Still, it was lovely to see you all when I got back to school, probably because you all seemed pleased to see me ...!

I enjoyed experiencing the settings of so much of the literature I have studied. It was interesting to speak with people about what they knew of New Zealand and also to learn more about their lives. Riding the London Underground was amazing. Coping with different exchange rates was testing when an icecream could cost 1000 Italian Lira or 50 Thai Baht, and that's not taking into account tipping or bartering! I always knew New Zealand is a scenic country but the age and history of so much of Europe staggered me and made me realise how very young our country really is.

Apart from the new things I have seen and done, my travels have had a big impact upon who I am. I have seen myself and my country from another angle and discovered new depths to my capabilities. I hope that if any of you have the opportunity to travel that you will seize it and make the most of it. It took a lot of saving and some sacrifice to get there but already I'm thinking ahead about the next trip.

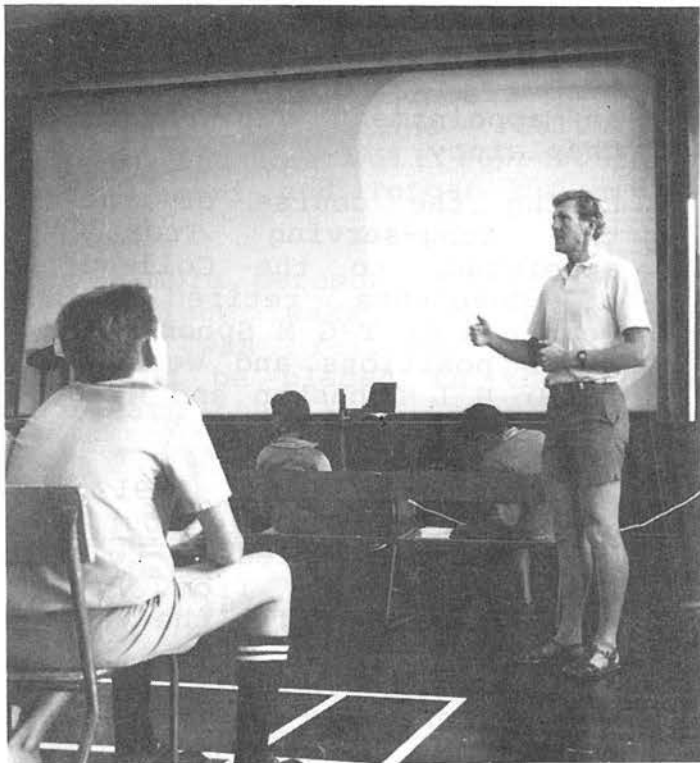

Principal's Comment

The 1991 College year has been another momentous one characterised by the achievements of pupils in a wide variety of different fields. Sadly, we record with sorrow the passing of long serving staff member and Senior Master, Mr Grahame Watson. Grahame passed away on Tuesday, 30 July after being ill for most of this year. He joined the staff of the College in 1966 and had completed 25 years of service and at his funeral at the College on Saturday, 3 August former pupils from each of the intervening years appeared to be present. Sad though the occasion was, Grahame's funeral was a tremendous tribute to him and to the College - a time when the whole family of Wesley College came together in a very special and meaningful way.

The College celebrated with Mr Chris Grinter, Deputy Principal, his appointment to the Principalship of Rotorua Boys' High School. A poroporoaki was held for Chris and Hilary Grinter in the College Hall on the afternoon of Friday, 26 July. It was a moving occasion during which representatives of all the ethnic groups at the College said their farewells.

It is a pleasure to acknowledge the work of Mr Stephen Fordyce and Mrs Judith Phillips who have acted as Deputy Principal and Senior Lady respectively until new appointments are made.

At the beginning of Term III, it was a pleasure to welcome our new Chaplain the Rev. Alan Upson. We are indebted to the Superintendent of the Manukau District, the Rev. Dr. Keith Rowe, for organising preachers at our Sunday services during Terms I and II. We especially thank the Rev. Warwick Gust and the Rev. Percy Rushton for teaching our Life and Faith classes until

an appointment was made to the Chaplaincy.

During the course of the year, two long-serving Trust Board appointees to the College Board of Governors retired. Mrs C Peak and Mr T G M Spooner resigned their positions and were replaced by Mr N L Johnston and Mr J Paine respectively.

