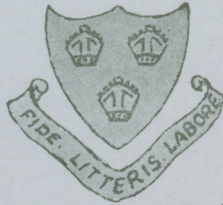

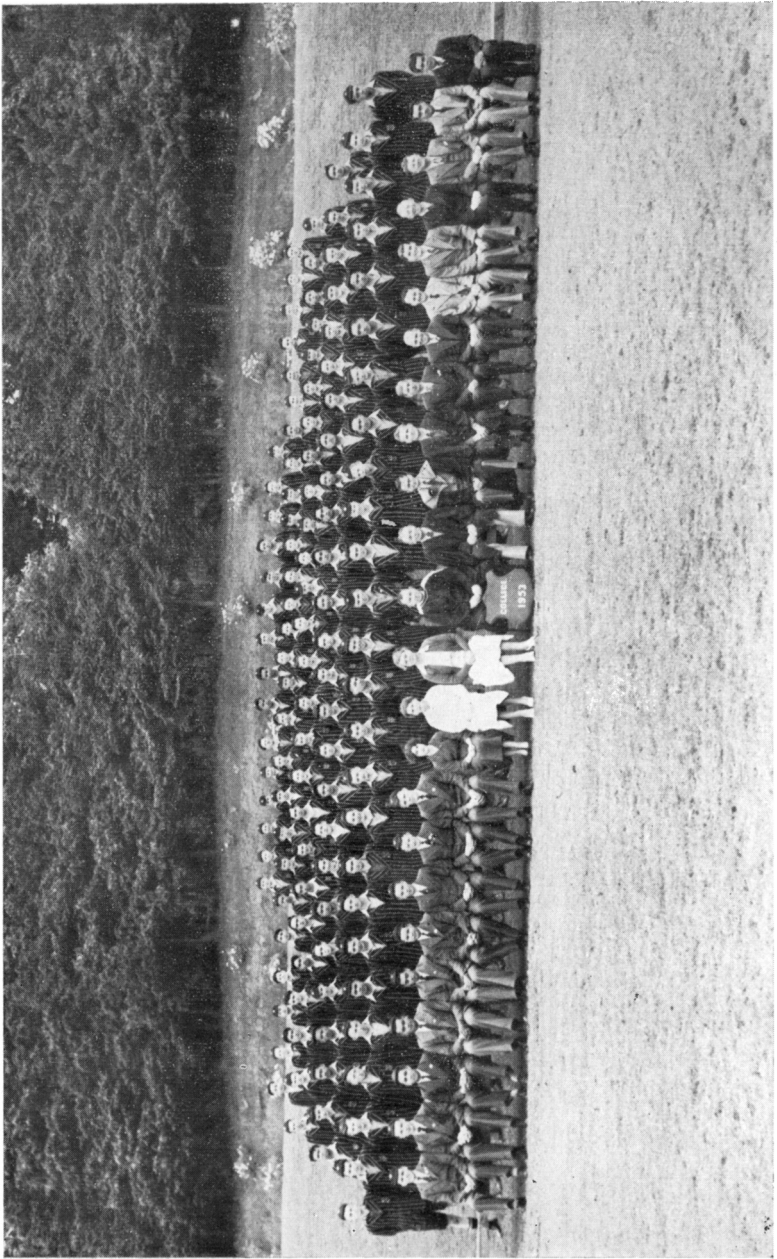

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## FOREWORD.

In this introduction to our little Magazine I should like to comment on the progress that has been made in the College over the past ten years, for it is now ten years since we took over after the Military Occupation. Although we had to begin with an empty school, grounds that had become almost unrecognisable in their untidiness, buildings and equipment that were below standard, we nevertheless had much in our favour. There were stalwarts on the staff who had been loyal through the hard and lean years; there was a tradition which had already grown up with the years, and on this we could build if we had a mind to work.

And work we did. The decade has seen the Board of Governors, under the successive chairmanship of Mr. (now "Justice") Stanton, the late Mr. Tyler, and now Mr. J. S. Caughey, leading the Wesley College Trust from financial difficulty to a state of such financial freedom that it has been able to enlarge, improve, and maintain adequately the College at Paerata. The Roll now stands at its highest, 138 Boarders; and it is our earnest hope that in the foreseeable future we shall be able to increase this still more. Fine class-rooms have been erected, a first-class sports field has been made, the kitchen has been modernised, and plans are out for an Assembly-Recreation Hall.

But during the ten years we have done a good deal more than bring the material conditions up to a satisfactory standard, and enrol many more pupils than in the past. The Curriculum has been altered, the Courses of instruction have been widened, the Church takes its rightful place in our community, the Old Boys' Association has grown to be a source of help and encouragement, the school has gone out into the community with pride and welcomed visitors from far and near with pleasure.

