Here is one simple example you can help with. At Wesley, students frequently return late to the hostel after the weekends and holidays or we withdraw them from school far too often. At certain times of the year up to a third of school is missing. If we truly value education this is a simple fix. I urge you to consider the impact this has on student learning and the barrier we are creating for them. We can't achieve excellence without your support and excellence is a habit we are striving to embrace.

Overall sport at Wesley continues to thrive. However, we are up against it maintaining our place at the top level in NZ. The school sports landscape has changed dramatically and we need to be very strategic in how we approach things if we want to retain our reputation as a sporting power house.

Polyfest again delivered major successes for our groups as a competition and, more importantly, as a cultural and leadership activity. I am grateful for the huge amount of staff, family and community support that gets behind Polyfest every year.

Drama and Dance students celebrated South Auckland as part of the SouthSide Rise Movement. Given the opportunity to tell their own stories through the performing arts was not only an empowering journey, but a chance for our students to speak for themselves, at a time where society seems to continuously speak for them.

With heavy investment from the Board of Trustees we will roll out BYOD in 2019. The plan is that all Year 9, 10 and 11 students will be required to have a device in term one of next year. The Trust Board will subsidise the purchase of the computer which may be paid-off over two or three years if families wish. Students will get to keep and use their own computer and we believe it will have great benefit for student outcomes.

My first year at Wesley College has been very rewarding. To the Boards, I am very grateful for the support you have given the school, and to me. We are fortunate to have two Boards with skilled and dedicated trustees to govern our school. I particularly thank Norman Johnston for his advice and guidance.

Thank you to teaching staff and in fact all the staff from across the campus. Our roles can be diverse, but we must see ourselves as one team. We are all here for the same purpose and that is to help grow, develop and care for our students. Thank you for the part you play in this important work.

To all the students, thank you for a terrific year. Next year we will hold our 175th Jubilee and if there is one vision I would love for past pupils to take away it would be this, that they see their school striving for excellence, living to the school motto and thriving in our Methodist ethos that makes us so unique.

Throughout the year we were taught discipline, to respect others and to be responsible for our actions.





Before I start I just want to give all Honour and Glory to our Heavenly Father, for guiding my brothers and I through another year here at Wesley College. I also want to give a big thank you to all staff members, who contributed into helping me and my brothers get through this year. Big thank you to our families, laundry staff, kitchen staff, teaching staff, hostel staff, Matron staff, maintenance staff and everyone else who puts in the hard work for us boys, it never goes unnoticed. It is also an honour and privilege for me to be talking about me and my brother's journey throughout our second to last year here at Wesley College in Caughey Hall.

A bit of history of on Caughey Hall. Caughey Hall opened in 1979 on the 25th February by a man named John Smith Caughey. The purpose of the dorm opening was for the celebration of the school's 50th Anniversary of its opening of the school's WH Smith Memorial Chapel. And for the past 39 years, Caughey has become home for many present students and ex-students of Wesley College, students from a wide range of ethnic groups, no matter which part of New Zealand or the World each student came from Caughey has always been a second home for them.

And for me and my boys, this year

marks our second year staying in Caughey Hall, making us also the last form to ever stay in Caughey. In Caughey Hall, there are 14 rooms with two per each room. At the entrance of the dorm, there is also a Prefects room for the older senior boys, altogether making Caughey Hall a 15 bedroom dorm, that can fit 32 young strong, fit and handsome men. In the main dorm there are no walls, which makes Caughey Hall an open dorm, so you pretty much see, hear and do everything with the boys around you. Caughey has taught me and my brothers a lot of useful tips which we can adapt into our everyday lives. For example. It is impossible for you to hide drinks and snacks in the dorm, due to it being so open, every drink that gets popped open and every chip packet that gets ripped open is hearable and once opening one packet of chips or cracking open one drink, you will end up finding a line of 31 boys in front of you lining up for a handful of chips or a sip of a drink. So moral of the story is, If you bring food, be prepared to feed everyone (One eats, all eats). To be honest I'm going to miss the 5:30am to 6:30am Gym sessions, Wake up was 6:00am, roll call at 7:00am, breakfast at 7:15am. Dinner at 6:00pm, prep at 7:00pm and lights out at 10 O'clock. No rugby boots were to be worn in the dorms. If you were caught swearing that would be a punishment of 20 push-ups added for

each swear word you said (Aka Mac's rule). Every morning roll call Caughey starts with devotion to kick-start the day, and every night Caughey would finish with devotion to end off a hard working day. Singing and praying was mandatory. Haka practice would be in the TV lounge. Last minute catch up on assessments was in the computer room near upper harding. If it was your birthday, all the boys would try and save up money to buy you a big surprise feed. In Caughey, you're guaranteed to lose a lot of clothes, but I guarantee you, your clothes will magically appear in your locker again.

