Eric Salmon Educational Trust

This Trust is able to give financial assistance to students or former students of Wesley College, to enable them to undertake further education. The Trust looks to help young people become better qualified to provide service and leadership within the community.

Although grants will be available to help students still at Wesley College, the main intention of the Trust is to help with further study after leaving College. This study will need to be at an Institute of Technology or University or in some other recognised course in New Zealand. In most cases it will be a course leading to a qualification for a profession, business management position, agricultural employment, or skilled trade, though it does not need to be an academic course.

Grants will be made for one year of study, but in some cases, provided good progress is made, they could be extended for a total of up to three years.

Normally one or a few substantial grants will be made in any one year.

Any past or present student of Wesley is eligible for a grant. Such people may apply direct to the trustees, or they be nominated by the Principal. In any case, the Principal will make a report based on the candidate's participation in the College. Other people who know the candidate may be consulted as well.

Grants will be awarded primarily on the basis of a person's personal character and leadership potential and the extent of financial need.

Normally, applications or nominations will need to be in by 15 October in any year, and it is hoped grants can be announced early in December.

Survey measures social well-being in NZ towns

Dunedin earns top place

Dunedin has come out on top in a study of the social well-being of 24 New Zealand towns and cities.

Mr Stuart Kane, an MA student in geography at the University of Otago, unveiled the findings of his survey at the 15th conference of the New Zealand Geographical Society in Dunedin this week.

The survey was based on a set of indicators to measure income, unemployment and economic activity, as well as physical health and access to medical care.

The studies also took into account family breakdown, public safety, crime rates, education, social participation and equality. Access to recreation and leisure was

also examined.

The study, based on 1981 census data and including statistics up to 1986, was based on a comparison with a survey of the same centres carried out by Mr Kevin McCracken, a geography student at the university in 1977. The earlier studyn was based on 1971 census data and included statistics up to 1975.

Dunedin moved up from fifth place in the previous study, with the South Island claiming seven of the top 10 places in both surveys

Striking features of the latest list were significant improvements in the ranking of Palmerston North (from 13th to 2nd), Christ-church, (12th to 5th) and Hamilton (16th to 9th).

The study showed Palmerston North's improvement had come in virtually every category.

Christchurch's rise came from an increase in "social belonging" indicators, while Hamilton scored better in health and economic performance.

performance.
Rotorua moved from
22nd to 16th through large
improvements in health,
education and social
belonging.
Auckland
climbed from 17th to 14th
with improvements in
education, "social belonging" and in recreation and
leisure.

Among centres to slip back, Masterton dropped from 14th to 24th with continued poor ranking in economic performance and adverse health, recreation and leisure indicators.

Oamaru, which dropped from second to 11th, had "lost a lot of ground" in health, education, and recreation and leisure fields. Ashburton, which fell from first to eighth, fared badly in health and education indicators.

Mr Kane said the study showed high economic performance did not necessarily result in high standards of well-being. Auckland, Hamilton, New Plymouth and Wellington all scored well in economic terms but fared badly in "social order" and "belonging" categories.

Auckland affluence was also accompanied by higher crime and divorce rates, he said.

Have you ever wondered what a four dimensional world must look like?

As you well know, our common daily experiences tell us that there are three physical dimensions to our life. Length, breadth and height. What if there was yet another fundamental direction?

Of course relative to us left behind, we would still look the same to each other, only your pimples would now be on the other side of your face.

Mere fantasy and hypothesis? Well, firstly; where is the human race without a little bit of fantasy and a dream? Secondly, the world <code>is</code> in fact four dimensional; if you are to believe Einstein. If you don't, then please feel free to put your cynicism where your mouth should be; underneath the next atomic bomb — but don't invite me to the party! You see, nuclear power is one of the best vindications we have of Einstein's ideas.

- To make sense of 4 dimensions in our real world, you simply have to perform a few subtle tricks like:-
- 1) Multiply the fourth axis by the square root of negative one. (Space and time get themselves intimately confused.)
- 2) Scale this axis down by the speed of light.

(Measure lengths using nature's own scale lengths, **not** using ours. i.e. Why should a kilometer be as big - or for that matter as small - as it is? Why should a second of time be the length it is?)

3) Do not rotate yourself by more than 45 degrees in this fourth dimensional direction unless you can do so without being seen. (Don't travel faster than light unless no-one, including yourself, can know. The freedom to allow this as a possibility demands the existence of anti-matter; first predicted using a reasoning along these lines and now observed. We can even create the stuff provided we also create the complementary matter too!)

That's the real world as told by the latest multi-million dollar particle accelerators jointly built recently by some European nations and by America.

Now to the program. You can draw up any three dimensional (or four dimensional) shape with corners. Then rotate it in any direction or combination of directions you wish. Stereoscopic pairs are available at your whim. (The "View Master" effect.)

Put in perspective (3-d or 4-d) and you too can journey this strange world.

Matthew defined a four dimensional cube, called a hypercube or tesseract. The geometry of such an entity has intrigued artists like Salvador Dali who painted a projection of this hypercube onto the three dimensional world. It looked a bit like a blocky sort of cross from one particular angle, so he left Jesus hanging on it - to display Christ as the "extra dimension" in our lives.

This hypercube has CUBES for its SIDES (eight of them!). If youv'e a mind to, you can enter into the interior of one of these cubes (or any other for that matter) from the outside without passing through any of the cube's sides, edges or corners.


To quote Matthew:- "Its as close as you can get to a picture of what a hypercube would look like if you were four dimensional and could see in four dimensions".

Matthew has written the program completely by himself. The necessary ideas used in this program have come from:-

- i) Algebra (Vector components and matrix arithmetic.)
- ii) Trigonometru (Sine and Cosine functions.)
- iii) Geometry (The nature of shapes and their construction.)
- iv) Technical Drawing (Perspective techniques and graphic displays using the "Picture Plane" method.)
- v) Computers (The quick-basic compiler; Intel 8086 processor assembly language for fast routines.)

Do you still want proof of four dimensions? Well, ask any Saturday afternoon duty teacher at $1:30~\rm pm$ parade. "Now where did those detentionees go...?"





Hon Yee, Richard van Dyk and Priti Singh received credit passes in the Australian Maths Competiton.




'A' Team