We commenced the 1991 school year a little down on our maximum roll but were pleased to welcome Guiliano Pintao from Brazil - our AFS student for the year.

1990 external examination results were generally very pleasing and while there is room for improvement at School Certificate level, the College recorded its highest ever examination passes in the University Bursaries examination. Twenty bursaries were gained of which six were A awards and in addition, five students gained National Scholarships in individual subjects. Students from the College successfully participated in the Combined Schools Sixth Forms Examination and in the New Zealand Education Foundation Scholarship Examination with two students being awarded Certificates in the latter qualification. During the year, nine former students of the College graduated from New Zealand universities.

It is a pleasure to acknowledge the work of our College Prefects led by their highly personable and capable Head Prefect Marcus Topine, and ably assisted by Head Girl Donna Duggan and Head Boy Lyall Bowsher. In an innovative step at the beginning of the year, the College invested in professional leadership training for the Prefects and I am sure that this initiative was most worthwhile.

At the beginning of the year, the College participated in the Auckland Secondary Schools' Maori and Pacific Island Cultural festival and was well represented by its Maori and Tongan cultural groups.

In a simple ceremony on 3rd May, the College waka "Te Puhi O Paerata" was returned to the campus to be placed in the quad underneath the large totara tree.

Three Solomon Islands students accompanied by Mrs Phillips participated during the May holidays in the Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) which was hosted by the Rotary Club of Takapuna.

It is a pleasure to record the selection of a sixth form student by the E F Foundation to spend a year in the United States of America from mid-1992.

During the course of the year, College students were involved in a number of worthwhile charitable fund-raising projects but two worthy of special mention were those for fellow secondary student Chris Howlett from Tararua Area School in the Far North.

Chris suffers from cystic fibrosis and funds were being raised by schools nationally in order for him to travel to London to have a triple organ transplant of heart, lung and liver. Funds were also raised for a local Pukekohe boy - Liam Sanders -

who suffers from cerebral palsy and he was assisted to travel to Peto Andras State Institute for Physically Handicapped Children in Hungary for special training.

Wesley College students participated enthusiastically in a wide variety of summer and winter sports during the year. We record with pleasure the efforts of our golf team, who won the Auckland Secondary Schools Stableford Points competition and also note that one student

gained a bronze medal in national tae kwan do championships and that another student won a North Island TKD title and a second student was runner up in the same division.

The mid-July visit of members of a rugby team and staff from Shotoku Gakuen High School in Tokyo was a great success as was the visit of a rugby team from Tupou College in Tonga.

College teams achieved success in netball, hockey, soccer and rugby and two students were selected for the North Island Under 16 Secondary Schools Rugby Team, two students were selected for the New Zealand Under 17 Secondary Schools Rugby team and two students were selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools Rugby team for which Sam Nonoa scored two tries in the test match against Australia. Some four students, both girls and boys, participated on voyages on the sail training ships Spirit of New Zealand and Spirit of Adventure during the course of the year.

In retrospect, there have been many pleasing achievements in the College year to date and I express my thanks to the various groups who make up this family of Wesley College - students, staff, parents, members of the Board of Governors and Trust Board.

In conclusion, I wish to thank Mrs Caulton and the members of her team for the 1991 production of "Collegian".

Grahame Watson

Obituary

Grahame Watson exemplified the special character of Wesley College and he will be remembered as a father figure to thousands of students he taught from 1966 to 1991.

Grahame was a North Shore boy, relaxed and friendly perhaps because of the carefree lifestyle of that area, and he was justifiably proud of his own student days at Belmont Primary and Takapuna Grammar School. While studying at Auckland Teachers' College and then teaching at Papatoetoe he became well known on the Devonport ferries as 'Snow,' the popular young teacher who enjoyed life to the full, and who made many friends of the commuters on ship and shore.

The special pattern for Grahame's life became moulded when he carried out country service at Okaihau D.H.S. for here he came under the influence of the young Senior Secondary teacher Hiwi Tauroa, and also on the staff were Paul Burt and John Horsman. When Hiwi became Deputy Principal and later Principal at Wesley College his dynamic personality attracted his followers and with Grahame appointed to the staff the foundation for the success of this school in the 1970's and 80's was laid.

