



We are able to record material progress by the simple process of recognising the presence of new or changed buildings.

Perhaps we should be reminded that change does not necessarily herald social progress. In that this could apply building wise, much more so will it apply character wise.

The need to express oneself, loses its quality, when self expression implies the intimidation of another.

The right to protest lacks in virtue when participation involves "a duck following a duck, because it is a duck".

The ready availability of contraceptives needs hardly imply a better understanding of love; the legal right to drink liquor at an early age, surely looses value, when the killing of another results.

It might seem that we have stood still, for we have no big building programme under way.

I would claim that the College has gone forward by doing no more than continuing to stress, in a time of changing social values, that the "out of fashion" virtues of love for others as revealed by the denial of self, is a marked forward move. In a period when the interpretation of love may be construed as the misuse of others, for selfish satisfaction, a clear statement of our interpretation is essential.

It is good that we should have stood to re-examine the strength of our foundations, to reassess our goals, and reaffirm the means by which these can be achieved.

"By faith in God", reminds us of the ultimate in personal committment; "By learning", accepts that Growth in knowledge must evolve; "By work", is a reminder that personal effort, and honest sweat, continues to be a pathway to personal freedom.

Wesley College will continue to change.

Wesley College will go forward and progress, as long as there is cultivated in all of her pupils, the lasting personal conviction of the truth of her foundations.





# MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

This year, in keeping with the change to "New Mathematics" in the junior forms, the Alternative Mathematics syllabus has been followed in the sixth form using exisiting text books and cyclostyled notes in lieu of required texts not yet published. Only about one third of this syllabus is really different from the previous course.

A small group of students have been studying computor programming in their spare time, using the Portram instruction code developed by the University of Otago especially for schools. They have learnt how to instruct the computor to carry out the Mathematical operations they require to solve problems in Mathematics. This topic will be part of the 7th form Additional Mathematics course in 1973.

Ian Brooker, Shane Isdale and Paul Whiteman once again put a mathematical exhibit into the Auckland Mathematics Association Competition for 4th Forms and gained a commendation for their efforts.

The 7th form took part in the Business Game, organised by the N.Z. Society of Chartered Accountants for schools throughout New Zealand. They won their first round quite well but were knocked out in the second after a fairly closely fought battle.

# SCIENCE DEPARTMENT


With the arrival of Mr. W. Peddie, the long wait for a full time Chemistry Teacher was over and a system of team teaching introduced in the 3rd and 5th forms, each teacher instructing in his own subject. This was the first year of the "Science" syllabus in the 5th form and required a great deal of effort and preparation on the part of the teachers to cope with both the new syllabus and the altered teaching methods. Also the staff were involved in various courses and meetings concerning their science subjects to bring their knowledge up to date and gain understanding of new topics being introduced at all levels.

The new Physics syllabus was taught in the 7th form with a fair measure of practical work. However, some costly items of equipment are now needed and will be bought slowly in succeeding years.

Further major items of equipment were added during the year, including an incubator, more power packs and a bi-focal microscope.

Several students have made good use of the Advanced Physics Room in their spare time, building themselves electronic devices. This interest should give them a much greater insight into various topics which now form part of the 7th form syllabus.

# CLASSICAL POP!

Hands up those who have heard of 'The Nice'. The chances are that you will not have heard of them as they have not appeared on the Pop Charts. If you have not heard of 'The Nice' then it is even less probable that you have heard of the 'Five Bridges Suite'. This record is an honest and successful attempt by the group to link rock and classical music, hence the title 'Bridges'. With jacket credits mentioning themes of Tchaikovsky, Sibelius and Bach, one may be a little sceptical. But the suite itself is a work of real musical merit. Written by Nice Keyboard man Keith Emerson, it involves a full symphony orchestra as well as the group. On the second side Tchaikovsky's Pathetique Symphony, Sibelius' Karelia and Bach's Branderburg concertro all respond to Emerson's stimulating electrical arrangements.

From the rock-classical constrations of the 'Five Bridges Suite' we can move to the straight classical or straight rock. Today the pop charts are seeing the arrival of a number of classical pieces rearranged in a more modern mode. Although cries of "Murder" have been made by several classical conoisseurs the songs have been hits again. Surely some classical music is better than none ever if lyrics have been added.

