



Welcome.

Mr Norman Johnston, Reverend Diana Tana, members of the Board of Trustees and the Wesley College Trust Board, President of the Methodist Church Reverend Prince, special guests, hostel and teaching staff, parents, students, past students and friends – good evening and welcome to our senior prize giving ceremony.

Prize giving is always a significant and special event – one which I really look forward to. We come together as a school community to celebrate the achievements of our students and acknowledge prize winners. We also formally draw the senior school year to an end and farewell our Year 13 students.

Senior prize giving is also an opportunity for a school's principal to comment on issues facing the school and the wider education sector.

Tonight I will comment on two issues; the teacher shortage and the mental health of our young people.

It has been widely publicised that schools are having increasing difficulty finding teaching staff that are suitably qualified and experienced. It is particularly true in the area of mathematics and science but it is also a problem in English and technology. Auckland schools have been the hardest hit as teachers move to provincial New Zealand to escape the rush hour traffic and unaffordable housing. We have been

very fortunate at Wesley College to be part of the Teach First programme. This has allowed us to fill vacancies in hard to staff subjects. Other schools are cancelling or combining classes, using teachers without subject knowledge and using operations funding to pay extra to retain staff. With fewer teachers in training and growing numbers of students we are facing a crisis where our children may not have suitably qualified teachers in front of them. And that will spell disaster for a generation of young New Zealanders.

There are some solutions being debated by the education profession. They include a large pay rise for teachers to achieve some form of parity with similarly qualified professions, paid allowances for living in expensive areas, recruiting teachers from overseas and reviewing the training required to teach. We will need urgent action on many fronts to ensure students have teachers in front of them. Students, I encourage you to consider teaching as a career. It is challenging but it is very rewarding.

The second issue I would like to address is somewhat sensitive. Our young people are feeling anxious and under pressure. We know this from the media reports about youth mental health and we have seen it here at Wesley where our guidance, chaplaincy and pastoral staff are very busy supporting our students. The pressures young people face come from many sources, and include school work, family expectations, being unable to escape social media, poverty, violence and bullying. Depression and low self-esteem are often the result of these pressures. Our staunch kiwi culture still sees the admission of depression as a weakness. And this prevents people from coming forward to seek help. At school we have staff trained to help. We encourage our students to come forward and seek help. We also encourage students to seek help on behalf of a friend who they know is struggling. As a school we prioritise academic success — and it is vital. However, if our young people are not feeling good, confident and proud, all the credits in the world will mean nothing.

Last year we were very pleased to announce a generous donation to our school from Roger and Kathy Hey. Today I am very pleased to say that we will be putting that money toward the full-time employment of a social worker and a programme aimed at identifying at-risk students. Roger and Kathy had a vision to support students struggling with issues such as low self-esteem and mental health and these initiatives will help see that vision fulfilled.

To families – if you do notice sudden changes in the behaviour of your child, mood swings, self-harm – please know that you can approach us at school to help.

The school year has again been busy and full of learning and co-curricular activities. On the academic front we have seen another large lift in NCEA pass rates at all levels, including University Entrance. The number of students with endorsements was also up. We were again recognised by the Minister of Education for the improvements in our academic success and feature on a poster produced by the Ministry. In a letter to the school the Minister made special mention of our pass rates for





Maori and Pasifika students, which are well above the national averages. Our academic success of 2016 was celebrated at an awards dinner earlier in the year and we are on track to achieve similar success when this year's final results are released.

The co-curricular life of the school has been full of exciting activities. I will relate just a few.

Our 1st XV claimed the Central North Island rugby title in a thrilling home final – claiming the victory with a try in the last play of the game. Five of our other rugby teams played in the tough Auckland competition.

Polyfest again delivered major successes for our groups as a competition and, more importantly, as a cultural and leadership activity. I am grateful for the huge amount of family and community support that gets behind Polyfest every year.

We had three senior students; Xavier Faitala, Caitlyn Smyth and Peter Leaupepe, perform in a South Side Rise production run in conjunction with the Black Friars. This was a truly professional level stage production that played to a series of sell-out crowds and was another fantastic opportunity for our students to display their talents.

Two more students deserve a special mention. Te Rina Wallace and Tupou Vaa'i. Te Rina was recently selected as part of the New Zealand School's rugby sevens training squad. Tupou Vaa'i was selected for the New Zealand Schools rugby team and has also been invited to the New Zealand U20 training camp. A truly remarkable achievement for a student still eligible to play U17.

