

FOREWORD

1969, the year of the flu bug, and a week's extra holiday! Despite the attention of this nasty little virus, the year has been one of marked

growth for Wesley College.

In its building programme, the Board, under the Chairmanship of Mr Stewart Caughey, has continued its fullest support to the College and has helped to foster its progressive growth. A very striking Principal's house has been completed. This new building has enabled the conversion of the Principal's old house into three fully self-contained flats, and so has provided additional and better staff accommodation. A first-class changeroom area has been completed below the library with shower, toilet, washing and drying room facilities. This has provided excellent changing room accommodation for College and visiting teams.

The area below the laboratories has been converted into a hobbies area with special provision for a developing and printing room for the photography club. One room is to be set aside, especially for a Form 7 physics experimental room. Another has been planned especially to enable the development of a smaller, more active mechanics club; another for model trains and slot cars.

To further the Board's policy of obtaining fullest production from the farm, a new 12 a-side herring-bone cow-shed has been built, and the number of cows in the milking herd is to be raised to approximately 200 in 1970; the ultimate aim is a herd considerably exceeding this number.

Another new staff house has been completed, and with it a new road-

way has been developed.

Staff and boys are contributing to a well-planned scheme of landscaping and grounds development. New areas of shrubs and trees have been laid out, and other flower gardens are being developed.

The College has a most stable and very active staff, and all are dedicated to helping our boys to develop spiritually, as well as socially and academically.

In school-work we are proud of the repetition of our 80% University Entrance pass gained by examination and accrediting, as well as of our greatest-number-ever of School Certificate and Bursaries passes.

Our roll has been stabilised at 250, and the number of pupils wishing

to enter College continues to grow.

Future development at the College must necessitate another big growth-phase. The records show that in 1949 a new class-room block was built;

in 1956 a new Assembly Hall; in 1957 the Dining Hall was enlarged; and in 1962 Harding Hall was completed; in 1966 a new laboratory was built; in 1967 a four classroom, plus library-staffroom block was added. A review of roll numbers at the times of these building additions shows that in 1949 the roll was 131; in 1956 it was 152; in 1957 it remained at 152; in 1962 the roll jumped to 175; in 1966 the roll increased to 217; in 1967 it was 226; and now in 1969 our accommodation is still fully taxed.

As must always be, the tangibles of new building, new grounds and well qualified staff can never be a final measure of the worthwhileness

of the education provided by the College.

The intangibles that are absorbed by the youth of the College and reproduced as fruits of behaviour, in attitudes towards people, and in virtue-priorities in living, must always be the real means of evaluating the educational achievements of the College.

I believe that our 'end products', because of their efforts and attitudes, are faithful advertisements for Wesley College. To them and to a dedicated staff must go the credit for creative demand for the continued expansion of the College.

Miss Ravji left the office-staff in order to travel to India for a holiday. The College has been very fortunate indeed to have had Ratan's services for her three years at the College. She has left many pleasant memories of her quiet efficiency and balanced temperament.

Mr Hugh Carpenter has moved in to the position of Domestic Manager, and we are very pleased to welcome all members of his family. The many additional non-culinary talents which the family bring to the College have already been most appreciated.

On the farming side we were very sorry to lose Mr M. Snook, the farm manager. Mr and Mrs Snook played a full part in the College life. They contributed a great deal to the 'work force' who teach youth by

'living' religion rather than by 'preaching' it.

We are fortunate to have obtained in Mr Snook's place Mr Owen Reeves. Mr and Mrs Reeves have been closely associated with the College for a large number of years, in their attendances at Chapel services and as very active members of the College Staff social club. Mr Reeves over the past three years has willingly assisted the College by taking boys to Pukekohe for Bookkeeping, and last year he was voluntarily responsible for taking

our Malaysian boys to regular weekly tournaments as part of the local table-tennis club. We are pleased that the Reeves family have now moved from an almost full-time College vocation to that of a full-time

capacity.