In 1966 the young matron was Ann Charman and following a brief courtship Grahame and Ann were married and their first home, (can you believe it?), was the present prefects flat in upper Harding Hall. Grahame was appointed Head of the then strong Intermediate F1 and 2 Department of the College and when Hiwi Tauroa was appointed Principal of Tuakau College in



1974, and at the last minute took the Wesley Deputy Principal John Horsman with him, our College was left in a very difficult situation. As the new Principal I had no senior staff and Mr Tauroa wisely suggested that I appoint Grahame as acting Deputy Principal until permanent appointments could be made. From my point of view it was a stroke of genius. Grahame virtually ran Wesley College for a term while I found my feet, and his advice and guidance were outstanding. When John Hall was appointed Deputy Principal, and Grahame Watson Senior Master a special partnership was formed; John with his brilliant timetabling and top quality academic teaching, coupled with

Grahame's hostel management skills and concern for his students' welfare. Under this pairing the College roll accelerated from 210 students in 1974 to 330 students in 1986, with a long waiting list for entry limited by the bed capacity of the hostels. As the roll increased Grahame gave up his Form 1 and 2 teaching and the Intermediate Department was closed to allow more students into the senior school.

Grahame had more personal contact with the pupils and parents than any other teacher at Wesley, for his position entailed enrolling all students, carrying out the often heart breaking task of selecting entrants according to their social needs and then guiding them through the critical formative years of the junior forms. No teacher could have enjoyed more influence over these young people than Grahame Watson. He strongly supported my recommendation to include girls in Forms 6 and 7, and it was fitting that his elder daughter, Frances, should spend two years in the early stage of our new co-educational school.

Grahame's total life focussed on the College. He and Ann and their three children spent most of their time on the Wesley property and their own great family strength was expanded to include many of the students. Grahame had a remarkable empathy with, and understanding of, Pacific Island students.

Before Mary Johnston and Richard Smythe arrived at Wesley, Grahame was the Islanders' confidante and after Mary left the Solomon boys

in particular once more relied on Grahame's paternal care and judgement.

The highlight of Grahame's and Ann's career was their two visits to the Pacific Islands to meet the parents and to view, at first hand, the success of their Wesley College old students and to experience the special warmth that only grateful Islanders can provide. Grahame and Ann were seriously considering spending their twilight teaching days in the Solomons when illness intervened.

Grahame's interest in people was further developed by his research into his and Ann's family history. His geneological studies made many friends in Britain where his correspondence over many years produced a remarkable picture of family backgrounds.

The success of Grahame's three children reflects the dedication that he and Ann directed to the family but his influence of caring and wise counsel extends throughout New Zealand and the Pacific through the achievements of his students.

It has been a privilege to record the love and devotion of this genial man but the real testimony of his successful life will not be in the written word, but in the statement of his thankful students: "I was taught by Grahame Watson at Wesley College."

To Mr Fordyce, we know it's hard to take the second highest job in College, but you have been the solution to the equation, and have co-ordinated well with the prefects. Thanks!