This is the only Methodist College in New Zealand. It should be twice the size it is; and there should be a girls' school of a similar type to do for the girls of New Zealand what we are trying to do for boys, no matter of what race. Through the magnificent generosity of people in other days we have been able to grow and to establish ourselves as a school that holds a worthy

place amongst other schools in this country. When our people are aware of what can be done, and their imagination is stirred by the possibilities inherent in Church Boarding School education, there will not be wanting other helpers; and the Methodist Church will be able to do so much more in Christian education than we can do in our small way at Paerata.

*The Roll* has reached its maximum during the year. We have reached 138, but it has been decided to reduce this to a maximum of 130 until it is possible to make more dormitory space available.

*The Health* of the boys has been very good. A measles epidemic in the Third Term laid low a number, but the sickness was not severe, and the boys were soon up and about. Accidents have been few, although it is regrettable that at the end of the football season one boy received a broken leg, and another a broken wrist.



*Extensions and Improvements*

The Board, following the policy begun some years ago of bringing the College up to standard in modern equipment, and of extending accommodation wherever possible, has this year spent considerable amounts of money in modernising the kitchen, installing a modern laundry unit, providing metal lockers for the dormitories, improving the tennis courts and building sheep-yards and a new concrete woolshed. A grant was made for extensions to the Library, and a promise has been made to assist in the purchase of a Radiogram in the near future.

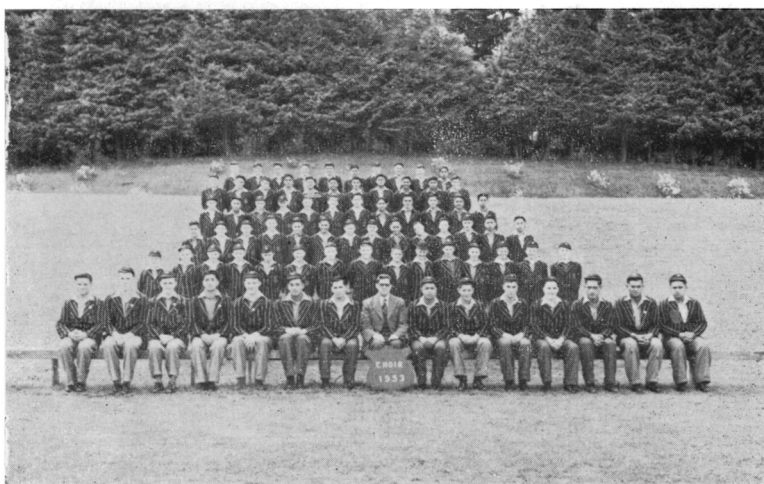

This continues to flourish, the superintendent being Miss P. Marshall, assisted by her sister, Jennifer. As in other years, the children have met at 11 a.m. each Sunday morning, and at the afternoon Carol Service at the end of the year have presented a tableau. During the year they have a party in the grounds, with games, treasure-hunt, and tea.

*The Bible Class*

This has been conducted with the whole school by the Principal on Sunday afternoons, with the singing of hymns and a short talk. In the Third Term Mr. Barnitt has taken the Juniors and Mr. Marshall the Seniors.

*The Divinity Class*

This has numbered 17 during the year. There have been two Bands in it taking services in the Pukekohe Circuit from time to time. Subjects taken have included Homiletics and Theology (using Hunter's "What a Christian Believes and Why"). The Easter Service in the Chapel was conducted by the Principal, the address being given by the Rev. W. Sylvester, recently returned from the Solomon Islands.

## EASTER CAMP.

The Boys' Brigade Camp site at Orewa was again the venue of the Methodist Young Men's Bible Class Camp.

Twenty Wesley boys enjoyed the fellowship of other secondary schoolboys who were interested in living the Christian way of life.

One new feature on the programme was the "Workshop," when campers were divided into groups for research work on the Bible. Each group built up a chart showing their findings, which were summarised orally by the group leader when all the groups came together.

Another new feature was the dramatization of the trial of Jesus along the lines of present-day court procedure with counsel and witnesses for the prosecution and defence.

Our Camp Padre, Rev. Allan Carr, conducted these innovations, assisted by Trinity College students.

A pilgrimage to the Cross was also held, thus helping campers to enter into the spirit of Easter.

We listened intently on Sunday morning to Mr. George Yearbury telling of his experiences as a mission carpenter in the Solomon Islands.