Mr P.J.R. Fordyce B.A. commenced the year as Head of the Foreign Languages Department. Previously a teacher at Hamilton Boys' High School, Mr Fordyce has brought to the College an enthusiasm for both subject-teaching and Christian living. We consider ourselves most fortunate to welcome the Fordyce family into the College family. Mr Fordyce succeeded Mr K. Brady. We express our sincere appreciation to Mr Brady for his work and humour, and to both Mr and Mrs Brady for that touch of dignity which both brought to the College.

At the end of the first term, Miss P. Fordyce B.A., left the Wesley College fraternity to become Mrs Smith. We enjoyed having Miss Fordyce with us for the first term, and wish her well in her new occupation.

At the beginning of the year Mr J. Clement B.Sc., joined us as a part-time teacher, and we have been pleased to have had his services at the College. Mr Clement left for Canada to further his studies. He has now completed his thesis for the M.Sc. degree in Chemistry, and we wish him well in his future studies. We are grateful to him for having found for us a replacement, Mr Parnell, to continue his work with the senior classes in Chemistry.

To Mr J.V. Sanders M.A. fell the difficult task of replacing Miss Fordyce, and in all respects he is a most whorthwhile substitute. Mr Sanders too intends next year to travel to Canada to further his studies. Our contribution to the overseas brain-drain is becoming quite sizeable:

News has reached us that Mr and Mrs Wilson (who left Wesley College in 1966 to teach in Canada) now hope to return to New Zealand in a year's time. We have also heard that Mr McConnell has been thoroughly enjoying his time in France.

Both Miss Litten and Mrs Bellamy left us, and to each we express our thanks for their efforts in our musical activities. We have been especially fortunate to have had Miss Litten as our College organist for such a lengthy period. We welcome Mrs Cram and Mrs Woodward as pianoforte instructors.

Mrs Caw, who had left the office in August 1966 to return to Scotland, (that land of mist and fog) later returned to employment in the office. She has now left us to take up a position as Matron at Selwyn Village. We wish her well.

Miss Baskerville and Mrs Powley are now successfully solving those office problems associated with keeping a boarding school operating.

When our janitors, Mr and Mrs Williams, left us for a more responsible position, Mr and Mrs Taikato ably assisted us for a period. They in turn were later followed by Mr and Mrs Trimble.

Mrs Hopewell has filled the position of Matron most ably. To other members of staff, Mrs Hartridge, Mr and Mrs Douglas, Mr and Mrs Kay, Mr and Mrs Murray, and Mr G. Pearce, I extend a warm welcome to the College.

Wesley College cannever have been better served by its Departmental Heads. To the heads of all departments, I express my sincere appreciation for your tireless work and for the wonderful team-spirit that has been built up within and between departments - all for the common good of Wesley College.

END OF YEAR FUNCTIONS, 1968

On the last Sunday morning of the school year, Chapel Service was delayed by half-an-hour to enable those parents who live far away to meet and worship with their sons. A pleasing number attended the service at which the Principal, Mr E.T. Tauroa gave a short address based on Hebrews, Chapter XI. Next there followed a morning-tea break for boys and their visitors. Parents who desired to do so with their sons then attended the last Communion Service of the year, taken by the Chaplain, the Rev. I.H. McKenzie, who also led the Dismissal Service in the afternoon.

On the following Tuesday evening, the annual hangi tea was followed by an impromptu concert in the hall, and at this function Merit Certificates were presented to those who had qualified for them.

For the annual Prize-giving ceremony on Wednesday afternoon, 4th December, special seating accommodation on and in front of the stage resulted in the official party being surrounded by boys all facing their parents. Old boys and friends seated in the body of the hall. In addition to assisting the choral items, the whole arrangement helped to give a family atmosphere to the function.

