanks.

So now we move on - more and better accommodation to provide for boys; better areas for the development of hobbies and interests; more and better accommodation for staff; a larger orchard; larger gardens; and wider playing areas.

The future of the College, and its worthwhileness as a school rest in large measure with those who enter, pass through and move on as living witnesses to the College's ideals - to the ideals of Christian truth, faith and service and of learning and wisdom. Let us all therefore seek that inner satisfaction to be experienced only by those who at all times genuinely work their hardest for the attainment of everything that is pure, true and best and of the highest quality.

STAFF NOTES

Early in the Christmas vacation Mr J. Horsman M.A., commenced service at the College as Vice-Principal, and to him and his family the College extends both a very warm welcome and best wishes for a happy association with the College.

On the teaching side we lost Mr P. McConnell M.A. for the third term. Mr McConnell arrived at Wesley straight from University and training College, and we have been extremely fortunate to have had the services of such a highly qualified language teacher, in charge of languages. In the important phase of lesson preparation, Mr McConnell has been outstanding. Members of the Intermediate dormitory have especially good reason to recall his efficiency and control - together with the occasional outbursts of opera - sometimes in German, sometimes in French, with the occasional flavouring in ye jolly English. Mr McConnell has well earned his scholarship to France, and the College wishes him well in his movements in Paris and around Europe. It might surprise our non-linguists that Mr McConnell expressed in very strong terms his opinion of the "low" standard of last year's external examinations, for it took him only a half hour to complete the S.C. mathematics paper, and just over an hour to finish the U.E. paper. He did this to see whether or not he had forgotten his mathematics.

Mr G. Bagley B.A., LL.B., Dip.Ed. took over Mr McConnell's work, and we hope that both Mr and Mrs Bagley will enjoy their time at Wesley.

Internal changes within the teaching staff ranks have increased, even further, staff responsibilities. Mr G. Watson becomes Senior Warden in charge of all boarding establishment organisation; Mr J.L. Browning continues as the Head of the Agriculture Department with an equally important and constantly expanding Vocational Guidance responsibility; Mr Cheeseman is in charge of Sport; Mr J. Hall has the vital time-consuming task of maintaining Laboratory organisation; Mr E. Meikle includes in his task as the official teacher in charge of Text books; Mr H.A.H. Insull is Head of the English Department, life-saving and Editor of this magazine; Mr Q.

Johnston of Music; Mr L. Ducker of Hobbies and Woodwork and newspaper reporting; and Mr A.K. Brady has been editor of our College "Seven Sides"; Mr P. Burt has assumed responsibility for College gymnastics as well as for College liaison; and the Rev. I. McKenzie continues his duties as College Chaplain.

On the non-teaching side the successor of Mr Knott is Mr R. Sealby from Christchurch. In this Department, the cold, wet weather took toll of Mr Haddock, who had to take a compulsory break at Middlemore.

In general, the staff has been stable; the farm staff remains the same, as does the laundry, while the production staff now includes Mr Brian Kelly. New recruits to the domestic staff are Mr and Mrs Tweedie, Mr and Mrs Gaudin, and Mr R. McGregor. Mr and Mrs Williams have taken over from Mr and Mrs Rowe, and Mrs Cowie is our second matron in place of Mrs Thompson.

PRIZE GIVING CEREMONY, 1967

For the annual Prize-Giving Ceremony on Monday afternoon, 4th December, the hall was crowded beyond the overflowing point with parents, friends and Old Boys. The special guests were: the Rev. J.D. Grocott, B.A., President of the New Zealand Methodist Conference who was accompanied by Mrs Grocott; and Mr J. Osborn, M.A., who represented the Education Department and who was accompanied by Mrs Osborn; and members of the College Board and their wives. Also present were the retiring Principal of Pukekohe High School, Mr A.R. Dreaver with Mrs Dreaver.

After welcoming the visitors, the Chairman of the Wesley College Board, Mr J.S. Caughey, complimented the school on the results achieved during the preceeding twelve months. The Principal, Mr C.A. Neate, then presented a comprehensive report, after which the Rev. J.D. Grocott followed with an eloquent and thought-provoking address on the stabalising influence college tradition could have on the teenage generation. "You have a great tradition here, and what great possibilities there are, not only for Europeans, but for Maoris, Polynesians and Melanesians," he said. In concluding, he turned to Mr Neate: "On behalf of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, I thank you for what you have done here during the past three years". He then congratulated Mr E.T. Tauroa on his appointment as the new principal of the College.

Mrs Grocott then presented the prizes, after which farewell gifts were made to Mr and Mrs Neate by Mr J. S. Caughey on behalf of the Board of Governors, by Mr H. Keyte on behalf of the Old Boys' Association, and by the Head Boy. Allan Becroft, on behalf of the pupils.