In my address last year I spoke about our low attendance rate. I am pleased to say that we have had a large improvement in our attendance – up nearly 8% on last year. That may not sound like much but it represents nearly one extra day in school every fortnight for our students. Thank you to our families for your help making attendance at school a top priority. This definitely contributes to our continued lift in attainment.

The Board of Trustees has invested heavily in new laptop computers for the school over the last two years. This has helped our students have access to technology to support their learning and to gain the digital skills required for the modern workplace. The next phase of this work is to roll out BYOD so that classes no longer have to share the equipment and students can access the devices outside of class time. The plan is that Year 11 students will be required to have a laptop in term two of 2018. We are working with a supplier so that we can offer families a robust, fit-for-purpose computer to buy. The Trust Board will subsidise the purchase of the computer which may be paid-off over two or three years if families wish. This is an expense for families but students will get to keep and use their own computer and we believe it will have great benefit for student outcomes.

We say farewell to three staff. Divnesh Singh has been with us for one year teaching mathematics and financial literacy. Ana Clarke has been with us for one year teaching science. Sophie Jones leaves us after two years in the English department. I thank them for their work with our students and wish them all the best.

Before I conclude I must thank the people who contribute to the success of Wesley College, and who have made my time here so rewarding. To the Boards, I am very grateful for the support you have given the school, and to me. We are fortunate to have two Boards with skilled and dedicated trustees to govern our school. I particularly thank Norman Johnston for his advice and guidance. Thank you to the staff from across the campus. At first glance our roles are varied - be we teacher, cleaner, gardener, finance clerk, hostel parent, or cook. But really we are all here for one purpose and that is to help grow, develop and care for our students. Thank you for the part you play in this important work. Students, thank you. You have made me laugh, you have made me frustrated, you have amazed me with your talent. I have learned more from you than you will ever know.

SPOKEN WORD

Expression is Perfection

"I'd like to invite you into a rare sneak preview of the female brain. Crawl with me through the ear canal... Enter the prefrontal lobe, and watch with me, a harmless fly in the brain of a girl..."

his is an excerpt from one of the Wesley College Spoken Word team's poems, and articulates one of the best things about Spoken Word poetry: it allows the speaker to express their thoughts, and allows the audience a rare insight into someone else's mind. In this field, expression is perfection. Spoken Word encourages young people to tell their own stories, and values honesty, integrity, and creativity. It embraces oral literacy, and there's a definite beauty in the freedom from technical concerns that it encourages. No one's listening for missing apostrophes or casting judgement for straying from some 'perfect' formula. Ken Arkind, one of the facilitators of the 'Word the Front Line' competition describes this form of poetry as "a way to end an argument from months or years ago." Spoken Word can be a place to put unresolved issues, to speak up when you have felt silenced in the past. For those minutes with the microphone, you are given the space to speak your truth.

Word the Front Line



Traditionally, the idea of a 'frontline' brings bloody battlefields muddied and camouflage print to mind. The frontline soldiers are typically the bravest: they are the first to face the machine gun fire, or in this case, the first to speak up for their generation; the first to step up to confront their challenges. 'Word the Front Line' is a competition

is as much about developing leadership as it is about honing wordcraft. In this sense, it is the only creative battlefield of its kind. For all the connotations of warfare, this competition fosters community and collaboration, not only between team members, but also between schools. After 220 young people from 32 different high schools around Auckland auditioned, this year's competition was whittled down to include fourteen schools in the semifinals. One striking part of the competition was the way the teams supported and encouraged one another. Instead of keeping an eye out for a weak defence, or a flaw in the opponent's tackling style, the backstage of 'WTFL' felt more like one big theatre company.

Another aspect to competition is the 'community challenge', which recognises that 'ehara taku toa i te toa takitahi. Engari, takitini.' toa Success is not the work of one, but the work of many. This encourages the teams to give back to the communities that have nurtured their growth. Sharon Tuipala (year student) describes her experience of the Wesley College Community Challenge:



"Every time we attended workshops on Saturdays, we were sad to see so many homeless people without food, blankets, families, or roofs over their heads. We wanted to help in a practical way. There's nothing to say that communities that don't have much can't give what they have, so we got in touch with our families, school and Churches to ask for their support, and ended up collecting bags and bags of donations - of not only clothes, sleeping bags, and food, but also kind words, prayers and personalised Bibles. 































he Technology learning area offered a range of new courses this year to students from Year 9 to 12, working in resistant materials technology and construction. Junior students completed a one term rotation in Technology, producing a variety of products ranging from clocks, to storage solutions and outdoor seating. Some of the more innovative Year 10 projects included an upside down outdoor shower to use at the swimming pool, and an outdoor bench seat for the dorms.