The official guests were: the Rev. W.R. Francis, B.A., B.D., President of the New Zealand Methodist Conference, who was accompanied by Mrs Francis; Mr and Mrs Thurlow with Mr and Mrs L.J. Ingham who represented the Department of Education; the Mayor Of Pukekohe, Mr C.W.J. Lawrie; and members of the College Board and their wives. Also present were the principal of Pukekohe, Mr C.A. After welcoming the visitors, the Chairman of the Wesley College Board, Mr J.S. Caughey, complimented the school on the results achieved during the preceding twelve months.

The Principal, Mr E.T. Tauroa, then read extracts from a comprehensive report which had been cyclostyled and distributed. The Rev. W.R. Francis followed with an eloquent and stirring address. At this stage Mr Caughey presented Mrs M.B. Knott with a certificate of merit commending the work she and Mr Knott had done for Wesley College during the combined period of 75 years they were members of the staff.

Mrs W.R. Francis then presented the prizes. The school band and orchestra played introductory music as the guests assembled. The Polynesian Club opened the proceedings with a lively bracket of items, and several choral items were rendered. The ceremony concluded with an anthem, the dismissal hymn and the Benediction.

OBITUARY

THE REV. A.H. SCRIVIN

It is with sorrow that we record the passing on 13th July 1969 of the Rev. Arthur Henry Scrivin who for many years served Wesley College as

a member of the Board of Governors. He was 86 years old.

Born in London, Mr Scrivin moved to New Zealand in 1908, and in 1912 was ordained in the Methodist ministry. After serving for two years at the New Brighton Methodist Church at Christchurch, he spent 18 years on the mission field in Papua, New Guinea. On his return to New Zealand he was appointed general secretary for overseas missions in 1933, a post he held until 1954. He was president of the Methodist Conference in 1945.

Quiet and unassuming in manner, Mr Scrivin was a minister of keen intelligence and absolute integrity. During his long life his wise and faithful service for God and Christian Church was always an inspiration. He was first appointed to the College Board in 1932, and he retained his lively interest in Wesley College to the end.

We offer our deepest sympathy to his widow and to his two sons and

two daughters and his grandchildren, in their bereavement.

MRS I. COWIE

Last May we were shocked to hear of the death of Mrs Cowie who had so recently relinquished her ties with Wesley College owing to ill health.

Mrs Cowie has to be admired for the way in which she so quickly adjusted to New Zealand life and climate. Having spent most of her life in East Africa, she came to New Zealand in August 1967 to be near her married daughter. She accepted the position of Matron at the College in October of that year.

She had led a very interesting life from her early years in Ireland where there was so much unrest during World War I, to the years in remote

parts of Africa with her late husband, a copper-mine engineer.

In the course of her duties she was meticulous and co-operative. She was always prepared to take on any heavy burdens in an emergency and never refused to go that extra mile.

Mrs Cowie was most understanding and had a genuine affection for our boys. When she left us, a great void was felt by all who knew her.

We share the grief of her son in England and her twin daughters, one in Africa and one in Auckland, and of her wee grandson.

MR H.G.W. BAGLEY

Mr H.G.W. Bagley, B.A., LlB., Dip. Journ. was a relieving teacher at Wesley College during the third term, 1968. He taught the Senior language classes previously taken by Mr P. McConnell. During the few weeks Mr Bagley was with us, his pupils learnt to respect his scholarship and his wide experience as a former journalist, lawyer, soldier and teacher. It was obvious to all, however, that Mr Bagley was not blessed with good health, and it is with sorrow that we have learnt that, after a long illness at Wellington Hospital, he died on 1st September. We record our profound regret and our deep sympathy with his wife and his grown-up family of two sons and two daughters.

CHAPEL NOTES

The two new features of Chapel this year have been the introduction of Bible Classes during Chapel time, and the holding of two day-boys' services each term. For the Bible Classes the College has been divided into Juniors and Seniors, with one Sunday the Juniors attending evening Chapel while the Seniors go to Bible Class; on the following Sunday the Seniors attend Chapel and the Juniors go to Bible Class. We started this at morning Chapel, but found that it was more suitable for this to operate in the evenings. The whole college attends morning Chapel, as previously, and on occasions with visiting preachers in the evening, Bible

Class is suspended for the week.

