Dr L.R. Bedggood M.A., B.Sc., Dip.Ed., Ph.D.(London)

It is with regret that we record the passing of one of our most distinguished Old Boys. "Dick" Bedggood attended Wesley College for two-and-a-half years from 1924. The Honours Board records that he was Dux in 1926. Among other things, he was, at various times, a farmer, school teacher, army education officer and lecturer. He was awarded a fellowship to study at the United Nations. He was a sportsman of immense talent. Dr Bedggood is survived by his wife and four children. 



When Mrs. Lorna Coker retired at the end of term I 1985 few were able to comprehend the tremendous debt of gratitude that Wesley College owed to this gracious lady. It would take the combined knowledge of the four Principals she supported as Secretary, her numerous office colleagues, the hundreds of staff, the thousands of boys and their families; to recount the story of her dedicated service as the person behind the scenes who really made the College administration work.

The office in a boarding school has many facets well beyond normal routines because the personnel deal with so many families and their children's needs. Mrs. Coker had an immense talent for remembering people and their connections—an invaluable store of personal information which benefited the College and our students.

Mrs. Coker demanded of herself, and those who worked with her, precise standards with immaculate attention to detail. When the College integrated in 1977 she took on the additional responsibility of the Board of Governor's accounts, a painstaking task which could never be faulted. It was a testimony to her accuracy that the Inspecting Accountants always praised her bookkeeping, and the College in consequence was always proud of her records.

Mrs. Coker's fortitude and boundless energy were perhaps founded in unfortunately being widowed in 1965, and then surviving a serious car smash in 1970. Lesser persons would have faltered but Mrs. Coker found extra strength to continue with her work for our school and to take pleasure in seeing her son John complete his studies at Wesley



and she now takes justifiable pride in his recognition as one of New Zealand's leading journalists.

School, alone, did not take up all of her time and the Methodist Church, she has served so faithfully in many capacities, owes her a debt of gratitude. Time never stands still for Mrs. Coker - she still continues to enjoy Art, Music, Ballet, History and gourmet delights, being a regular supporter of many societies in Auckland.

It was characteristic of Mrs. Coker that immediately following her retirement she undertook her first trip around the world and while enjoying this well-deserved reward she shared her pleasure by sending daily diary reports to her friends at home.

On behalf of all past and present associates from Wesley College may I thank Mrs. Coker for twenty—one years of committed service while personally recording my appreciation for her loyalty, support and friendship as Principal's secretary.

Those initials are synonymous with a man who for nearly twenty years has ridden all over the college campus on a two-stroke motor cycle, puffing furiously on a cigarette and with his typical English accent announcing to a would-be wrong doer the penalty he will incur should he continue his misdemeanour.

But that is only one side of the man. What will we remember John Hall for? Will it be for his early training at Nottingham University where he gained an honours degree in Maths, or his seven years as a petroleum engineer with the Kuwait Oil Co. Ltd, or perhaps for his first real adventure as an entrepreneur, running a garage in Pokeno?

How one remembers J.G. may well depend on one's interests. However this may be, there is one word that describes him and that word is "enthusiasm". In whatever field he became involved (and these were many and varied) the same enthusiasm to the ideal and organisation was apparent.

As Head of Science when he first arrived at

the college in 1966, he saw his department grow. On a limited budget in those days, J.G. used his inventive skills in the making of many pieces of useful (and not so useful) equipment. He had a craving to use blue paint and today one can still see trays and odd pieces of Physics equipment that attest to the presence of that home-handyman we call J.G.

Then came the era of "the form". As Deputy Principal from 1974 onwards, he insisted that the staff be aware of the running of the school. So we had forms for absentees, Friday Night Leave, Sunday Leave, Form Cup, breakages, maintenance, staff choices for the following year and those weekend duties. And then, so that we all know what to do, he gave us the Staff Bible which tells us even now what we do from first thing in the morning until last thing at night.

It was in his "computer era" that we saw the greatest changes. So great was his enthusiasm here that two very successful Gala Days were run on the college grounds. They were not the ordinary run-of-the-mill type galas. He got us all involved - including the Pukekohe service clubs. (It is the only time, I understand, when the Lions have beaten the Rotarians in a wheelbarrow race.)

During all this time, J.G. would be seen racing around on his faithful old bike. He knew just how fast to travel to get up the batter without stalling. He never caught any pupil doing wrong because he always heard J.G. coming.

His enthusiasm spilt over into other areas. Games like Chess and Bridge he enjoyed. He loved Afghan hounds to the extent of becoming president of the Dominion Afghan Club. J.G. stroked his pets; his wife Roz fed them. If you ever visited The Halls after a night-duty, he always offered you a coffee. The problem was - where to sit. You had to be quick to beat those dogs to a chair.