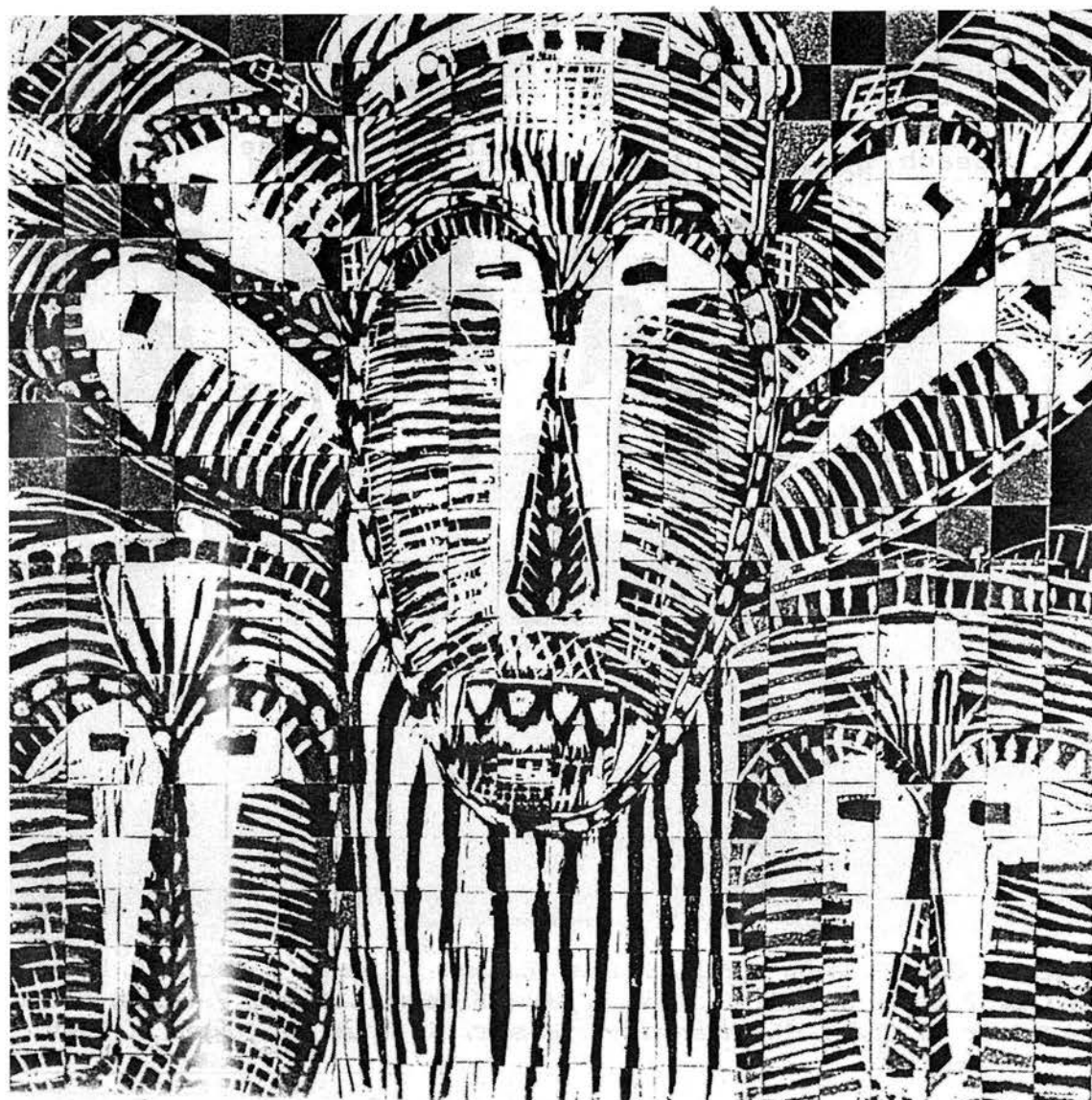
Finally to Mr Cowley thank you and all the best for the future.

As in previous years, the students behaved impeccably. In their standard of dress and behaviour, they were a credit to themselves and to the College.

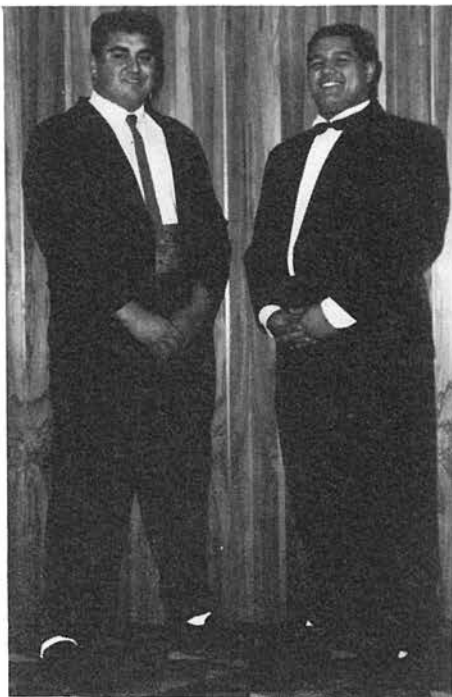
The venue at Ellerslie and the D.J. were both an improvement over previous years and I would not hesitate to recommend these for similar functions in the future.

Mathematics Competitions

THE PAPER PLUS

SOUTH AUCKLAND MATHEMATICS COMPETITION.

Following the success of last year's competition, the South Auckland Schools from Manurewa through to Onewhero decided to hold another contest for 3rd and 4th Form students.