Two day-boys' Services are planned for each term, and are compulsory for all day-boys. During the second term we have missed one owing to the fortnight's closing of the College for the influenza epidemic, but these have been most encouraging services.



SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Since the building of the second laboratory in 1966, both laboratories have been in as full use as possible for science lessons as the time table has permitted. In general, this has meant that 5 in each 6 science periods are held in laboratories.

General Science and Science Classes are held in either laboratory; Biology and Agriculture in Laboratory B; physics and Chemistry in Laboratory A. The central and Physics preparation rooms are used for upper sixth form Chemistry and Physics respectively, a practice which has proved adequate for our present small classes. A Form 6A Physics room is in the course of construction.

Over the past three years approximately \$640 a year has been spent on equipment and running expenses. This comprises about \$280 on Physics equipment, \$780 on Chemistry apparatus and chemicals (chemicals approximately \$400), \$340 on Biological equipment and \$520 on running costs and equipment in general used by all sciences. Further to this was a Government setting up grant of equipment and also, much equipment made in the school, have been added.

Breakages have been relatively low, amounting to an average of approximately \$19 per term. Equipment can now be said to be adequate but, with the advent of the various new syllabuses, the demand for new apparatus steadily increases and any funds allocated to the department are readily used.

The leader of the pois was not a Maori; yes, he was a keen Pakeha - Bill Vernor.

The party first performed for a debutante show. Two days later, on a Saturday we performed for the South Auckland Music Festival. Then on the following Monday we performed again for the South Auckland Music Festival. In that same week also, on a Wednesday, the party again performed to help the Pukekohe High School girls to raise funds to send a basketball team to Fiji.

Several appointments were made for the club to perform late in the second term, but because of the outbreak of the 'flu epidemic, this was not possible. However, the club has had a successful year. To those returning in the future - "Kia Kaha Toa Maori Tanga".

A small beginning doubtlessly but - like the Liverpool and Manchester Railway in 1831 - full of possibility:



During the winter sports season we showed our superiority by winning the Senior House football competition. Good co-ordination between



ORIGINAL CONTRIBUTIONS

OUR LIVING PIONEERS

"One small step for man, but a great leap for mankind." To a historian in the year 3000 A.D. the significance of these words will be negligible. But for us, the proud people of the year 1969. Neil Armstrong's words summarize the significance of the moon landing. This venture has marked a new beginning in man's era of evolution - an era which could unlock the door to the comprehensive question concerning creation. The achievement has enlarged the boundaries of knowledge and spirit - the spirit of man to strive and not to count the cost till perfect attainment is reached. The programme success is one fulfilment of man's question nature to explore.

The contributions and sacrifices in the establishment of this new era have been tremendous. Thousands of people - scientists, engineers, clerical and administrative workers, technologists and physicists have been involved in the assembly, the testing, the management and control of the entire Apollo programme. Countless millions of dollars have supplied the necessary material needs of the venture. However, two immaterial contributions, courage and determination have provided the basis for these material contributions. The astronauts and cosmonauts who have braved into the unknown supply these material necessities which have added to the success of the mission.

The validity of the venture has been questioned. Indeed the moon landing will allow the study of previously unanswerable creation questions and of weather formations and may probably lead to the establishment of a Lunar Base for further exploration. Yet as the Pope announced after the news of success, "man must not forget his duty to dominate himself" to dominate the problems of hunger and malnutrition, population explosions, economic depressions and war.

On the other hand, it should be remembered that when Captain James Cook, R. N. set sail for the southern ocean, England had similar problems. Nevertheless when, nearly 200 years later, the sound barrier was broken, these same problems were still existant.

To me the most important implication of the recent arrival of the astronauts on the moon's surface is that men from one planet have stood upon another quite separate heavenly body as representatives of ALL the earth's people. By so doing the venture implies the crying need for the complete unification of the whole of this world of men. In response to the fulfilment of man's thirst for new knowledge, man himself is now aware as never before of the need for social unity.