When boredom strikes at night time we would play go home, stay home. During State of Origin games, we would have Queensland vs New South Wales fights in the middle of the hallway, which I will never understand because we live in New Zealand? At the end of every term, we would have a big dorm celebration/feed to end off the term on good terms. If there was any problems between you and another brother, we would hold everyone back and call a

big Caughey Hall meeting. Caughey Hall was the closest dorm to the school's rugby fields so during the summer it was compulsory for everyone to be outside playing touch after school. Caughey Hall was home away from home, and the ones you lived there with were friends who became family, no matter what background you came from, what culture you were, Caughey was always home. In Caughey you eat, sleep, pray and suffer through triumphs together with your brothers. And I truly feel that Caughey Hall played a big part in strengthening our bond with one another.

I have only stayed in Caughey Hall for two years and these past two years Caughey has given me and the boys many memories we can all cherish forever when we look back and reminisce about our time served here at Wesley College. As Caughey Hall now gets renovated for the better good, I am proud to say that me and my boys were the last form to have witnessed what it was like to be a part of the Caughey Hall environment, and to see what it was like to live there. And so me and my boys thank Caughey Hall for its services to us throughout our journey at this place we call home. A message to my brothers in the 15-19, next year is our year. Our time to shine, and to put Wesley College back on the map, Wesley College has been quiet for far too long. 2019 is our year to make our final memories as farm boys. I could go on bragging about Caughey Hall for ages, but like the wise words of DQ "What happens in Caughey Hall, stays in Caughey Hall.

Before I conclude I just want to also give a big thank you to our dorm parents, David Qaranivalu (DQ) and Mac for looking after us all those long hard nights, and for putting up with us, Thank you for your support. 





Temple in Manukau. Students were provided the opportunity to learn how to meditate, were provided with food and learnt the skill of calligraphy which they found enjoyable.



But this is how you call them wrong


The men slap their legs



The journal features the work of senior secondary students who took part in this year's Young Writers Programme, as well as its alumni.




better to guide us on our poetic pathway. If anyone is to be thanked for the success of this year it's you Miss!

When it comes to sporting success, Wesley College is no stranger, but is there more to this school than meets the eye?

Founded in 1844, Wesley College has seen a long line of sporting success ever since the 1800's to the now 2000's. In the small country town of Paerata, North of Pukekohe, Wesley College (the oldest school in New Zealand) is home to 372 proud Wesleyans. You only need to spend a day at this school to realise that God and sport are at the centre of its culture and it's success.

Whilst most teenagers are still cocooned in their beds, it is a common sight at Wesley College to see individuals and groups, ghostlike in the mist, powering through a morning training session. As the school motto "Fide, Litteris, Labore" suggests, these students are not afraid of some hard work in their quest for success. It is one of the advantages of being a boarding school; the students live and breathe their school ethos all week. It is a second family. Life at Wesley "can't be explained, only experienced" most students will say. So what does that experience really entail?

Music is food for the soul. As Methodists we devote our lives to praising and worshipping our almighty God. Much of our morning is filled with the joyful noise of singing and beautiful harmonies sung by the students. Powerful and inspiring messages are delivered in Chapel every morning at 8:30 by Reverend Tasi. This is just a brief glimpse of how our faith is practiced in school. Inside the chapel walls, here unity is formed as we chant and cheer passionately to wish visitors a welcome, thank you and goodbye, and more excitingly cheer our sports teams good luck. Faith, belief and unity is also evident in the school's main sporting code and great passion - rugby.

