


PRINCIPAL'S COMMENT

As I savour the granting of a Woolf Fisher Fellowship for 1979 I can only feel humble and grateful. To receive an award of this magnitude must be the personal highlight of any teacher's career. In this case, however, I believe the award has been made to the school rather than the man. Building on a sound tradition of 130 years history, we have made substantial progress in the last five years. None of this could have been achieved without the loyalty and dedication of an outstanding staff. I feel too, the award recognises the success of Wesley's Conditional Integration. This major change in educational policy - the integration of a private school into the state system with an independent hostel, could not have been accomplished without the wise counselling and co-operation of the Trust Board, Board of Governors and Education Department. The fact that Wesley's agreement is being used as the basic blue print for the integration of many other private schools illustrates the success of our College.

All teachers need sabatical leave - a time for recharging the educational batteries, learning new skills and gaining fresh knowledge. I hope that my good fortune will soon be available to other teachers at our school. Mrs McDougall and I are looking forward to our three months trip to America, Great Britain and Europe with keen anticipation and we sincerely hope that the experience gained will ultimately benefit all students at Wesley College.

The school records with regret the loss of three teaching staff for 1979.

Mr Ron Teasdale has been Head of Science and senior chemistry teacher for four years. He introduced Soccer to the school and is largely responsible for the high standards being achieved in the sport. As senior master in the Junior dormitory he has assisted many young boys to settle into the boarding routine and he has been responsible for the outstanding levels realised within this area.

Mr Bob Lendrum has also served at Wesley for four years in the role of Head of Social Studies and senior geography master. With his brilliant sporting background he has made a major contribution to improving the College's standing in rugby and cricket. As master in

charge of day boys he has helped maintain the standards we expect of our non-boarding students.

Mr Bruce Reynolds has been Head of Agriculture for two years. His enthusiasm for the subject has given the course a new modern direction. The boys have really appreciated the many trips he has organised to farms and research stations. His efforts for junior rugby and hostel recreation have also been valued.

Wesley wishes our three leavers continued success in their new and deserved appointments; Mr Teasdale as H.O.D. Science at Dilworth, Mr Lendrum as H.O.D. Geography at Rosehill, and Mr Reynolds as H.O.D. Biology at Pukekohe; and thanks them for their service to our College.







Again we were woken up for keep fit lessons. After breakfast we had competition games, one group versus another for the better time. This was quite fun. After lunch we tried our hands at knots. We learnt some new knots and hitches.




TE AUTE VISIT



Nothing daunted, an intensive four day course was held at Clarks Beach during the August holidays for those who could attend. The days were spent in hourly sessions of umpiring theory interspersed with table tennis, snooker, darts and knock-about cricket....when the course members were not eating or sleeping. On the last day a different exam was sat with, as expected, a much higher standard of scripts from the students. Bruce Bricknell of the F.C.U.A. and a Shell Series umpire marked the papers and two students gained passes.

The result of the hard work was that Nigel Taylor and Graeme Raymond both gained their Franklin Player-Umpires Ticket and the rest at least a much wider knowledge of the game of cricket.


FORM 6 FARM MANAGEMENT

BOOK REVIEW - AUCKLAND TELEPHONE DIRECTORY

(Published for the Post Office by A.R. Shearer)

This is the fascinating new edition of New Zealand's greatest novel. For those already familiar with earlier versions, rest assured that this handsomely bound paperback edition has far more characters than its predecessors, which enables readers to gain a valuable, indeed a memorable, insight into the local community.

The basic plot has remained unchanged, it is true, but a more explosive opening chapter could not be found even in the great classics. Jane Austen must become green with envy (if she isn't green already) when she reads of fires, cops and ambulances, all luridly presented under the awe-inspiring chapter heading "Emergency Services".

The author (as ever anonymous) has presented us with a moving and complex picture of our times. For duller readers 'he' has generously included an exhaustive list of localities so that it is possible to check back and pin-point settings.

In the chapter entitled "Automatic Telephone" we are given a complete breakdown (!) of the myriad tones and nuances of our language, thus enabling us to reproduce the exact moods and accents of the characters. For example, one of the beautiful young ladies might be speaking in a "number unobtainable tone" to which the blaggard lover replies employing the "ringing overflow tone".

There is a strong didactic element in the novel; readers are warned that "wrong numbers result from careless dialling" and that it is essential when answering to "identify yourself" (shouldn't it be 'oneself'?). Apparently, passwords are absolutely necessary: "do not say 'Hello'".

Yes! This work is crammed full of cloak and dagger stuff.

There follow some evocative passages about making calls, party lines, joint use of a telephone and so on, but the unquestionable highlight must be the chapter "Illegal and Improper Use of the Telephone". Only those who consider themselves radicals should read this chapter. (It is understood that in more conservative parts of the country this sensational section has been 'cut').

Much of the action takes place in Auckland and it is necessary to read the text carefully to realise that Pukekohe claims its fair share of the limelight.

The subtlety of personality development is breathtaking when one considers that there are over 250,000 characters involved. This mammoth work makes the epics of Tolstoy and Solzhenitsyn look like pamphlets. The extraordinary thing is that there are no main characters as such, so that the hero of one page is replaced

rapidly by the heroine of another page. This may be all very well for scholars and English students, but must be 'mind-fuzzing' for the inflexible mathematician.

Obviously aware of this problem, the author has incorporated a unique system into the narrative so that students of even the most menial science can gain full enjoyment from its perusal. It would not be an idle boast to say that the arithmetician could understand the story line, for not only has it been written in the Queen's English but also in whole numbers! Mr J.G. Hall (and incidentally, a character in the book) when asked to comment on the novel's literary worth replied, '87-901', which is praise indeed. Mr R. Teasdale's comment, '89-903', indicates that the novel may well be around for years to come. On a more critical note, Mr J. Bradshaw stated, "Yes! I've glanced at the book from time to time but I still prefer Harold Robbins.". Despite this latter criticism, the novel must be a hot contender for Wattie's 'Book of the Year' award.

Willie as captain led by example, playing at loose-head prop and being top try scorer at the same time is proof enough.


As far as representative honours go, the 1st XV had eight players playing at different representative levels.





The Senior Relay team, comprising S. Wylie, D. Needham, K. Jennings and H. Morrison, were placed second in the final of their event.






















CONGRATULATIONS!