News of the success of the lunar venture brought joy not only to the Americans but to all mankind, irrespective of creed, colour or race. President Nixon said "for one priceless moment mankind is one" and in this respect alone the moon trip was warranted.

All the Apollo astronauts and the associated scientists and technicians involved in the programme are a living symbol of man's determination

to extend the boundaries of knowledge, and of the need for us to regard all people of earth as members of one world.

All in all, Cardy won 29 races in his New Zealand career before he was taken to America.

ORGANISED GAMES

THE YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

In the sports for which we cater, the boys have ample opportunity to participate and generally their skills and abilities are of a very high standard. However, one of the unfortunate aspects of a school of this size is our inability, for practical reasons, to compete in even more competitive sports than we do. Our sports programme is an extremely full one, yet there have often been requests for competition soccer, indoor basketball, badminton and volley ball.

Apart from team practices which take place at least twice a week, all boys take part in a compulsory sports session between 4.30 and 5 each afternoon from Monday to Friday.

WINTER SPORT:

- A. Compulsory: Boys have a choice of taking part in one of the following three:
 - 1. Rugby 8 teams. 1st XV plays in Counties 3rd Grade competition one each in 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 6th grades and 2 in 5th Grade. Total participation is 160 boys.
 - 2. Hockey 3 teams. 1st XI plays in Counties senior men's competition. The other two teams fielded in secondary schools competition. Total participation is 40 boys.
 - 3. Harriers All boys not in rugby or hockey teams are obliged to train regularly with an opportunity to compete in several inter-school and inter-club harrier meetings. Total participation is 45 boys. Apart from these harrier runs there are several compulsory runs during the year, in which the school as a whole must participate. These runs culminate in our annual cross-country championship.
- B. Voluntary: Boys have an opportunity to take part in:
 - 1. Gymnastics With the purchase of more equipment over the last two years, this activity has become increasingly popular, with approximately 50% of the school obtaining iron, bronze or silver awards while some teams have been entered in inter-school competitions.
 - 2. Volley ball, indoor basketball, badmintion, soccer, weight lifting, table-tennis, tennis on a non-competitive basis are much favoured when in season. Facilities for these minor sports vary but are as yet, in some cases, inadequate to completely fulfill the demands.

SUMMER SPORT:

While there is no compulsory competitive summer sport, all boys are obliged to choose from tennis, cricket, athletics, softball, volley ball, swimming and lifesaving for their compulsory weekly sports period during this season. However, these sports are offered on a voluntary basis for summer competition:

 Cricket - 4 teams. 1st XI plays in Counties B Grade competition. 2nd and 3rd XI's play in Counties C. Grade, the 4th XI plays in secondary schools' 3rd form competition. While the numbers and

- equipment could support a 5th team, this has not yet been possible. Total participation is 65 boys.
- 2. Softball 3 teams. 1st IX plays in Counties Senior Men's A Grade competition, 2nd and 3rd IX's play in Counties Junior Men's grade. This sport has been introduced at competition level only over the last year and is still building in depth. Total participation is 35 boys.
- 3. Athletics Arising from our annual athletics meeting, which is compulsory for all boys, a squad of athletes trained and participated with much success at two major inter-collegiate meetings. Total participation (inter-col team) was 30 boys.
- 4. Swimming Once again arising from compulsory annual swimming championships, a team trained regularly (despite inadequate facilities at College) and participated in two inter-collegiate meetings.
- 5. Lifesaving A large proportion of boys over the last two years have trained and successfully gained awards of the Royal Lifesaving Society. These awards have included the Award of Merit, Distinction awards, Senior and Junior instructor's certificates, Bronze Cross, Bronze Medallions, Intermediate stars and resuscitation Certificates. Total participation this year was 50 boys.
- 6. Tennis College teams have practised and participated with some success in inter-collegiate competition.