Year 11 Technology students completed two pieces of furniture - a small table, and a bedside cabinet, while Year 12 Construction students built three projects, including some fantastic picnic tables to be used around the school grounds. This year was also the first time that we were able to offer trades courses on site through our partnership with Wintec - where senior students had the opportunity to get a glimpse of what a career in the construction, electrical or plumbing trades would look like.

Next year Wesley students will have the option to complete NCEA Level 2 Achievement Standards in Technology, which will create a pathway for a university approved course at Level 3 the following year. The scope of work within the subject area will also be expanded to include robotics and 3D design and printing, using the 3D printer kindly donated by the Rotary Club.







































SOCIAL SCIENCES DEPARTMENT

SENIOR SOCIAL SCIENCES

2017 has been another very busy year in this very large department consisting of the four popular Social Sciences senior subjects **History**, **Geography, Economics, and Travel & Tourism**. The department consisting of myself, **Mr Eason HOD**, in charge of the **History**, **Mr Sahib** as the **TIC of Economics and Mr Watson as the TIC of** Geography and **DP Mr Bean in charge of Travel & Tourism**.

We are very fortunate that we continued to receive the very valued assistance of **Mrs Faitala** the **HOD of English** to assist in the **teaching of a Year 12 History** class this year, due to our very healthy student numbers wanting to take History as an option.

Mr Watson and Mrs Pereira took 13 Geography to Rotorua for a three night Field trip that focused on tourism. A subject report regarding that trip has been included in the magazine for this year.

The bar continues to be raised in terms of the internal assessment's Achievement standards difficulty. Meaning students must put in a great amount of effort in order to make the deadlines and achieve the credits offered. Thus attendance to class and the submission of Unit and Achievement standards is vital and what our department has been encouraging for many years. This is especially relevant in Year 13 where students are required to think critically and analyse their Historical, Geographical and Economic material giving many different published perspectives on important events and places of significance to New Zealanders. The very time consuming teacher internal and external marking moderation process ensuring that the student's assessments are meeting the more difficult National NCEA Level 3 standard now expected. As a small school we now must rely on the good will of our colleagues and teachers off site at different schools to re mark-moderate- our students work, before we can confirm our student's hard

The continued revamping of the Room 12 computer lab with new computer workstations and a projector has been of huge benefit to our department as **we rely solely on their use** as all of the internal assessments are now computer generated on programs such as Micro-soft Publisher and need to be printed out. Without its use, and that of Mr Smyth's lab during prep time, we simply would not be able to meet the now stricter Ministry deadlines regarding the completion of the Standards. Failure to submit by the due date

unfortunately results in the assessment not achieving.

However the vast majority of students have achieved to their potential, with many Merit and Excellence grades being awarded this year meaning that dependant on their examination results they may gain the prized Merit and Excellence endorsements available.

GEOGRAPHY

s a fifth former at Wesley College in 1988 I was fortunate enough to develop a passion for Geography and was blessed in having Warwick Sanson and Chris Grinter as Teachers who opened the way for me to develop my skills. I was fortunate enough to carry on through a B.SocSc at Tertiary Level at Waikato University and later on completion of my Teaching Diploma at Auckland University.

I am delighted to be back at Wesley College in a teaching and Head of Geography capacity. Wesley holds a massive significance to my family and myself- I am proud to have been born and raised on the farm (over 40 years ago!) and in a position to return to where it all started.

The Year in Reflection:

Geography is a University approved subject which combines well with a number of subjects. On a global scale Geography opens more career pathways than most other subjects with the potential for higher salaries. Geography is a living subject. It is a Science that looks at the way people and the environment interact by looking at patterns and applying geographic concepts. Geography combines both theory and practical aspects and my aim is to have field trips at each level.

Although my subject is relatively small in size: participation, submission rates and internal assessment results are high and surpass the national standards.

2017 started with much promise I was excited when I found out my classes and looked down the list at familiar and a few unfamiliar faces. I have a simple ethos when it comes to teaching and it comes down to making lessons interesting, having a variety of activities keeping Students engaged and above all having a good rapport with Students. I thoroughly enjoy the interaction with Students and love sharing my knowledge. My ultimate aim is to see Students reach their potential within a well-structured learning environment. At times there are challenges



inherent along the way but that is part of the fun and journey!

Level One has had an extremely successful year with most of the internal work all done (September) and some pleasing results from both internal assessments and the end of school examination. Some topics we have looked at include sustainability, child poverty, research field work and looking at coffee trade on a global basis.