Early in Term I, keen mathematicians were sought out to make up the Wesley teams. Although short on third form entrants there was plenty of interest from the 4th Formers, some of whom had been in the previous year's 3rd Form team. Eventually two teams were selected: L. Hana, D. Price, R. Corney, W. MacAlister, S. Gee, and J. Kumeroa. P. Laumea, J. Walters and F. Findlay were enlisted as team coaches and supporters.

The competition was held on a wet night in April. Although we did not win either of the two prizes an enjoyable and challenging evening was had by all.

The Australian Mathematics Competition

This year's Australian Maths Competition prompted good support from the school and it was pleasing to have so many first-time entrants. 470,000 students from throughout Australasia took part in this challenging competition where all calculators are banned! Using only pencil and paper the entrants have 75 minutes to answer 30 puzzling questions. The top candidates are awarded certificates of credit or distinction.

Those who achieved success this year were: D. Madsen, S. Gee, S. Hay, R. van Dyk, D. H. Kim and T. Chappell all of whom gained credit certificates and R. Wakelin who was awarded a certificate of distinction.

The Friends of Wesley have been keeping busy helping out when needed at familiarization days and guiding new pupils and their parents on their arrival at school on the first day of the year. We have also had very successful stalls at the summer sports day and Old Pupils Day for which I would like to thank all of those who have supported us by supplying goods for these stalls and purchasing vegetables and food on the day.

On the brighter side we have supplied equipment for the girls dorm recreation room which has been extremely well used and has helped with the girls' leisure hours no end.

We have been able to supply board games for the dorms and for the sick bay, gear bags for sports teams plus many other goods which were required around the school. We also held a book day at the end of the second term which enabled parents to purchase books and donate them to the school library.

The barbeque evenings and sports nights put on by the Friends are

still quite popular and give parents the chance to mix and feel part of the school.

The Friends were very pleased to see our new chaplain at the school for the last term. Alain, our only girl - thank you for your presence for without a kaikaranga our powhiri could never be started.