Wesley was well represented in the sports. Terry Hemi tied for first place for the Herbert Smith Junior Sports Cup, and Wesley also won the Riddell Cup for gaining the most points in all sports. Tukiri won the Junior Steeplechase.

The Maori items, given by Wesley in the Camp concert, were again appreciated by the audience.

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## SCHOOL HOUSE, 1953.

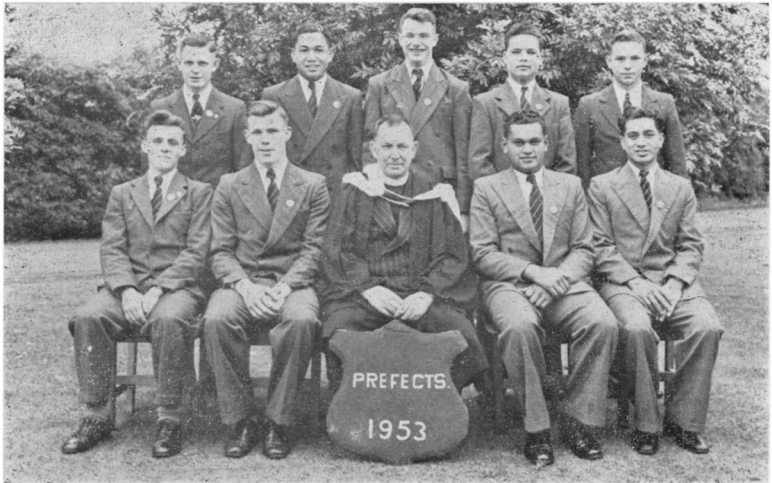
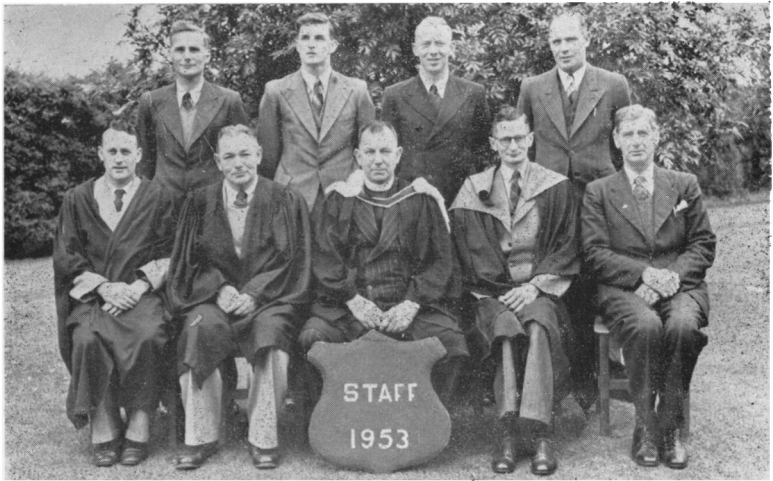

## ART NOTES.

Art this year has been of a fairly high standard. The amount of work that has been produced, considering the shortage and quality of materials, was a credit to the students.

The sound tuition by Mr. S. Wilson in the handling of paints has also helped a great deal. Because of this, the colour changes (tone) and draughtsmanship have been of high standard, especially in the higher forms.

This year there are eight students entering for their School Certificate Exam. in Art. The tendency is towards Individualism, and it is very prominent because of the fact that the students are expressing their emotional feeling through the medium of paint.

The classes have been arranged in three-quarter and one-hour periods: 4.30-5.15 p.m., 6.10-7.10 p.m., for Fourth, Fifth, Sixth Forms; 7.10-8.10 p.m. for Forms III, I, II.

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SCOUT NOTES, 1953.

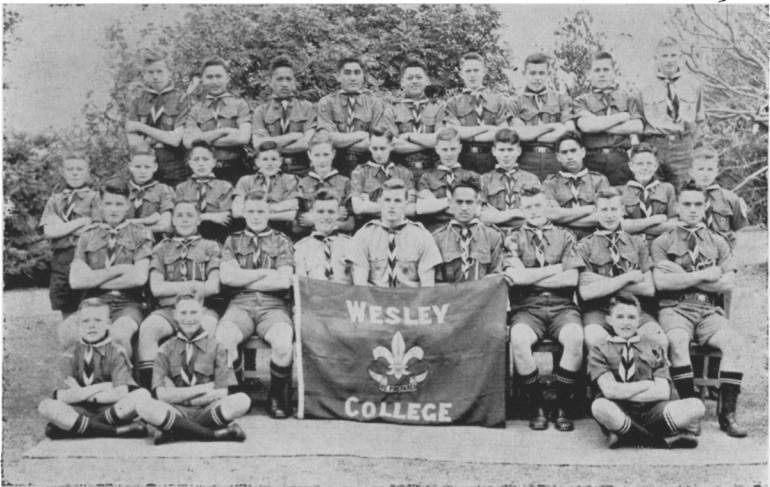

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#### FARM NOTES, 1953.