The school band and orchestra played introductory music as the guests assembled and an innovation was the singing of "Gaudeamus Igitur" by the school as the official party entered the hall. Several choral items were rendered and the ceremony concluded with an anthem, the dismissal hymn and the Benediction.

OUR NEW PRINCIPAL

Late in November 1967, from a list of 38 applicants, the Board of Governors appointed Mr E. TeR. Tauroa to the post of Principal of Wesley College. He was already well known to all members of the College, for during the three previous years Mr Tauroa had been our Vice-Principal.

Mr Tauroa gained the Bachelor of Agricultural Science degree at Massey University of Palmerston North in 1951, and he has taught at Okato D.H.S., Kaeo D.H.S., Hawera Technical High School and Okaihau D.H.S.

He has been active in many sports - including rugby, cricket, basket-ball, boxing, wrestling and swimming. As a rugby player he has represented Manawatu, Auckland, Taranaki, N.Z. Universities, and Western Maori and New Zealand Maoris. Mr Tauroa is a brother of the Rev. Lane Tauroa B.A. of New Plymouth and is himself a local preacher in the Methodist

Church. In addition besides being an Old Boy, he is the son of an Old Boy of Wesley College. Mr Tauroa thus brings most appropriate qualifications and experience to his new position.

Since he has been at Wesley College we have all come to respect and value him for his character and outlook, and for his thorough-going devotion to the many calls made upon his time and energy. During the past year especially, we have come to realize that the College is fortunate indeed to have such a dedicated man to carry on its leadership in these days of challenge and opportunity.

We wish Mr and Mrs Tauroa and their little family success and all happiness in the years that lie ahead.

OBITUARY MR M.B. KNOTT

At the beginning of the first term holidays, on 4th May, all members of the College were deeply shocked and grieved to learn of the sudden passing of Mr Melville Bernard Knott, affectionately known by all as "Snow" Knott.

At the funeral service on 7th May the Chapel was overflowing with Old Boys, Board and staff members and their wives, present boys and many friends, most of whom had travelled long distances in order to be present. The many floral tributes made a beautiful display.



The service was conducted by the Chaplain, the Rev. I.H. McKenzie, and in the course of a moving address, the Rev. E.M. Marshall (Principal from 1944 to 1964) said:

"We come to pay tribute to one whose name is remembered not only far and wide throughout New Zealand, but in Tonga, Fiji, Samoa, amongst those who have come to the College from South-East Asia and Hong Kong. His passing was sudden, and we are sorry that he was not able to enjoy the retirement that he so richly deserved. He died while still service the College which he loved so well, in whose welfare he was involved for so long.

He came here in June, 1927 as a general hand.. to milk cows, feed poultry, look after the vehicles, mix and lay concrete, and do the thousand and one things that have to be done. The College survived the very difficult years of the Depression, and came through the difficult years of

the Second World War. Mr Knott was a great help in these troubled days.

In 1931 he married Miss Mavis Wilson whose home was at Patumahoe and what a wonderful team they made! Their first house was burnt to the ground, and for years they lived in a tiny new cottage just past the cowsheds. There they brought up their two sons and daughter. By now he was taking more responsibility and after the return of the College by the military authorities in 1944, he took over Grounds, Orchard, Poultry, Transport. For the past ten years or more, he has been known as Grounds Overseer.

My first Memory of him was his collecting our furniture from Paerata Station in January, 1941 ... a genial, pleasant, helpful man ... and such he remained throughout the years.

He was kindly and friendly, a good mixer, always interested in people. He loved children, as my own family can testify, and as every Old Boy can testify. He was a good friend to unhappy boys, and also to uncooperative ones too. He had a sense of the fitness of things, especially where boys were concerned. He was on their side, but he was also on the side of decency, and order, and discipline. He was a good friend to staffs. He set a good example of doing a job well, and of readiness to help whereever and whenever needed.

He was loyal. Were it not so, he could not have continued to have the affection and confidence of both boys and staffs. He spoke and acted in the best interests of the College and of the people concerned. He lived College, breathed it, in some ways he was the College. He held the Old Boys' Association in special regard. Through it he kept in touch with boys of all generations. Their football team was known as "Snow's Team". Reunion Day was a highlight each year for him.

The measure of the stature of a man is found partly in the way in which he does everyday things; partly in the way he recognises that he is one of a team, - but never so clearly as when an emergency arises, a crisis occurs. I think I appreciated Snow Knott more in this regard than in anything else. He never refused to give help if he could possibly give it. There were occasions when he was called on at most awkward times. It might be a boy to be taken to Hospital in the middle of the night, or an overseas student stranded at the Airport, or something that needed to be done urgently at a week-end or at holiday time when he had every right to be relaxing. He never failed to rise to the occasion, and this was a very wonderful thing.