Across the years, Wesley College has made a name for itself and is widely known for its triumphs in rugby. Producing a number of greats, such as the late Jonah Lomu and more recently Malakai Fekitoa, Wesley has a reputation that far exceeds what you would expect for such a small school. Our school takes great pride in our main

code, and as a result, we have overcome the toughest of games. Up and coming rugby star, Larenz Tupaea, says "representing Wesley means the world to me. It's like representing my own country but it's much deeper because over the years you've always dreamed about becoming a 1st XV player and when you're there it's like blood rushing through your veins and it pushes you to want to represent Wesley with the boys you've grown up with over the years." Over the years Wesley College has won a number of 1st XV rugby and Rugby Sevens comps. This includes taking out National titles in 1990, 1993, 1997 and 2001. Success has stopped there, however, as they have also won numerous Rugby 7's comps including: 1989, 1993, 1996, 2000, 2001 and 2005. But it's not just the boys who have been excelling at sport. Quietly the girls have been moving through the ranks.

Many people regard Wesley College as a boy's school but that is a misconception. Girls were present at Wesley College from 1844 to 1880 but only boys were enrolled for the next 100 years. It was not until 1985 when girls made a come back and 23 girls were introduced into forms 6 and form 7. Twenty of them boarded in Te-Paea Hall, a complex made possible by a bequest from the Methodist Church. Since then, the girls have set about making a name for themselves. As I write, there is a real buzz around school as the girls prepare for an utmost important rugby fixture against Hamilton Girls High School to see who will qualify for the New Zealand Schools Top 4 Chief's region. Girls rugby at Wesley has immensely improved along the years. The girls have fought hard to prove the boys

At Level 2 students continued to focus on the horror film genre. Unfortunately, we were not able to organise a 'Shoot Day' this year due to course numbers. This made making the films more challenging; however, Rhys

Gabriel, Seruwaia Matairavula and Oliver Tainui produced one standout film. We certainly have some budding filmmakers in our midst!

Once again, the Year 12 students participated in the 'Censor for a Day' event run by the Office of Film and Literature Classification. Students visited the cinema at Manukau where they had an introduction to some of the issues and legalities surrounding film censorship, before watching a film and critically discussing what rating it

wrong. To challenge the theory that only boys are good at rugby or that rugby is a boy's sport.

The girls played their hearts out against Alfriston in the intense Counties final and eventually winning 28-24 in 2016. They lost in their finals in 2017 to Rosehill, but had a big comeback winning against them 49-17 this year in their Counties Final. An article written by 'Waikato Times' applauded the girls rugby team on their efforts throughout the tournament and stated "The Wesley College girls first XV rugby team are showing the boys how it's done. The secondary school north of Pukekohe has a reputation for crafting outstanding rugby players. Alumni from the college have gone on to join the ranks of the All Blacks, including the legendary Jonah Lomu. But now the fellas might have some competition." The team's hard work and exceptional team work really paid off this season and no doubt will take them places in the near future.

"Our team work has been extremely good this year, with supporting each other, communicating well on the field and each girl playing their part. All of these contributed to my team all working effectively together on the field which helped us to win the whole counties comp," said Talafekau Mapuhola, Captain of the girls 1st XV and promising young rugby player. She also went on to say that representing Wesley College in sport reminded her that she is playing for her sisters. The sense of 'family' at Wesley definitely adds an extra dimension.

By faith, by learning and by hard work: nothing is impossible.





should receive. It is a great exercise and provokes some interesting conversation.

Finally, congratulations to Year 13, Rachael Taufu, for her







SENIOR SOCIAL SCIENCES

2018 has been another extremely busy year. This very large department consists of the four popular Social Sciences senior subjects **History, Geography, Economics and Travel & Tourism**. The department consists of myself, **Mr Eason HOD**, in charge of the **History**, **Mr Sahib** as the **TIC of Economics** and **Mr Watson** as the **TIC of Geography** and **DP Mr Bean** in charge of **Travel & Tourism**.

We are very fortunate to continue receiving the very valued assistance of **Mrs Faitala** the **HOD of English** to assist in the internal moderation of the History again this year. Her assistance is outstanding and of huge benefit to our department and the school in general.

We welcomed yet another new principal and new assistant principal to our fold. Three different principals and deputy principals within five years certainly makes life interesting, as each has their different strengths and personalities.

The bar continues to be raised in terms of the degree of difficulty with internal assessed Achievement Standards. Meaning students must put in a great amount of effort in order to make the deadlines and achieve the credits offered. Thus attendance in class and the submission of the Achievement Standards is very vital and what our department focusses on has been encouraging for many years.