On the other hand there is rock. Perhaps one of the best and longest lasting rock groups still on the scene today is 'The Who'. Four or five years ago they astonished New Zealand audiences with their wild stage act, they did the same thing to four hundred thousand people at Woodstock in August 1969. Two records stand out for 'The Who', first there is Peter Townshend's rock opera 'Tommy' which was one of the first rock operas (everyone writes them nowadays) and received rave reviews everywhere it was played. Secondly, 'Live at Lees' has been described as the best live rock album ever put down. Townshend shows his expertise on the guitar in a fourteen minute version of 'My Generation', and seven minutes of 'The Magic Bus'. On the other side 'Substitute' is offered in a far better condition than the original recording, and all this on a live album.

Another group worthy of mention for their great sound is 'The

Golding Earring'. Although it has no name players, the flute work on the first side is as good as anything Ian Anderson has ever done for 'Jethro Tull'. Townshend would be proud of the guitar effort in 'Eight Miles High' an 'ex Herd' hit turned into twenty one minutes of musical ecstacy.

The 'Supergroup', is another prevalent feature of today's modern sounds. Probably the best example of this is 'Led Zeppelin'. Three unknown musicians and Jimmy Page's genius getting it together for two number one hits and three mightly albums. The first two display a raw and basic sound, the third has despensed with this and has been replaced with an all acoustic sound. As an experiment, it is a success and as a record it is the most phenominal piece of mellow heavy music yet conceived.

All these groups and many other like 'Iron Butterfly', 'The Moody Blues' and 'Blind Faith' (now disbanded) are what modern music is all about. Modern music is not the bright breezy commercial tune aimed at every tennybopping screaming schoolgirl, it is the sound of today's musicians - people like Page, Emerson and Townshend putting out things that last longer than six weeks on the hit parade.

This year has seen the mergence of another new group of great musicial capabilities. Once 'The Nice' split up (it happens to innumberable groups) Keith Emerson gathered two other musicians around him and as a result 'Emerson Lake and Palmer' was born. Debuting at the Isle of Wight festival last year, the three stood for thirty-five minutes with no music, playing a piece with intricate changes of beat key and rhythmn, and when they finished the audience erupted. Once again classical themes had been used. Surely it needs more than the knowledge of a few guitar chords to rearrange and produce music in this vein.

The chances are you will not hear 'Emerson Lake and Palmer' either unless you buy their albums.

Whatever our classical orientated elders may say about today's music, they must concede that no classical composer has ever written a drum solo. Violin solos, piano solos, trumpet solos, we have plenty but no drums. It may not be a pure sound like a symphony orchestra but it is one of the most basic, if not the most basic instruments ever used by man. Ginger Baker and innumerable other class drummers have rectified this fault to good effect.

Today's music is not found in the Top Twenties of the world. This classical pop is found in the pens of today's modern composers and is heard in the long recording sessions that take place in recording studios throughout the world.

#### FIRST FIFTEEN.

The tradition of a strong first XV was maintained by the present team, and in fact the team would compare very favourably with any of its recent predecessors. Its strength lay in a balanced distribution of talent, rather than in the presence of stars.

The 1971 Rugby season has generally been a very satisfying one for the 1st XV, who again played in the Counties 3rd grade competition. As a team we strived throughout the season to play open attacking rugby, but always we kept in the back of our minds that the main object of playing rugby is to win, by performing as a team.

Our style of play was evident in our first few matches - when we scored over 100 points in our first three games and the success that we gained through the season was most rewarding. Credit for our success must go to our coach, Mr Tauroa. He instilled in us the correct mental approach for 3rd grade rugby. He made the forwards think all the time and impressed upon them to drive into rucks hard and low - which they always did with great zest and spirit. What was a relatively 'green' backline at the beginning of the season he moulded into an efficient working body. The main fault, that became quite marked at one stage of the season, was the failure to pass the ball after having beaten one man and having made the initial break. Backing up of the ball carrier also lacked at this stage but improved again near the end of the season.

The Moascar Cup once more eluded us when we drew 3 - 3 with Pukekohe High School. The breaks were made and the tries were set up,

but last minute errors kept the points to a minimum.

Six of the boys were chosen to represent the Counties Secondary Schools in the tournament held at Auckland. There were two sections of teams and the Counties beat North Auckland, Auckland and drew with Fiji, to win their section. In the final, Counties played Taranaki, but were beaten.

