World renown, as Micah's theme on the core values of God, in being a just citizen' it is the introduction to our School prayer and the preface to the core values that founder of our Methodist faith, John Wesley calls us to be, as we recite with passion daily.

It is with a sense of sadness and thanksgiving that I am asked to pen my thoughts for the Collegian Editorial, as I prepare to leave for a second time my beloved alma mater (1980 -1984). To have ticked off the proverbial bucket list, having now taught at my old School is a highlight of my teaching career. Returning to Wesley College in 2008 marked my ninth school to have taught at, since I commenced my teaching service in 1988. I head to St Patrick's Catholic School, Taumaranui with the knowledge of nine different cultural capitals. I wish to set the record straight before you turn the page of this Collegian to think this is the seeds of my future memoir. On the absolute contrary; rather, I wish to pen my thoughts on what it is to be a Wesleyan.

This year has seen the passing of many former staff members, Pauline McDougal, Edith Appleby, Matua Dennis Cassidy and students my old mate Wilisoni Kurisaqila, and of particular note the untimely death of Jonah Tali Lomu (1975 -2015) as I write this editorial. I recall saying at the memorial service for Jonah, that he was a student indebted to Wesley College, for his life turnaround. I described his possible wish for all Wesley College students is that he came from the streets of adversity, and goes forth from Wesley to make a difference, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, to all the people you can.

It is well documented by many writers the streets of adversity; it is nothing new. However I wish to share my thoughts on why Wesley College can be a magnet for change. In my time back at Wesley, I have witnessed Sekope Kepu, Metusela Toso, Aaron Samuel, Jonah Lomu and many more who have attested as to what a difference Wesley has made on their lives. I wish to add myself to that illustrious company and unmask what it is to be a Wesleyan.

I parallel the leaving of the `streets of adversity` with the recount of when Moses fled to Midian, in the forty years he lived away from the might of the oppressive heat of slavery that his people endured under the Egyptians. Within a barren desert Wesley became the form of a rural oasis in Paerata, atop Puhitahi hill, from the distractions of social and family dysfunctionality that led me by force as opposed to by choice to Wesley College. The rural environment over the five years allowed me to rediscover myself, my faith and reflect on the false idols instead of the focus once placed in God. My time then as a student, was a chance to refocus the milestones in my life from 1980 onwards and choose to devote a life to gangs, or hear where God was calling me to. It was a significant turning point, having spent time as a boarder here over 30 years ago. The pleasing outcome is writing this editorial as a member of staff. As with Moses, the forty years away from Egypt, allowed him to read the signs of God, calling him to come from out of the wilderness, and lead his people out to freedom.

The rest they say is history. I attribute the environment, and its geographic locality, as a major factor in building the cultural capital that is Wesley College. The five years allowed me to refocus my life's compass, set a course to make a difference and to turn around from the streets of adversity, to a pathway of success in the light of Christ. I will miss driving up the main front drive, the sight of the grand playing fields, the Chapel and the pre 1980s classrooms; they are the familiar sights and smells of Wesley College that I will never forget. I am grateful to Reverend Ian Faulkner who employed me as a fixed term reliever then eventually, as a member of staff in 2008. Thanks Ian for having faith in my abilities to contribute to Wesley College

To my old School teachers, Warrick Sanson, Richard Smythe, and for a brief time until he retired John Cheeseman; it has been a real privilege to teach alongside you, and to count you as personal friends. I wonder if that is what Sekope, Jonah, Junior, Malia, Mele, Sione, Tevita, Metu, MJ, JP, Beanie, Tema and so many former students thought?

I know Stephen `Gaga` Autagavaia truly believes it took me away from the streets of adversity. AUTST (1980 – 1984)

PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS

■ Mr Norman Johnson, Reverend Diana Tana, President Tovia, Vice President Arapera, Ariki Tamaroa Whatumoana , honoured guests, members of the Board of Trustees, members of the Wesley College Trust Board, hostel and teaching staff, parents and students and friends of the College – welcome.

I want to pause for a moment and acknowledge the passing of Jonah Lomu. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family and those closest to him. In Jonah's life there are many lessons for us all - how to take a talent and nurture it through hard work and dedication, how to triumph over adversity, resilience, compassion and humility. Wesley College and Jonah Lomu are synonymous and the school will take time to decide upon an appropriate tribute to his memory. The end of the year is a time to look back and reflect. To see where we have done well, where we could have done better and to consider what we might do differently next time around.

Among the many things we have done well is the great work to receive an encouraging report from the Education Review Office. The ERO report endorses the work of the staff, students and Board in lifting school performance. Other highlights include the winning Tongan group performances at the Polyfest, the Under 15 rugby team winning the national tournament in Dunedin for the first time, and the 1st XIII League team winning the National development competition and, of course, the many students who have already gained Level One, Two or Three NCEA. Individual students from school have starred at provincial and national level at league, rugby, weightlifting and swimming. Our

students continue to draw praise for their contribution to community events and tutoring of cultural activities in local schools. The singing in chapel every morning has been a highlight for me and many others.