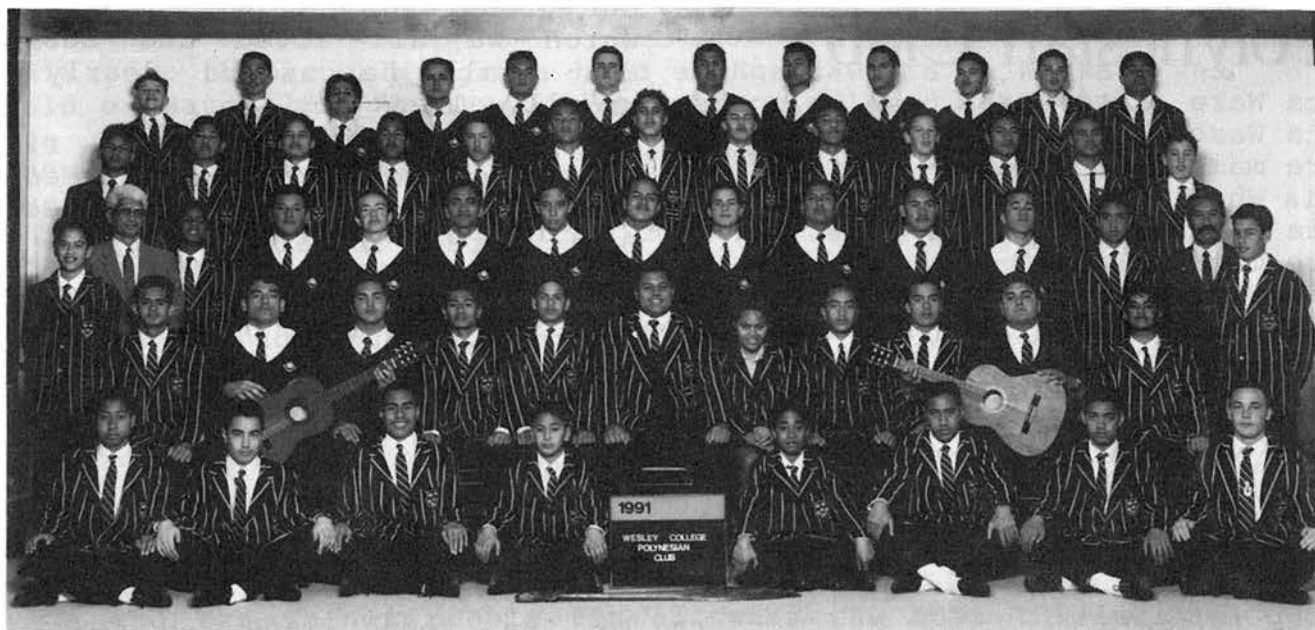

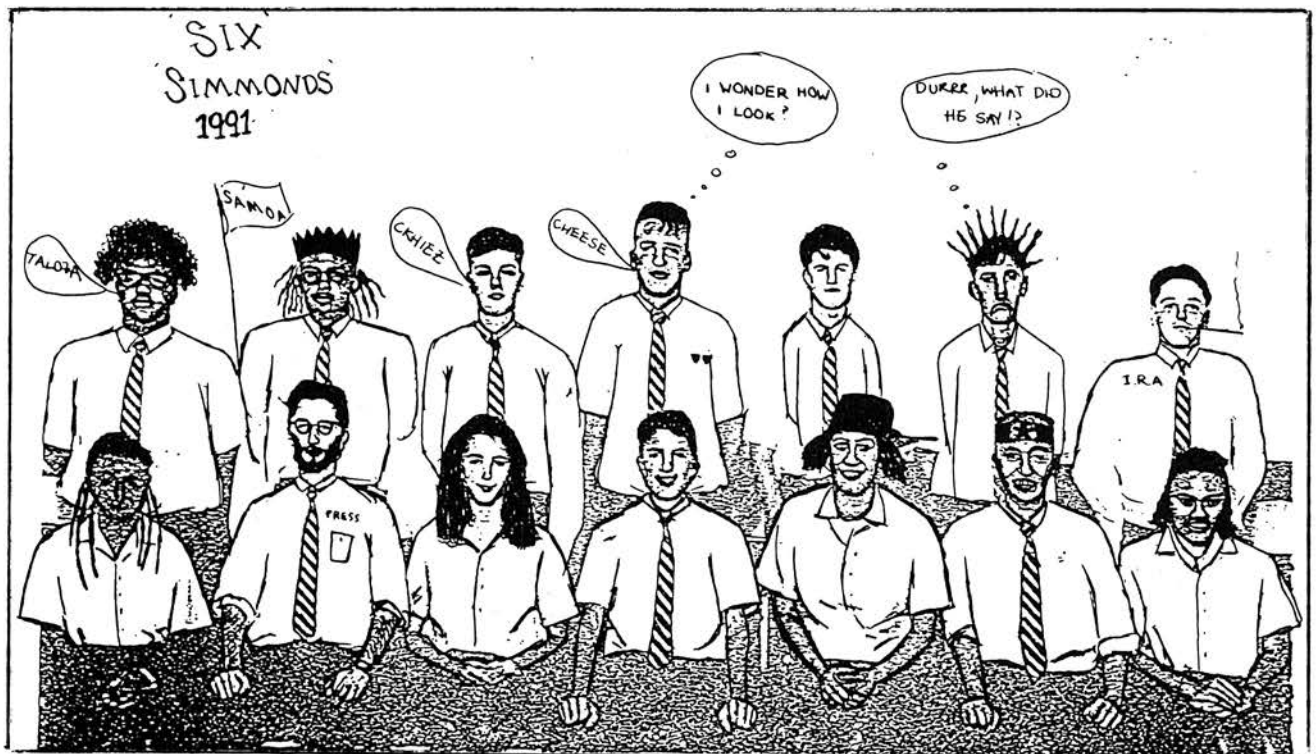

After a good feed we cleaned and weighed our pig, it was about fourty kilograms which wasn't very big but it was a very nice bit of pork.

It was a good bit of exercise for rugby training and a lovely way to spend most of Easter Sunday.