SPORTS ACHIEVEMENTS 1968-69:

- 1. Athletics Our able team gained more placings (22) than any other school at South Auckland Secondary School's Annual Athletic meeting. The senior team in particular was very strong, being placed in 11 out of 13 events. (I feel that this performance sums up the relative strength of sport throughout the College, as athletics is the basis of all sport).
- 2. Rugby Very strong 1st XV. For the past two years one of the top two teams in the Counties 3rd Grade. Outright winners of the grade this year. Ten of this year's 1st XV (5 forwards and 5 backs) are in the South Acukland Secondary Schools' representative team.
- 3. Cricket 1st XI winners of Men's B Grade and also of the Secondary Schools' Championship.
- 4. Softball 1st IX present holders of Men's B Grade Championship trophy. Since promoted to Men's A Grade.
- 5. Lifesaving Wesley is the current holder of the "Robert Young Trophy" and the "Hydro Trophy" which are awarded to the secondary school which gains the highest number of lifesaving awards in any one year (calculated as a percentage of the total school roll).
- 6. Hockey The 1st XI is the leading secondary school team, and has now been invited to enter the Counties Men's Competition.
- 7. Tennis Wesley College were winners of the senior doubles and runners up in the junior singles and junior doubles at this year's secondary schools' championships.
- CROSS COUNTRY RACES: For the first time, Wesley College this year gained high places in all three grades of the Inter-Secondary Schools' Cross Country races.

In conclusion, it should be noted that this general overall strength in our College sport is due to several factors:-

- (a) The unique opportunities that boarding school life offers where after school travel is non-existent.
- (b) The enthusiasm, encouragement and interest in the boys' sport that is shown by most staff members.
- (c) The natural abilities and interest of the boys themselves.

The second most exciting part of the tournament from our viewpoint was the Junior Singles, where Turipa was narrowly defeated by a Pukekohe High School player by 6-5, 6-4.

In addition we reached the finals in the Junior Doubles, and then suffered a far from humiliating defeat at the hands of Papakura High School by 6-4, 6-3. In this event we were well represented by W. Turipa and B.G. O'Loughlin.

WESLEY COLLEGE ATHLETIC SPORTS

Sunshine and warm conditions accompanied the running of the annual athletic sports held on March 12th. The strength of College athletics was clearly shown by the establishing of nine new records and the equalling of four others on sports day, and the breaking of a further six records at a special meeting held after sports day. This made a total of 19 records broken or equalled for the season.

Four of these records went to Milton Sibisopere who put up an outstanding performance to become senior champion by a clear lead. His achievements were: 440 yards record of 19 years' standing reduced to 52.6 sec.; Long jump record of 18 years' standing increased to 20ft. 6ins; his own high jump record increased by $2\frac{1}{2}$ " to 5ft $9\frac{1}{2}$ ins; 100 yards record set in 1946 was equalled at 10.5 sec.

Three records also fell to another senior Don Saunders, who lowered the 880 yards time, first to 2m. 9.3 sec. and then to 2m. 8.9 sec; the mile time to 4m. 43 sec; and the three-mile record to 16m. 24.7 sec.

Another to break more than one record was Graeme Wellington who increased the 20 year old intermediate triple-jump record by $6\frac{1}{2}$ ins. to 39ft 3ins. He also equalled the 1960 100 yards record time of 10.8 secs.

Other records were established by:-

D. Wharenui: Int. Shot, 44ft 64ins.

- B. Jackson: Int. 880 yards. 2min. 13.7 secs.
- K. Kelly: Jun. 440 yards, 60 secs. (equalling the record)
- R. Henderson: Min. 220 yards, 28.6 secs.
- W. Peters: Min. Discus. 81ft. 61 ins.
- P. McGee: Min. High jump. 4ft 5 ins (equalling the record)

RELAYS: Senior, School and Winstone (1st equal), 47.2 seconds.