We can at last report that the spray-dip and sheep-yards are completed and the wool-shed finished except for internal work. As there may be some disbelievers, we are having a photo included in this issue of the Magazine. The framework of the shed is

steel, the walls are in hollowstone block, as also are all the yards, with concrete floors. We used the dip last March, and to those who have doubts we are glad to say that we found it 100% effective. Remember the days of the old swim bath? Those were the days! One wondered if the sheep were being dipped or the boys.

The dairy herd has had a record year and the College young stock are in great demand. Unregistered heifers have made up to £52 in Pukekohe and three-day-old calves to £6. We also started A. I. through Ruakura Research Station this season.

We still have some Drysdale sheep from the original strain, but Dr. Dry has branched out in a new line with 12 ewes which are in our care. The original were bred direct from Stud Romneys, but now a Lincoln strain has been introduced. According to the Doctor's report, the experiment is proving very satisfactory and there is every possibility of his aim being achieved.

Much discussion has centred around Agricultural Secondary Schools during recent months. Many seem to have forgotten or do not realise that, when the first school was founded at Feilding, the object was to give back-country boys the advantage of a secondary school education and, whilst being away from their homes, they were still amongst livestock. A homesick boy can always go and have a look at the cows and sheep and so take his mind off his new surroundings. Imagine if he were in the city! He also has the advantage of learning modern methods of farming whilst completing his education. When his school days are over he is usually urgently required on the farm and has little opportunity to further his study.

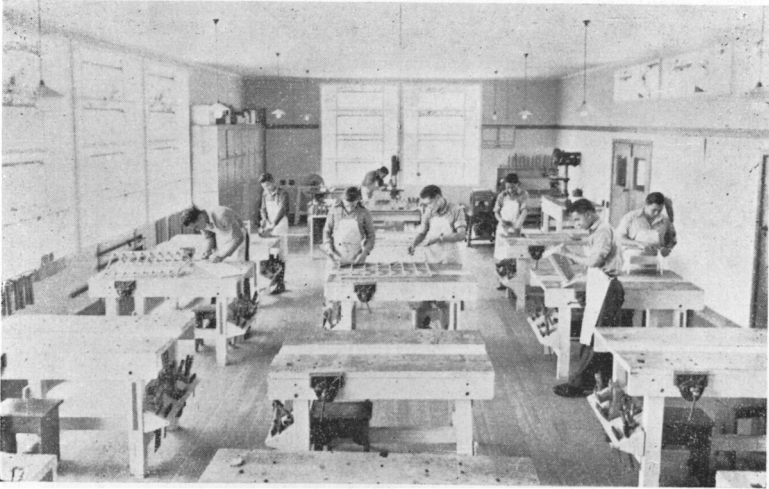

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### SWIMMING REPORT, 1953.

Swimming this year has again reached a high standard, the coaching being in the able hands of Mr. Lloyd, the master-in-charge.

Teams of approximately twelve have been entering in the carnivals of the Pukekohe Swimming Club. Many of these carnivals have been on a handicap basis, and the team has therefore had a better chance of success than they would have had, had they all be on a championship basis.

The highlight of the season was the visit of the two Olympic swimmers, Miss Jean Stewart and Lincoln Hurring, to the Pukekohe Club's Carnival on March 4th; where they swam in several events and gave a demonstration. On the following day thirty of the school went to a special demonstration at Pukekohe Baths, where much was learnt.

In the Championship Carnival held on Wednesday, 25th March, the team did very well, the outstanding swimmers being Chauvel (1st Intermediate 50yds. Breaststroke); Schmitt (1st Junior Boys' 50yds. Backstroke, 3rd Junior Boys' 50yds Freestyle); Tonga I (2nd Senior 100yds. Freestyle, 100yds. Backstroke and 50yds. Freestyle); and Donald (2nd Intermediate Boys' 50yds. Freestyle, 100yds. Freestyle and 50yds. Backstroke). Both the Primary and the Secondary School relay teams won their events.

In the South Auckland Secondary Schools Annual Championships, held on March 24th at Pukekohe Baths, the School club did quite well, there being spirited competition and some excellent swimming. ## MR. BARNITT'S TOUR ABROAD.