Level Two Geography has been very strong this year with many of my year 11 students progressing through from last year. We have looked at some interesting and topical issues such as the escalating crime rate and patterns of murder in Chicago, the devastation of Malaria on a global level, the relocation of Wesley College as a Research topic. Our Level two class is in good stead for the fast approaching NCEA exams and I am confident Students will be ready. Well done class.

Level three Geography started off with an eagerly anticipated field trip to Rotorua (three days and two nights) which was planned last year. This trip aligns wonderfully with assessment standard 2.5 which involves Research and in particular the "sustainability of Rotorua as a Tourist destination" and the perception locals/tourist have of the







environment. Is Rotorua really clean and green? Do Tourist operators operate in a sustainable manner? Our Students had a chance to familiarise themselves with the streets of Rotorua conducting surveys/interviews. A highlight of the trip was the visit to Agrodome, the Polynesian Pools, Te Puia and the Skyline. Throughout the trip our 13 students were fantastic ambassadors of the School and conducted themselves wonderfully. It was a memorable trip and I am grateful in having Mrs Pereira who helped accompany the students and was instrumental in the smooth running and enjoyment held by all. I love teaching this subject and love teaching in the Watson Day Centre as well as enjoying helping students find their strengths and abilities to find them a suitable career pathway.

Here's a quick glimpse of what happened in the Transition/Careers Department in 2017.

The Transition /Careers Department commenced with the facilitating of Schools Partnership Representatives from the University of Auckland, Auckland University of Technology, Massey University, Otago University, Waikato University, Manukau Institute of Technology, Wintec coming in to Wesley College to speak about the requirements and prerequisites with the Year 13 students to give them focus and determination to achieve their academic and vocational goals. Year 13 students also participated in the Waikato University Open Day as well as the Massey University Cultural Development Course for Senior Pacific students.

In Term 1, the Year 13 Transition class visited the Coca Cola Amatil

Manufacturing Site in Mt Wellington, to get a first hand experience up close with supply chain production and management in operation and were one of a few schools to receive such an experience for 2017. The Year 13 class also engaged in a Heights and Safety Course experience highlighting the importance of occupation health and safety. The class gained first hand experience and knowledge as well as gaining 11 Level 3 credits. Senior students also participated in the Workchoice Day held at the Telstra Centre in Manukau, finding out about apprenticeships and youth entry level work opportunities with Fletcher Challenge, Sistema Plastics and Mac Donalds Oasis organisations.

The Year 12 Transition students were fortunate to attend the NZ Secondary Schools Careers Expo held at the ASB Showgrounds in Term 2 and had the opportunity to speak face to face with representatives from over 120 exhibition stands including all the New Zealand Universities, Polytechs and PTES as well as speaking with members of the New Zealand Police Force, New Zealand Military Defense, Army, Navy.

Students were excited to meet representatives from the Aviation Industry as well as Representatives from the Primary Industries, Manufacturing and Techology, Creative Arts, Construction and Infrastructure, Services Industries , Social and Community Services sectors.

The Year 12 students attended the Careers Expo with their form teachers, Mr Sahib, Mrs Chainey, Mr Watson and Mr Bean along with the Year 12 Dean Mr Pole. It was wonderful to hear students and teachers continue prospective career discussions following the Expo.

The Year 11 Transitions students undertook empowerment workshops with the Malosi Project, the Pacific Law students from the University of Auckland. This was a successful initiative and enjoyed immensely by the Year 11 students. Curriculum vitae planning and understanding rights and responsibilities in the workplace is the key focus in Year 11.





We welcomed Mr Lawrence Lawrence (Loz) to the coaching team. His insightful rugby knowledge and the attacking style of play he introduced saw the team play a brand of rugby that was free flowing and allowed the players to express themselves. We also welcomed Mr Chris Field as team manager. He did a tremendous job carrying out the administrative duties and all the other background logistics that go unnoticed that allowed the team to focus on the game at hand

Our opening pre-season game was an away fixture against Dilworth College from the Auckland 1A competition. This allowed us to apply what we had learned through our training programme. The 1XV won this exciting venture 18-10. A week later, we followed this up with a game against the Argentinian touring team, San Patricio. Tupou, Ronan and our team proved too strong in this game. We won 53-10. These games primed us well for the Chiefs Cup competition and despite not being where we wanted to be based on ability and execution; it definitely shaped our

performance as we built towards the CNI competition.

The opening pool game for the Chiefs Cup was a bye. The second ended with a narrow loss to St John's School from Hamilton, 13-10 and round three brought us against three things; Rotorua Boys High School, the Chris Grinter Cup and Chris Grinter himself - their current principal. Before Grinter joined the other side, he was the Deputy Principal and 1XV coach here at Wesley College. 