His most notable achievement in the arena of sport was the complete reorganisation of cricket both at school and at the district level. In all aspects of the administration of cricket, John Hall will be long remembered.



The letters J.G. mean more than a person. They stand for a man of many skills, a man who has gained the respect of teachers and pupils alike. In whatever field J.G. has moved, his love of life, the challenge and the shared joy of being involved, have been his "hallmarks".

With John Hall's early retirement, there will be no putting up of the feet. As has been the case in the past, another challenge awaits him. Like his horses, and dogs before, running a poultry farm will be just another extension of the many and varied aspects of this man's full life.

We thank you John Hall for being the man you are. Your friends, students, colleagues, and acquaintances will all fondly remember you as J.G.. You have earned that from the loyalty and devotion you have shown to the college, staff and pupils over the last twenty years.

EDITORIAL

To have them or not to have them? That was the question. The decision was made months ago, the agonising is over, girls are now at Wesley and it's time to count the cost. Are girls a wicked disruption to classroom discipline? Do their girlish giggles irritate beyond belief? Have they led the young men from their studies? Or do they inspire good manners and courteous behaviour? Do they stimulate classroom discussion? Do they introduce a colour and liveliness that was once missing?

Ladies and gentlemen. Girls at Wesley. The decision was made. Was it the right one or the wrong one? That is the question I would like you to consider.

Wesley College has followed illustrious counterparts in New Zealand and overseas in introducing girls to senior classes. Like Eton and Kings, it has faced criticism from a wide range of people.

There must be Old Boys who deplore the break with tradition and shudder at the thought of girls at breakfast, in Chapel, at sport or in prep. There must be present pupils who came to Wesley to escape from girls of any age and who resent the intrusion into their well-ordered lives. There must be parents who sought to send their sons to a boys' school and now find that it isn't one.

So why are girls at Wesley? There are several reasons and all of them well justified. Firstly, it is not so much a break with tradition but the re-establishment of an old one.

Wesley has had a history or sporadic invasion by girls since its inception in 1844. This time we hope they are here to stay.

To begin with, they are here because of the increasing need to provide accommodation for senior girls from a wide variety of environments. Right now there are girls here from Tonga, from Tokelau, from the Solomons, from Fiji and from many parts of New Zealand.

Here 6th and 7th form girls can receive an excellent education. They can share in the tradition that has made Wesley a school hundreds of boys over the years have been proud of.

Secondly, girls are here because it is important for young men and women to learn to work with each other, talk to each other and help each other.

The world out there has approximately fifty percent of both males and females and while we don't have that ratio here, at least we are making the transition from school to adult life more realistic.

We can look back and reflect on the changes so far. Senior boys report both good and bad. They care more about their appearance. Gone are the greys and trendy gear is in. Styling mousse is now in Caughey Hall. Their language has improved and they behave better in class, or so they say.

On the other hand they are jealous of each other and somewhat jealous of "the McDougall girls" who seem to have all the privileges.

Some of them have discovered that they blush, that they are self conscious and that being beaten by a girl in swimming or maths isn't much fun. They question the girls being first into the dining room. And some of them can't accept that the younger ones might have big sisters as well as big brothers.

Now we come to the girls. They don't complain at all - there are only 22 of them against 330 boys. They certainly don't complain about their beautiful hostel or being excused from dining room duty.

To some extent the novelty has worn off now. Not so many boys rush to open doors but they still believe that being treated like a lady tends to make them act like one.

It is not all easy though. It is not easy to be the first ones to be on trial - to be continually assessed and sometimes to be found wanting.

The responsibility for over coming the doubts of the doubters and the scoffs of the scoffers is often a heavy one. It is not very easy either to cope with being so conspicuous or to overcome the feeling of being just a little on the outside. Like the boys, the girls have had to do their share of adjusting.

So too have the staff. Any decision has its opponents and there must have been teachers who dreaded the thought of girls at Wesley. Perhaps they chose to teach here because there were no girls. Perhaps they loathed the thought of girls who notoriously argue and question. Perhaps there are some who even now feel the whole idea is a pointless experiment doomed to failure.

There is no doubt in my mind that the decision to have girls was the right one I'm a Wesley girl and I'm proud to be one. I hope that we Wesley girls can make the rest of the school as proud of us as we are of them.

CAMPS

Te Mata Youth Camp was again, the setting for the forth form camps which have settled into a pattern of proven activities. The seclusion and conveniences of this campsite make it ideal for our needs.