It is with much pleasure that we print Mr. Barnitt's necessarily brief account of this trip overseas. He left New Zealand in December, 1952, and returned to take up his duties in September, 1953. Mr. Barnitt first came on to the teaching staff at the College in 1946, is Senior House Master in School House, and has contributed a great deal to the life of the school—in Football, Tennis, Library, and Chapel. We were glad that he had this opportunity to travel, and are glad to have him back with us.

Mr. Barnitt writes:—

Who can express the enjoyment and the rich, varied experiences of a brief holiday in Great Britain, Europe, and South Africa? How may I thank those who made it possible?

Here are a few vivid memories: Clubland, a Methodist Youth Club, opened by Her Majesty the late Queen Mary in 1939; destroyed in 1941; restored by such donors as Thomas Dewey, Governor of New York; Cecil B. de Mille, Paramount Chief, Hollywood; Bob Hope (£14,000); Sir Laurence Olivier; F. R. Brown, English Cricket Test Captain.

We were enraptured by all these plays: "Richard II (Sir John Gielgud); "Waters of the Moon" (Dame Sybil Thorndyke); "Escapade," by Roger MacDougall, which broke all records at the St. James's Theatre; "The Merchant of Venice" at Shakespeare's Theatre, Stratford-on-Avon; "Shadow and Substance," by Paul Vincent Carrol in Dublin.

English Cathedrals witness to the reality of the Unseen God. The Churches in Great Britain still hold the people in their leadership of the world. In Westminster Central Hall (Methodist) we listened with nearly 3,000 to Rev. Michael Scott and Canon Collins, Lady Pakenham, an eloquent Welsh M.P., Victor Golancz and Nontando Jabavu as they spoke on "Africa Crisis."

At Methodist International House (for students) in London, Mr. Fashade, a young Nigerian, surveyed the Christian Youth Conference in India, where Mr. Rua Rakena, an old boy, represented New Zealand.

The soap-box orators in Hyde Park surpassed expectations. Dr. Donald Soper, President of British Methodism, in fine weather spoke to thousands. With rollicking humour and a quarter of a century's experience, he has the crowd with him. With questions and interjections flying, his dynamic oratory and knowledge of

religion, people, history and world affairs make superb entertainment. With no charge, it was a Scotsman's Paradise.

Months would need to be years, to see London. But we did see the Coronation from a New Zealand stand in Hyde Park, and later T.V., radio and film versions. The naturalness of the Royal Family captured the imagination of the world. Indeed, it may well be a turning point in history.

A Prefect, whose Grandfather and mine lived next to each other in Saltash, Devon, showed me over Kingswood. It was the first Methodist school, being founded by John Wesley himself. It has about eighteen Honours Boards and has a record for Church and Public Service hardly surpassed by any other school in England. Sir Arthur J. Rank had given a block of four fine permanent classrooms. Dr. Moore, lecturer in Modern Languages, St. John's Oxford, father of a Prefect, took the morning service. He spoke of his visit to Africa, of Livingstone, and of the challenge of Christ to help the native races of the world.

I must mention this: On the few occasions when I heard boys' choirs, there was none to equal Wesley at its best. Mr. Laurie, we thank you.

At Freundschaftsheim, near Hanover, we stayed with Rev. Les Hayman. He had been with a New Zealand C.O.R.S.O. team in Greece; then with the Methodist Church in Poland, and now, under Pastor Mensching, is in charge of this Friendship Home for Youth.

Bad Pyrmont was a beautiful town of 8,000 people. Now it has 20,000 refugees evenly distributed in the houses. The engraving of the "Quaker Haus" in the Library shows the building in which Herr Ernst Reuter, the late Mayor of Berlin, was so greatly influenced.

In Kassel we stayed with American Brethren, who with others had sent relief, including heifers, to Europe and Japan. It was of them that "Heifer Honeymoon" in a recent Readers' Digest was written.

Most interesting were visits to the Headquarters of the International Voluntary Work Camps for Peace. In Geneva the offices were with the World Council of Churches; in Paris with U.N.E.S.C.O.

In Melbourne, I greatly appreciated meeting Mr. Frederick, the Headmaster of Wesley College (700 boys). Three hundred had been working at the Methodist Peace Memorial Children's

Home. The school had been rebuilt through the generous gift of £200,000 by an Old Boy, the Manager of "Aspro." I confess I envied the swimming baths I saw here and in England. They were filtered and heated, for use all the year. What an asset they would be for us, a boarding school in the country!

I am sure some from Wesley could also have this grand experience, if they planned for it and saved for it. Incredible, perhaps, but of many I met from N.Z. three had all helped at the Pestalozzi Children's Village, Switzerland. It was built for war orphans to train children for peace and goodwill among nations. Far behind all superficial differences, families are the same the world over.