Playing in the 3rd grade competition, we were obliged to play games during our school holidays. We had four games during the holidays and lost two of them. In my opinion this was the most disappointing factor of the season. Some boys who said that they would be back, did not return, and consequently we had to play short of men. However we still managed to win the overall competition.

We had many enjoyable non-competition games, beating St. Kentigerns and, for the first time in College history, we beat the Barbarians, after swapping four of our men for theirs. As always, it was a great pleasure to have the Barbarians here and many of our players matured a great deal from the experience. A most enjoyable trip to the Waikeria Borstal Institution eventuated, and this association was very worth while.

We hope that, over the year, we have been helpful to the younger lower grades and that the rugby we have played has been exciting and

entertaining.

Finally we would like to thank our coach, Mr Tauroa, for imparting to us his knowledge of the game and overall making it a very enjoyable season. Also thanks goes to those Old Boys who supported us with such great enthusiasm.

To those potential 1972 1st XV players, try and keep up the reputation that has been established by our 1st XV's during the past seasons and remember that the attitude off the field, is every bit as important, as that on the field.





#### EPISTLE TO THE NEW ZEALANDERS:

Cape Town, SOUTH AFRICA. 14/10/71.

Dear School,

Should you fly to South Africa, you would land at Johannesburg. This city is the financial and mining heart of the country, with the Central Business Area dominated by huge office blocks and a bank on every corner. The mainly narrow sidewalks and streets are generally choked with people and with traffic which moves at breakneck speed. The city speed limit is 35 m.p.h. but I gained the impression that this applies only to little old ladies. Most truck and motor cycle drivers are Bantu and they seem to know only two speeds: 'stop' and 'crazy'.

During the day most of the pavement population is Bantu, most of whom are very well-dressed. Many Bantus drive expensive cars (although cars are usually one third - a half cheaper in Johannesburg than in New Zealand) while, in contrast, it's not uncommon to see others driving horses and carts.

Moving south (open road speed limit 70 m.p.h.), one can pass through the Transkei, a partially self-governing Bantustan, or African homeland, for the Xhosa people. During July this huge area looks very barren and waterless to a New Zealander but apparently brightens up considerably when the rains come (although in the south it was only six months ago that they had their first proper rain for seven years). The people in the Transkei live mainly on money earned outside of the Transkei, bu cattle-raising, and by growing mealies (maize). The government is encouraging the establishment of secondary industries there. Occasionally, subtribal violence still breaks out.

Cape Town, in the far south, is a large city which sprawls in much the same way as Auckland. Table Mountain, flanked by some lesser peaks, dominates the city. Baboons and small deer may still be found on the mountain. Cape Peninsula is bounded on one side by the

Indian Ocean and on the other by the Atlantic so there's no shortage of beaches which are already (1st October) patronized by large crowds.

Culturally, Cape Town is quite active with many drama productions music recitals, public meetings, and sports events. Recently, 'King Lear' was produced in Afrikaans (the other official language). Poor Will! Films are usually unsophisticated by our standards and this, I imagine, reflects not only censorship but lack of competition from the, as yet non-existent, South African television service.

So far I've taught in two schools, one relieving position one permanent. The pupils are much the same as back home and very courteous indeed. If a teacher passes them when they're sitting, for instance, they'll stand, raise their hats, and greet him. Should you think that this behaviour is unworthy of a young New Zealander, let me remind you who won the international rugby series in South Africa last year! Recently, I read the school rugby results for the Cape Peninsula area - 360 teams representing more than 5,400 young sportsmen (and these are only boys of European stock).

Some of the boys carry baby grass snakes (harmless, I'm told) in their pockets and delight in giving any stray New Zealand school teachers a close introduction. (Although they don't realise it, this is the type of behaviour which destroys international relations!)

Some local laws here are rather conservative by New Zealand standards. My friends assure me that at Pretoria University women students may not smoke, wear slacks or sandles. In the Orange Free State swimming pools must close during church hours, and when they're open no couple may lie closer than two feet. (So your best bet is to hold hands in church). One of the girls' schools in Johannesburg has banned peanut butter as a sandwich filling - it is reputed (by what authority I do not know) to be sexually stimulating!

In closing, I must say that South Africa is a fascinating place, full of interesting and friendly people who feel a great deal of goodwill towards New Zealand. Some day I hope you can make it here - all of you. In

the meantime, work hard and if you want a stuffed elephant or rhinoceros for Christmas you'd better place your orders now.
