FOREWORD

On the 7th October 1844, Governor Fitzroy granted in trust, a block of just under seven acres in the Grafton Road area, in perpetuity, for the purpose of the Wesleyan Native Institution.

Further areas were granted to the Trust, by Governors Fitzroy and Grey and of course of time, the Wesleyan Native Institution, and then to Wesley College, Three Kings.

In 1914, an amending Act permitted the sale of some Trust properties and the use of the proceeds for improvements to other Trust land.

In 1912, 680 acres were purchased at Paerata, and on August 28th 1922 the School moved to Paerata.

In 1924 Wesley Training College Paerata, was registered as a Secondary School.

The year 1974 will be the 130th anniversary of the establishment of the original College; and the 50th anniversary of the registration of the College as a Secondary School at Paerata.

A look at the Roll: 35 boys in 1924 to 254 in 1970, and a comparison of the present grounds and buildings with those as presented in paintings of the early Institute and Three Kings College, will illustrate the material changes.

Interest in College achievements by Old Boys, and performances by Old Boys, in community and national activities, are only a small measure of fruits of character, possibly founded in College values.

With our small senior school, the year 1970 shows five past pupils of the College featuring in "capping" celebrations, at the Canterbury, and Auckland University Colleges. A complete Doctorate with first class honours; a Master of Science with honours, two Bachelors of Science, and an Arts Degree.

To the north Papakura spreads southwards; to the south Pukekohe spread northwards; to the west, Waiuku with the steel complex moves east; and to the east, the Auckland arterial motorway, brings the city dwellers of Auckland within easy reach of the College.

It could be that Wesley College would be one of the few green areas in a built-up, suburban district.

Should policy be so reoriented, Wesley College might be predominantly a Day Boys school, with provision for boarders.

Originally agriculturally biased, the changes in size of the agricultural economic unit, might see the disappearance of the accepted agicultural subjects, e.g. Animal Husbandry and General Agriculture from the College curriculum.

Emphasis on teaching the principles of administration might be the more worthwhile in order to enable the new farm Manager of the large holdings to more effectively administer his responsibility in the same way as would the Industrial Manager administer his factory, by application of principles from a common course.

Town and Country Planning regulations; the development of new motorways the best economic use of Trust assets might necessarily see a red= uetion in size of the 'green' College area and there will be the need for College planners to build upward in order to enable the best and fullest

use of available space. (By youth of the '60's and '70's)

The universal challenge that religion prove its worth, and that Christianity prove its truths, might be reflected in a more ecumenical use of College assets.

Should efficiency of instruction by improved by the provision of great: er buildings, more facilities and a larger roll, perhaps the combined assets of Churches in Union, might be focused on the economic develop= ment of a school with responsibility for developing a particular group of skills.

Better informed and ecumenically minded administrators in both State and private enterprise, might recognise that because of the College. situation within the "Puke pakura" / City complex, Wesley Gollege might in the national education interests, be best utilised as an area Senior school or junior University School; perhaps a special electronic developmental school.

Educationists stress the need for relevance and interplay between

school and community.

That the school situation be relevant to normal living demands an association throughout adolescence, with the female.

The challenges of a co-educational boarding school could perhaps best be met by the dedicated efforts of a Church School, and leadership in this field, could very fairly be claimed to be another Church responsibility. Within the boarding complex of the school, a Colombo plan hostel might be tangible evidence of an international education. Improved commun= ication and faster travel could result in the development of per term or per year, interschool staff and student exchanges between Wesley College Paerata, with Wesley College, Melbourne and other ecumenical Church institutions overseas.

Whatever the tangible evidences of progress, and educational thought in the 80's and into the new century, the base line of our efforts relates always to individual persons.

On the firm foundation of "By Faith, By Learning, By Labour, "the

future hope of the College confidently rests.

CHAPEL NOTES

During the first term we followed the same Chapel procedure as for previous years. This involves a fifteen minute service every week night and two full services each Sunday. However, during the second term after much discussion, it was decided to make some services voluntary. This new idea made chapel compulsory on Wednesday, Friday and Sundays only, while a voluntary Bible Class is conducted every Thursday.

During the thirdterm, however, the voluntarymethod was abando ned.

Daily services are usually conducted by Messrs Ducker, McKenzie, Carpenter, and Fordyce. The latter three also conduct Bible Class groups.

Variations to the Sunday Service have taken the form of television programmes and films about the life of Christ. We were also very fortunate to be able to go into the Pukekohe Methodist Church during the second term to join in a special service.