Ten days before the camps started we were able to take a team of boys down to the camp to assist with some cleaning up, follwoing the intense flooding in the area. The owners are very grateful for this assistance. However as the camp has been sensibly sited on high ground there was no structural damage apart from the demolition of the pumpshed, despite an estimated rise in the river height of around thirty feet.

Parent support was not as great as in some previous years, but what we had was of good quality, all parents showing a willingness to join in all of the activities. Mr Ernie Lepper again gave stirling support in the first camp, but was unable to attend the second as he had volunteered to assist with a $\mathsf{F6}$ camp.

Some upgrading of the camp is evident, in the form of the painting inside and out of most buildings and the repair of shower roses etc.

Generally there is noticeable growth of the bushes etc. both in the camp and on the tramps at Te Mata and Waiomu. Where we used to be able to see out from the track, or see the slips and trailings near mines, manuka has grown up to obscure them. A couple of dry seasons may change this but with no livestock in the area, this is not likely.

Repeatedly dreadful reminders of the February flood came to our notice. The devastation in the forest, although perhaps not as dramatic, is more permanent than that around the homes of the unfortunate residents of the area.

I would like to thank the College Administration for allowing three teachers to attend each camp. It made a great deal of difference to us all.

Both classes of students made excellent efforts to co-operate. This year's camps were outstanding in that at both no evidence of smoking by the students was encountered at any time.

ACTIVITIES:

<u>Competition</u> between squads aims to encourage co-operation and participation in physical and skill activities. Over the years we have developed a range of activities which not only test their co-operative skills but also use their excess energy, which means we all sleep better at night.

Orientation consisting mostly of night walks in the immediate neighbourhood of the camp. Some elementary star studies and some map and compass work to identify the distant lights seen from up on the ridge.

<u>Tramping</u> (a) back through the farm to the forest park, and from there down into the Te Mata river and back to camp.

(b) On the waiomu and Puhoi streams and over the ridge between them. This is the locality of several old mine shafts which yielded samples of rock crystal "fools gold" and other minerals. They are also habitation of cave wetas, cave spiders and glow-worms which we stalked and photographed.

<u>Self cooked meals</u> this year we made more opportunity for parts of meals to be cooked by the students themselves, which provided to be popular. As well as helping with the hangis, the students also had opportunity to assist with preparation and consumption of an Indian meal.

<u>Identification of common native trees and shrubs</u> most of the major species are represented at the campsite, and fine specimens are evident in the forest.

One of the most notable events of the camps was the finding of an ancient Maori artifact, a Ko, in the silt of the Te Mata river, well upstream from the camp. We have endeavoured to follow protocol in regard to this find so that the best interests of the College and the local Maori people are protected. We look forward to any information about the dating and origins of the Ko, that may come from the Auckland Museum, whose assistance has been enlisted. I would like to thank all those who have helped to make the camps so successful, which must include not only those who came out to assist with them, but also those who remained behind and supported us from College.

A rare Maori artefact find was made in the Te Matastream, north of Tapu this week.

A ko, a carved stick used to loosen the soil of kumara beds, was lying just beneath the surface of the stream. It was found on Tuesday by Andrew

Tuesday by Andrew Waa, one of a party of boys staying at the youth camp.

Andrew was crossing the stream about 1km from the camp site and saw the head end of the ko. He recognised it as similar to one hanging in his school's library.

The school's Maori teacher Te Whare Tutuwhenua said the instrument deserved the particular attention of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research.

They could only speculate as to the date of the ko, but believed it could be pre-European.

Soon after the find, the group contacted a local Maori elder for his thoughts on the ko.

One of the paramount chiefs of the Ngati Tamatera, Huhurere Tukukino, said the ko was in excellent condition, but he was concerned it would deteriorate quickly as it dried out. February's flood probably bought the ko to the surface, he said.

He was pleased for the boys and the local people about the find and said the boys should take it back to their school to show their friends.

Mr Tukukino has been assured the ko will be returned to the local people.

Prefects

In a boarding school such as this, prefects are expected not only to assist in running the school but also to act or assume the role of an elder or parent to the younger boys. It is not an easy task as much work is involved and great personal sacrifice of time is customary. The leadership was taken up this year by elected persons, namely: C. Brown (Head Prefect), P. Koro (Deputy Head), G. Beck, D. Kaleopa, S. Bailey, T. Linford, W. Tanielu, C. Cheeseman, M. Narawa, G. TeWhare, A. Clark, B. Kimpton, and in addition the first three girl prefects: A. Poznanski (Head Girl), T. Turuwhena, and C. McKersey.