He was a man of simple faith. He believed in God, and he believed in people. There was a touch of fatalism in his faith. A favourite saying of his was "What will be, will be". But his belief in the goodness of God and his faith in people led him to do all he could to help people, to be friendly to all... to be a man of simple faith, warm affection, strong loyalties.

He will be remembered for very many years to come."

In paying this personal tribute to Mr Knott, Mr Marshall assured Mrs Knott and their family that we shared in their grief, as indeed we still do. "He was a good husband, and a father who was concerned only that his children should be happy. He was a faithful and loyal member of the College."

It is not generally known that during World War II, Mr Knott did home service with the Army Service Corps. As a young man, he had taken a keen interest in life saving in Hamilton, and in Devonport, and held medals and certificates from the Royal Life Saving Society.

Mr Knott's long and valued service at Wesley College will always be remembered.



SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The year has seen a steady increase in small items of equipment, necessary for normal day-to-day usage. Chemicals constitute a major part of our expenses and now cover a wide range needed to suit the steadily changing syllabuses.

Staff members have availed themselves of many Education Department courses and meetings. These include, Forms 1 and 2 Science, Forms 3 and 4 Chemistry, 6th Form Biology, and 6th Form Physics - all very necessary to increase our knowledge of the changing demands of the various subjects.

Heralding the beginning of the new Science course as laid down by the Department of Education for all New Zealand schools, next year the title "General Science" will disappear from our Third Form timetable and the title "Science" will replace it. All the third, fourth and fifth form work of these pupils in Science will be examined for the 1971 School Certificate, an examination which will not only test facts learnt but also understanding as well as scientific method.

This is just one of the many changes occurring in the various science subjects. In order to make an interesting group of subjects easier to understand and a greater pleasure for the pupils to learn, teachers of the Science Department are constantly refreshing their knowledge and learning new techniques.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

The "New Mathematics" has been introduced to our first, second and third forms this year, and has proved to hold a high interest and good understanding for the pupils. Our intention is to present this subject for School Certificate in 1970.

Traditional mathematics is still taught in the fourth to sixth forms, with as many pupils as possible encouraged to take School Certificate mathematics, as this will always be of use, no matter what occupation the pupil may take up.

"Mechanics" in the lower sixth has become "Additional Mathematics" and now includes a large section on Statistics and Probability - subjects which are becoming increasingly necessary to biologists, chemists and physicists in all stages of their work. Many pupils find mathematics very easy in the lower school, but many of them fail to practise problems extensively (until it is "coming out of their ears"). This results in a certain slowness in the sixth form that can only be remedied by very hard work and the spending of much time on the subject - time which is needed for other subjects. Until pupils realise that new work must rest solidly on old work, we cannot expect a really high standard of mathematics.

Parents who are interested in helping their sons with the "New Mathematics" will get a lot of help from the book "Your Child and Mathematics" by W. Cockcroft, published by John Murray Ltd.

ELECTRONICS CLUB

The club commenced operations this year with 30 members, each of whom was provided with a Philips Electronic Engineer kitset. The advantages of these kitsets are many: only battery supply is required (reducing electric shock casualties); many different operating units can be built; and transistors are harder to break than valves (this has been disproved by some students).

Interest has been high amongst the members but unfortunately, not enough time seems to be available without serious clashes with study, sport and other activities. However, several students have branched out into making their own radios and transmitters (of mandatory Post Office weakness), and at present a theoretical course on basic valve theory is being presented to a group.

It is hoped that the taste for electronics will develop and that soon no Wesley room will be free of the cheerful howl of feedback.

PHOTOGRAPHIC CLUB

Since the beginning of the year, interest in the Photographic Club's activities has continued to develop. In particular, the junior boys, who were unable to join the Senior Club, were catered for by the addition and setting up of another dark room. This now means that the School is able to cater for forty boys - timetabling them so that they have an hour and a half per week in the dark rooms.

Each boy pays a term's subscription of one dollar for the use of the equipment that has been installed. This small contribution helps to offset the expense the College has been faced with to help pay for and maintain equipment. Altogether the cost of the equipment installed is over three hundred dollars. This possibly makes the Wesley Photographic Club one of the best equipped school clubs in the country. We are therefore grateful that the School has been behind us and allowed us to purchase these items.

During the term, the following equipment was installed: apart from the setting up of the junior darkroom, the senior darkroom has had a large thermostatically controlled drying-machine and glazer, a photometer, photographic standard lamps, a guillotine and sundry dishes for processing.

With the inclusion of the Activities Period, especially during the first term, photographic techniques have been demonstrated to the members. These include the black and white reversal process, intensification and reduction of negatives, and in the third term, the processing of colour films.