Intermediate: Winstone, 50.2 seconds.

Junior: School. 53.7 seconds.

In addition to these records many others were threatened in a day of close competition.

Champions and runners-up in the various grades were:

- SENIOR: 1st M. Sibisopere, 18 points; 2nd equal: H. Rolando and D. Saunders, 12 points.
- INTERMEDIATE: 1st, G. Wellington, 14 points; 2nd P. Bray, 10 points; 3rd, D. Wharenui, 8 points.
- JUNIOR: 1st equal, K. Kelly and R. Allan with 15 points; 3rd equal, T. Scrivin and B. Skinner, $9\frac{1}{2}$ points.
- MINOR: 1st, W. Peters. 18 points; 2nd, R. Henderson, 17 points; 3rd, P. McGee, 12 points.

The results of the championship events are summarised in the table on another page. The Non-Championship winners were as follows:-

BRYANT MEMORIAL ATHLETICS

The day was marred by a strong wind continually gusting across the track, and this made conditions rather difficult for all. Nevertheless, there were some good performances by our boys against competitors from approximately 30 other schools.

Graeme Wellington once again excelled by recording two second placings on the intermediate hurdles and triple jump. Wesley's other placing in a final was a third in the junior relay, (K. Kelly, R. Allan, D. Wilson, B. Skinner).

Other points of merit: Don Saunders' fine run for second in his heat of the senior 880 yards, in a time faster than his own College record. Joe Vincent's leap: 5'5" for 4th place in the senior high jump. A well-judged 440 yards dash by Iain Hudson in a time close to the College record. This performance he repeated in the 440 yards leg of the senior relay. Bill Vernor

carried on Wesley's tradition of 'heavy weight' milers, much to his credit. H. Rolando and Steve Patterson ran very strongly in their respective 220 yards relay legs. Brandon Skinner qualified for the final of the junior 220 yards. Finally a word of sympathy to Perry Bray, who ran himself to exhaustion in the 440 leg of the intermediate relay only to be pipped at the post, for third place, in a split decision.

In conclusion, I feel that every boy competed with much credit to himself and for Wesley College.

SOUTH AUCKLAND INTERCOLLEGE ATHLETICS

Once again this proved to be a most successful inter-school meeting. Wesley College virtually scooped the pool in the seniors by taking 4 firsts. 6 seconds and 2 thirds in 13 events (12 placings).

The outstanding athlete of the meeting would be H. ROLANDO who gained three firsts and three seconds in the senior grade. His winning events were the 100 yards (10.3 secs.), long jump (19'9") and 120 yards hurdles (15.7 secs) where he tied with SIALE KAHO for first place. Siale in particular has proved an extremely capable hurdler over the last two years, and it was very pleasing to see his main opposition coming from Wesley. Incidentally, the very high standard of our hurdlers, and the performance of our team as a whole, again precipitated some comment from several outsiders at the meeting.

Rolando's second placings came in the 220 yards, in the triple jump, and as a member of the senior 4×110 yard relay team (when for once slow-baton changing cost the team first place). During the afternoon, Rolando contested five consecutive finals and for a time was as busy running from one to the other as he was competing. This solid programme no doubt cost him a first in the triple jump (he had just finished the 100 yards), as his best jump was well below his usual but only a little below that of the first place-getter. Nevertheless, this was an extremely good performance, and well worth the effort that Rolando has put into training this year.

Other seniors to get placings in finals were:

DON SAUNDERS who ran yet another fine race to win the 880 yards in 2 min 4.3 sec. (14.6 sec. better than his college record) and also to be placed third in the mile. In these two races, Don showed some inexperience in general tactics but at the same time, a tremendous potential with his smooth, long striding style and should in the future, go far if he continued in athletics.

STEVE PATTERSON who ran second to Rolando in the $100\ \text{yards}$, and fourth in the $220\ \text{yards}$.

JOE VINCENT who high jumped extremely well for second place at 5°5". IAIN HUDSON who ran a well judged third in the 440 yards in which the winner created a new record of 51.7 secs.