The school seemed young this year (whether I've got noticeably older, or that the 'old' guys have all left I'm not sure), and this change seems to have had quite a marked effect on school life. I found the big change was in the attitude of the boys, particularly seniors. (Perhaps it could be related to the appearance of girls at Wesley - who can say). Without going into detail, the bottom line is that I feel the different attitude has made prefects duties and burdens just that much easier to deal with. e.g. Those punished for doing wrong recognised who was to blame and didn't kick back. However, it was still disappointing that events such as theft and indoor-smoking kept cropping up.

Unfortunately discipline was not given out equally as prefects found it difficult to treat everyone the same, particularly with the girl students. Understandably, there was an element of uncertainty - but that should not warrant special favours. I expect, as years progress, this will quickly fade out as future prefects have our experiences to judge their actions by.

New staff once again crowd the staffroom - in particular I would like to draw attention to Mr. Grinter, the new Deputy Principal, who has fitted in well, comfortably asserting himself in the College life. He has worked closely with the prefects on numerous occasions, improving on the discipline/punishment aspects of our tasks. Also a hearty thanks to Mr. J.G. Hall who has moved out of this position to spend more time with his chicken farm, and remaining classes. His "sewing machine" will be sadly missed.

Two very successful functions were held by seniors - a social and a mini ball, both organised by prefects and seniors. The ball, especially, was a great experience for many - I think we haven't held one at Wesley for about five years. Thanks to the group who spent hours on decorations and arrangements, I'm sure you were satisfied with the favourable results. We also had seniors attending dances held by: Auckland Girls', Te Kauwhata, Queen Victoria, Epsom Girls', McCauley, Rosehill, St. Cuthbert's, and Baradene.

I would like to extend thanks to the teaching staff for their support and encouragement throught the year; to Mr. McDougall for guiding me through "sticky" patches; Messrs. Hall and Grinter for ironing out my relatively petty administrative problems; to the office ladies for keeping my paper work up to date without complaint; and to the dormitory prefects for controlling and teaching the young kids our Wesley ways. Finally I say thanks to my fellow prefects for making my job so much easier. Your combined efforts have helped to make my last year a good one - I sincerely hope you get as much out of the College as I have. Thank you all very much.

This year we spent most of our time teaching the many inexperienced members of our club all our waiata, waiata-ringa, and haka. Unlike previous years the bulk of this group needed a large number of practices to build up its confidence in preforming. This was because of the many new boys and girls, in particular those that have never ever experienced such items. Take for example the island girls, no previous Maori cultural experience, yet they didn't hesitate to learn. Not only that - they taught us parts of their culture too.

Many times we had to perform with short notice - often throwing members into disarray. This has happened in the past and is no one's fault in particular. In a way it is good because they are not major events, but they give new members an opportunity to practice.





A PUPIL GOES HOME

After two years of living abroad, I returned to my hometown Yaren, a small village on Nauru. Since my arrival on a Sunday morning, my relatives had followed me everywhere, asking curious questions about life overseas. So that afternoon I decided to take a quiet walk to get away from my excited relatives for a little while.

I did not remember much of the village, but being a small village, it was not necessary to worry about losing my way. The village had only one main street which ended about a hundred paces from a small dock. The silence of the street was constantly disrupted by shrieks of laughter from children and cries from various animals. The houses, made of coconut leaves and tree branches, were all about ten metres apart on either side of the earth road, most of them having a little decorated shelter over their front doors. Women sat in small clusters under the shelters, busily continuing with their daily chores of cooking, sewing and weaving. They paused as I passed by to give me warm smiles. Now and then a child would cross my path, carrying a large jar or mat, probably on an errand. The male section of the village were nowhere to be seen, I suppose they were still out in the fields.

The small docks gradually came into view as I neared the end of the street, but when I reached the end of the village something else temporarily caught my attention. To my right was a group of children aged three to five, happily falling around in a large pool of mud created my a dripping tap nearby. Their small brown bodies were almost camouflaged in the mud, nevertheless they seemed to be having a great time.

Finally, I diverted my attention to the dock and continued. At the dock a wooden platform ran out twenty yards from the grassy bank. Two old fishing boats were left there after the war, and as I walked onto the platform I observed how the fishing nets were spread out to dry on the sand below, the tides were low. At the bottom of the platform I sat down, and jumped off onto the sand. About a few metres away from the platform, I lay on the sand to watch the sun's rays glare out into an array of colours. It was only then that I realised that my intentionally short quiet walk had turned to be longer than I had expected. But I did not mind. The welcoming, homely, peaceful and quiet atmosphere of my hometown, would not have been complete without the beautiful sunset.