We appreciate the assistance afforded the School by the Pukekohe Camera Club, who invited twelve of our junior boys to witness competitions and processing. This was invaluable to us. Again, members of this Club donated magazines to the College as well as a printer which has been put to good use by us.

During the second term, the senior club held regular competitions, and a cash prize plus a black and white film (donated by Mr Burt) was given to the first and second prize winners. This has enabled us to improve our techniques.

Now that we are gradually becoming able to use the equipment and gaining in experience, the quality of our work is improving. By the end of this year, we should be in a position where some of our members might be able to submit prints in Junior Competitions.

During the athletics season, our members showed their skill, resulting in our winning both the individual and team relays. In athletics our most outstanding seniors were H. Rolando and M. Newton.



you twelve large tortoise eggs for tea.





pects for the first two intermediate placings while both M. Sibisopere and M. Newton were easy winner in the morning two heats and showed, by far, the best hurdling techniques. BRYANT MEMORIAL ATHLETICS

The 1968 Bryant Memorial Sports proved to be most successful for Wesley athletes who concluded an extremely fine day's competition with 3 firsts, 4 seconds and 3 thirds against the strong opposition of approximately 30 other schools.

Two athletes who returned outstanding performances were:

- 2. Milton Sibisopere who, in the strong senior grade, was placed second in the triple jump (7" better than the College record), the high jump and the long jump.

Congratulations to these two in particular who have certainly proved themselves in excellent company.

A feature, once again, was the fine performance by our hurdlers whose efforts, rated us the best College in this field. Apart from G. Wellington's easy win in the junior event, we also had a win in the intermediate grade

where Siale Kaho had the field well covered to win convincingly in 16.2 seconds, .3 sec. better than Matea Gillies's College record. In the senior event Malcolm Newton, despite running not quite so freely as he is capable was able to record a credible 4th placing in the final.

Another point worthy of mention is the placing of all relay teams. Although the relays are run virtually as heats with no finals, the competition in each heat (division) is still very strong particularly from some of the larger schools. Our resulting positions once again indicate some depth to our athletes.

It is doubtful if any Wesley boys present will easily forget the really great effort of Joe Aislabie in battling down the last 100 yards of the 880 yard leg in the senior relay with the Pukekohe runner, snapping at his heels and as determined as Joe that his team should be third. How long will you remember that final 'sprint' (if it may be called that) as Joe just manages to win the desperate struggle by inches in the finish of the day? I wonder if Joe will ever again run as hard, or as fast, an 880 as that'.

Another fine and determined effort and an example to all of striving well to win and not relenting when the pressure is really on and also of striving not only for yourself but also for others in the team.

TEAM CRITICISM:

- PAT RANGIHAEATA (Captain): A fine hooker and a very able captain who led the team by mature example both on and off the field. A strong runner with the ball and instigator of many forward drives.
- JOE AISLABIE (Vice-Captain): A toiler in the tight of no mean ability, yet has often, from the lock position, been the first forward to a back movement. Anticipation has improved greatly.
- RAWSON WRIGHT: Has fully realised the potential that was evident two seasons ago. A hard worker in the tight, yet has developed the anticipation so important to good play. A fine team member as shown by his willingness to travel long distances for holiday games.
- STAFFORD AHO: Wonderfully deceptive centre with the ability to set his wings for tries. At times a tower of strength to the back line with the "chips were down", at other times suffered from lack of complete fitness for 80 minutes hard play.
- ROLANDO HANIPALE: A well balanced and extremely speedy three quarter, providing many thrilling runs during the season. Together with Stafford, the top try scorer. Main fault at times attempting to play the whole team when things are not going right.
- BOB McKENZIE: Ahard working season at halfback. At this grade he has hardly put a foot wrong. A real asset to the team both on attack and defence.
- FALELAULI SAMUELU: In his first season of rugby, a real strength to the forwards. His general lack of experience was more than compensated for by the initiative shown in his solid forward work.

- ERROL HOLLOWAY: Not fast for a three-quarter, but on defence a valuable asset to the team. Handling and general confidence have improved vastly throughout the season.
- ALAN PETERS: As fullback, appeared tardy at times when under pressure but somehow always managed to 'tidy up loose ends' apart from one or two games in mid season when lapses in play occurred. Learning to run into the back line well. Good potential.
- SIALE KAHO: Moved from wing to flanker early in season. Has proved his worth in this position with his stout defence but could learn to use greater speed on attack.

The forwards too had their leading lights: Lamond, Fenton, and Donald whose speed drive caused withering assaults on the opposition.



SOFTBALL



The final game of the season was played in mid-September against Tuakau. Wesley College won this match 30-5.