We really still do focus on the grass roots in terms of education in order to get the basics right first and foremost. This is especially relevant in Year 13

where students are **required to think critically** and **analyse** their Historical, Geographical and Economic material giving many different published perspectives on important events and places of significance to New Zealanders. The very time consuming teacher internal and external marking moderation process ensures that the student's assessments are meeting the more difficult National NZQA Level 3 standard now expected. As a small school we now must rely on the good will of our colleagues and teachers off site at different schools to re mark-moderate- our students work, before we can confirm our student's hard work. This is a very rigorous process that we work hard towards always maintaining.

The continued revamping of the Room 12 computer lab with some newer computer workstations and a projector has been of huge benefit to our department as **we rely solely on their use** as all of the internal assessments are computer generated on digital platforms such as Micro-soft Publisher and need to be printed out. This has been the case for many years now. Without its use, and that of Mr Smythe's room 5 lab during prep time, we simply would not be able to meet the always strict Ministry deadlines regarding the completion of the NZQA Standards.

We look forward to the introduction of BYOD's next year for the year 11 cohort as it will take a lot of pressure off room 12 and enable the research and word processing to occur in our classrooms. We are very fortunate in History- Room

24- and in Economics-Room 23, to have Air Conditioning. With the Geography room also to receive Air conditioning over the holidays.

Failure to submit by the due date in our department unfortunately results in the assessment not achieving. As in most departments we offer one resubmission. Failure to complete the resubmission to the required set national standard, means a Not Achieved is recorded. We are very strict towards this and it means the standards integrity is maintained, and thus the schools integrity towards internal assessments is also maintained. Despite our firm boundaries we remain one of the top achieving departments, and suspect it maybe our no nonsense approach that students feel empowered by. As they know that they have achieved to their best potential.

The vast majority of students have achieved to their potential, with many Merit and Excellence grades being awarded this year meaning that dependant on their examination results they may gain the prized Merit and Excellence endorsements available. The year 12 class this year have a big challenge, as the 2017 cohort had a 90% pass rate in their very difficult external examinations!

JUNIOR SOCIAL STUDIES

We have had a large team of teachers delivering the Junior Social Studies curriculum this year; this has brought a great depth of knowledge, experience and interest to the course that has really benefitted our students.

One of the great joys of Social Studies is the breadth of topics you can cover, but it is also one of the greatest challenges. What to focus on? Year 9 have looked at migration, representations of New Zealand, human rights and perspectives of the Treaty of Waitangi. Year 10 have focused on genocide, the 'Dawn Raids', government and New Zealand's natural resources. Whilst our topics are aligned with the Level 5 curriculum achievement objectives, they are also intended to widen students' awareness of local and global issues, increase critical thinking skills, and to be relevant to the lives of our young people. It is quite a challenge!

A highlight from this year was taking four representatives from Year 9 to participate in an Amnesty International 'Freedom Challenge' workshop at their offices in Auckland. The students had the opportunity to meet with older students from other schools as well as interacting with people from Amnesty International and learning about human rights abuse cases. Our participation in the 'Freedom Challenge' led to all our Year 9 students writing letters of support to human

rights fighters in places such as Egypt, Cambodia and Tibet. We also held a Spoken Word Poetry Slam and all money raised went towards supporting Amnesty International. It has been another great opportunity to raise our student's awareness of social issues.

The end of the year has seen the Year 10's visiting the Glenbrook Steel Mill for the second time. Their focus was on how New Zealand uses its natural resources, environmental issues and career opportunities.

Unfortunately, a fault at the plant meant some of the groups did not get to see the hot roller mills in action but it was still a great opportunity to see industry first-hand.

The Year 9's visited Auckland Museum; this linked to their inquiry learning projects that they undertook at the end of the year. Changeable weather meant we did not get to play our games in the Domain afterwards but it was still good to reflect on the past and make connections to the future.

Thank you to the students for making it an exciting year and to the teaching team, Mr. Eason, Mr. Watson, Mrs. Faitala, Mr. Bean, Ms. Bhana, Mrs. Fatialofa and Ms. Autagavaia, for all their work this year.

The Auckland competition this year had an increased number of secondary school teams playing in the premier division. After a long season the 1st XIII finished pool play in 3rd spot, winning