This year we have had an increased number of visiting preachers. Visitors during the first term were Mrs Smith from the Bible Society and Mr Griffin, who brought his Bible Class group out from Onehunga.

During the second term we were visited by Rev. L. Tauroa, Chaplain of Waikeria Borstal, and Mr H.C. Vince Vice-President of the Methodist Church. Mr I. Grant from Pukekohe has also swapped pulpits with our Chaplain a few times.

So far, during the third term we have been visited by Mr S. Dixon, Rev. Darvill and a group of Open-Air Campaingers. Mr Palmer from Pukekohe has taken a service along with Mr Fordyce, a member of the Staff, and Mr Tauroa, the Principal.

The two main problems with Chapel this year have been a shortage of hymn books and seating. The book situation should soon be remedied with the printing of a special College Hymn Folio, but to extend the seating capacity will not be so easy.

We would like to thank Rev. I.H. McKenzie for his devotion as College Chaplain this year, and all other visiting preachers. Chapel monitors Richard Maurice, Quentin Broderick, and John Kenyon would also like to thank the organists, especially Derek Thompson, and the boys who have assisted with the readings in Chapel this year.





(The Cream of the School)



Long hair?? No fear, Chas. Buck's here.







This year saw the introduction of the new "Science" syllabus to the fourth forms, and new 6th form syllabi in Physics and Biology. These new syllabi, whilst still containing basic focts, principles and theories, also aim to increase the pupils understanding of the fundamental concepts and their application to novel situations. A scientific attitude in the pupils approach to problems in encouraged by as much experimentation as possible with, if possible, an open minded approach. The pupil who used to pass his examinations by "swotting" up facts will still be able to do well, but he may find that he has to listen more carefully and obtain a lot more of these facts for himself than in the past. Poorer pupils will still get all the help they need, but the better pupils, with better under-

standing, should be much better fitted to face a University course than before.

An advanced Physics Room was completed under the laboratories last year, and this has been of much use to the senior pupils, who are now able to leave an experiment set up for several days and know it will be reasonablealy safe.

The pupils interest in the various science subjects is quite high and, taking the opportunity and making the time, will get a good start in this field.

During the year \$660.00 has been spent on running the laboratories and providing new equipment. A library grant of \$200.00 has also increased the amount of science reference books.

The number of books has increased by more than 560 this year to bring the total to 9750, and increase of 5760 books since 1965.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

The "New Mathematics" has now reached the fifth form and, this year, over fifty students will sit School Certificate in this subject. Basically the content of the syllabus is not very different from the previous one, but the approach and intermingling of the separate branches, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry and Trigonometry, make the subject more of an entity, and some of the new concepts introduced make a lot of the work much clearer and easier to grasp. We hope that the students will do well.

This year, we have tackled the problem of the boy who is weak in the basic understanding and manipulation of numbers. \$200.00 has been spent to provide an Algebra sills kit, and a Computational skills and understanding of the basic skills necessary to master Mathematics. These are proving popular and are proving most useful. Also a further \$50.00 has been provided for Mathematics reference books for the Libary.

In July the third form entered several Mathematical models in the competition for Auckland Schools' 3rd Forms run by the Auckland Mathematics Association. Much time was spent on making these models. The pupils used mainly electrical switching methods to demonstrate mathematical problems. One device gave (the operator) you an electric shock if he gave the wrong answer to a mathematics question. A computor device incorporating the binary system, won a top prize for a group of three of our students, Ian Brooker, Paul Whiteman and Shane Isdale. This device was exhibited at the Auckland Building Centre during Education Week.

This is now the third year of teaching Statistics to the sixth form as part of Applied Mathematics. The next step will be the introduction of various other topics at the upper sixth level, including computor programming in 1973.

There is one point that could be noted about Mathematics
It is the School Certificate year that really makes or breaks a mathematician. Some students find it easy and don't work hard enough to pass reasonably well. These students then find the sixth form work very hard and rarely have time to catch up on the basic work.


Harrison (ZL3BC), G.H. Gillman (ZLI3QR), and B.O. Prue (ZL3UF) all of Christchurch.





- SIALE KAHO: Vice-Captain.. Flanker .. Counties Secondary School representative. Still an 80 minute player. Where the ball is, Siale is bound to be. A feature of his play has been his tremendous copybook tackling. An asset to any team but his one fault so busy getting on with his own game that he sometimes tends to forget himself as forward leader.