RUGBY NOTES FIRST XV

Well: We have managed to do it again. We have managed even to surpass the efforts of last year's extremely capable team.

As a team we believe that our endeavours to play open attacking rugby (and we were fortunate to have the means to do so) has paid off, not only in the number of wins we secured but also in the appeal that our

play appeared to have for the spectators. This open style of play was certainly evident when, early in the season, we were once again privileged to be hosts to the Barbarians. On a dry field, the College team was able to join the 4 former All Blacks and many Auckland representatives in "throw-it-around" rugby while at the same time we learnt much from the experience of these fine players. The final score of 37 - 21, to the Barbarians, included 16 tries and is a reflection of the atmosphere of this educational game.

Two other non-competition games which created much interest were our annual fixtures against (1) Church College who played their usual fine game in which, for the first time, we emerged the better team by 6 points to 3, (2) St. Kentigern where again we managed to win after a close game. It has been evident over the last two years that as soon as the team goes on holiday its play immediately deteriorates to an uncoordinated, listless state and remains so for a week or two after return. This strange pattern of play partly explains our not so good showing against St. Kentigern and also against club teams during, and immediately after, the holidays.

Early this year it was decided that we would try for the Counties 3rd Grade Championship. And so, whereas in the past we missed the occasional game through other commitments (holidays etc.), this year our first concern was for our club championship games. In one way this was unfortunate as the traditional 1st XV - Old Boys clash did not eventuate for this reason, regrettably at a time when, for once, the Old Boys produced a "respectable" team.

However, the sacrifice made at that time proved well worthwhile as we approached the climax of a most successful season, the last game. Against Manurewa, the only team to have beaten us (during the May holidays with six 1st XV players unfortunately unavailable), and with the trophy ours outright if we won, the atmosphere was one of anticipation tempered by doubt. This was a game to remember, for the score seesawed one way and then the other. Two moments in particular will be remembered by the many Wesley College supporters. The first came as Pat Rangihaeata took a tap penalty 12 yards from the Manurewa line and dummied left to Rawson, who charged his way to the posts with half the Manurewa team at his back and half the Wesley team in full support. However, it was Bobby Tauranga, exploding from the right who had actually received the pass back from Pat; and with his momentum, intense determination and the rest of the Wesley pack in support, he crashed his way to the line to be buried by the remaining Manurewa players. This beautifully executed move (at last) which was just reward for the patience given it during practice, and was indeed a wonderful team-try.

The second memorable moment came when, with time almost up, and the score against us 8-6, a scrum was put down 8 yards from the Manurewa line. The pressure was really on - in went the ball - a tighthead to Wesley - in went the weight - ball held in back of scrum - scrum inching towards the line - Manurewa retreated gradually, reluctantly - over the line as the Wesley weight was maintained - a melee of players - jubilation from the sideline - a try! No! - a 5 yard scrum - disappoint-

ment. Eight exhausted Wesley players reform. Our ball in this time, but can the pressure be maintained? Have they the strength for a second effort, knowing that time is running out? Ball in - Pat hooks - forwards heave - slowly moving again, yard by yard - inches short of the line - a final desperate effort - the scrum begins to crumble - Bill Vernor breaks from No. 8 - scoops up the ball - dives - a second wonderful team-try as the sideline erupts in excitement and relief. Brett adds the last 2 points to make the final score 11-8, and we find ourselves competition winners and holders for the first time of the T.N. Massey Challenge Cup.

I feel that these two efforts in this last game are typical of the team work, team spirit and determination that has been the backbone of this year's 1st XV and, together with the players' ability, the basis of its success. It has been, without a doubt, a most capable secondary school team and a pleasure to work with.



The team enjoyed a very successful season in winning seven games out of ten and in scoring 126 points compared with only 46 points scored against them.


Both backs and forwards combined well to produce some very good football. Good team work produced some excellent tries.