This year we have had two areas of focus that aim to support student attainment. They are; having students ready to learn and teachers improving their practice.

By having students ready to learn we will see improved attendance and punctuality for school and classes. We expect students to be organised. Students need to come to class with their books, their own bag and pens and their homework done. Through academic mentoring students are encouraged to take ownership of their learning and to have a sense of purpose as they work toward their academic goals. This amounts to students being self-disciplined.

To support students in getting ready to learn we have the services of an excellent Chaplaincy and counselling team, a dedicated staff in the Health Centre, subject choice and career advice, clearly expressed behavioural expectations and a dedicated team of teaching and hostel staff.

By 'teachers improving their practice' we mean that staff are working to build relationships with students and to have high expectations. Each staff member works on a professional inquiry into an area of their practice to develop their skills. This has been supported by a robust appraisal process and professional learning to support that process.

So, students are expected to be ready to learn and teachers are working to improve their practice. We cannot



ignore the third and vital element of the achievement triangle - the partnership with family. We ask that families support their children by providing uniform, books and stationery and ensuring full and punctual attendance. The ERO visit identified our low attendance rate after weekends and holidays as an issue to be improved. In return, families please know that we are always available to speak to you about your child - either in person, over the phone or by email. It is by working together we will get the best results for our students.

What we will do differently next year?

ERO has endorsed our focus on academic achievement and that will remain our top priority. Students who leave school without academic qualifications are more likely to suffer poor outcomes in life – to be unemployed, suffer poor health and end up in prison. Academic attainment is not a guarantee to future success but without it the path is much, much harder.

Next year will see the arrival of junior girls at Wesley College. The Trust Board has a vision of a fully co-educational school where girls of secondary school age benefit from the same opportunities that have been provided to boys. Enrolments at year 9 in particular, have been very pleasing.

Next year we will begin the Positive Behaviour for Learning programme, more commonly known as PB4L. This will see staff and students working together to actively teach and learn the behaviours required for positive learning outcomes. This programme is run in many schools in New Zealand

and overseas with proven benefits to student attainment.

We will be without the services of some current staff members. Hugh Laurenson leaves us to take up a position at The Manurewa High School after 3 years in our English and Social Sciences departments. We thank him for his work in class and also for his contribution to the music and cultural life of the school. Michael Cox leaves us after 5 years as our Head of Music. Michael is a renowned organist and we thank him for his work with bands, vocal and instrumental groups. Steve Autagavaia leaves us to take up the roll of principal at St. Patricks School in Taumaranui. Steve, a former senior prefect, has made a huge contribution to the sporting, spiritual and cultural life of the school over the last eight years. St. Patricks have been chasing Steve to be their principal for a couple of years and their gain will be our loss and certainly means we have a big gap to fill in every sense of the word.

Before I close I would like to thank the staff for their work this year. The success of our school rests with us, the staff, and I thank you for your continued efforts to lift the performance of our school.

I wish everyone a safe and relaxing Christmas break, an enjoyable time with family and friends and a prosperous new year.

It was never going to be an easy task to pick an U15 team from Wesley College with a school that has an abundance of talent within Trials were held at St its ranks. A TRIBUTE TO JONAH LOMU



onah arrived at Wesley in 1989 as a year 9 student rather reluctant to leave his suburban life in Mangere. He quickly adapted to life at the College. After school; if he didn't wish to remain bored; he had the option to train at either Rugby or Rugby. Occasionally, athletics and swimming would be on the agenda. As his dormitory supervisor he asked me if he could bring training equipment and place it alongside his bed in the adjacent vacant cubicle. This he duly did. He set himself a very rigorous training programme which he adhered to every day. Jonah was, at times, a loner and would not permit himself to be swayed from his set goals to self-train.

Mr. Chris Grinter; the DP and 1st XV coach at the time saw promise in Jonah and promoted him to this team whilst still a junior. This put Jonah in a difficult situation. He was seen as an upstart by the seniors and was now no longer mixing with his junior peers. Jonah struggled with this social schism; as indeed did the rest of the College. However, Mr. Grinter saw Jonah's exceptional prowess as an athlete and a rugby player and managed Jonah in all aspects with expert precision.

Jonah was our top athlete, holding many records for many years; many of which still stand. He became our local Counties superstar. Having said this; off the field we saw a very different person. Where other seniors failed to show heart to some of our smaller juniors; Jonah was always there to put his enormous arm around distressed Juniors and to offer comfort. He befriended many juniors and all felt they could, and did, approach him. He was always kind; never shouted and had words to turn away wrath. This we could all see in Jonah's later compassion as an adult with his many charities.

Jonah lived the example to be caring, compassionate yet steadfast and resolute to achieve his goals. As he always used to say, "If you want something bad enough, only you can stop it". Rest in peace Jonah and may God comfort your family and also a few of us now long in the tooth teachers who had the honour to share a part of your life.