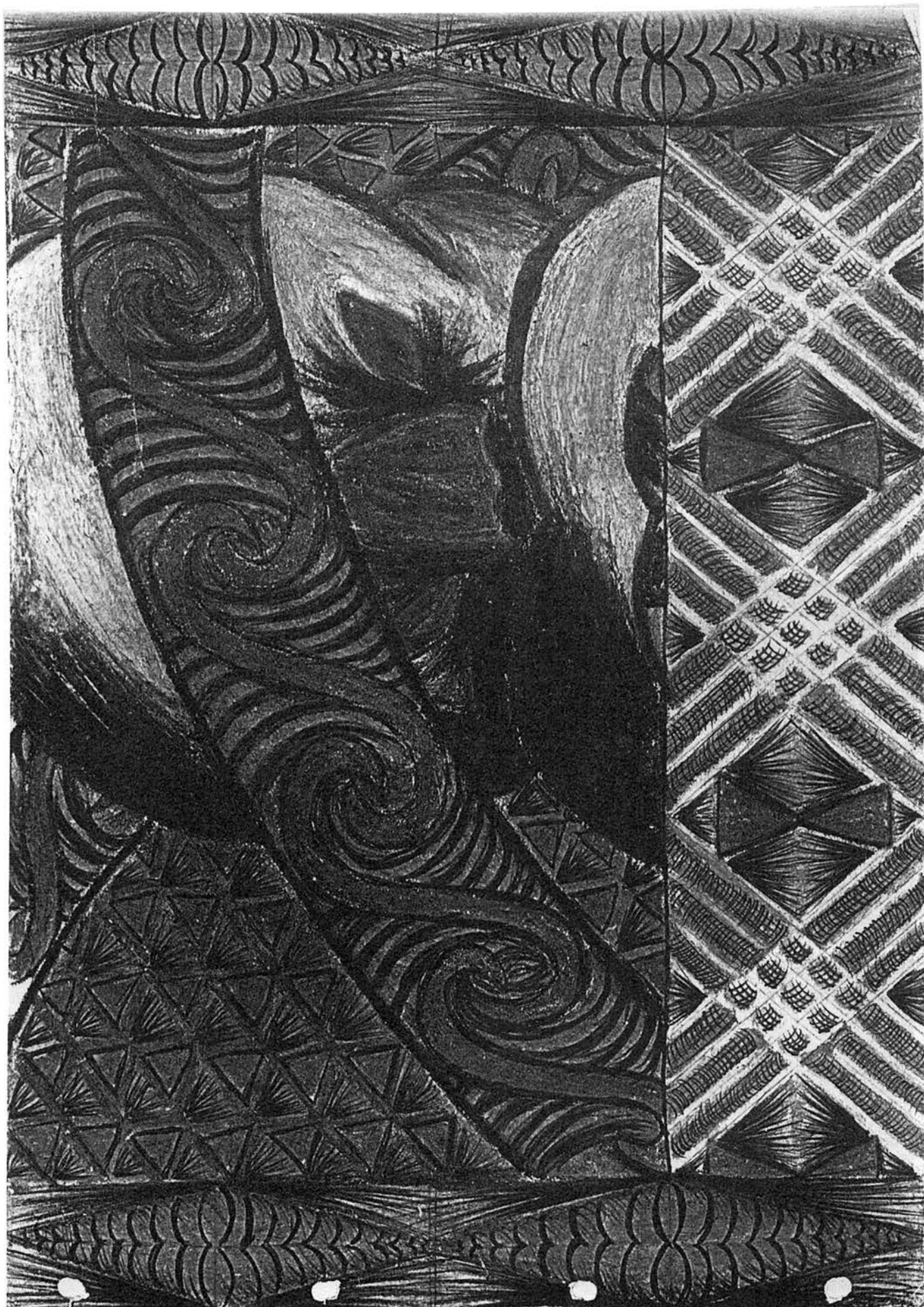

Rosehill won the teams dressage and overall, and Pukekohe One won the Menzies Trophy for turnout.

Our Wesley team made a very brave showing with significant handicaps owing to the number of penalties we carried and the strain expected of our riders in having to ride twice.

The 1991 1st XV season was always, going to be a difficult season following the successful seasons of '89 and '90 and the loss of some outstanding players from last year's team.

The season began extremely well with five huge wins for 262 points however we sustained three critical losses in our traditional games with Te Aute, St Stephens and Church College and we lost the Counties Secondary Schools final to Pukekohe High School. Each loss saw us follow a similar pattern of being 'caught cold' in the first half by determined opposition and then striving hard to play 'catch-up' football.

Let us not dwell on our losses - there were some fine victories too throughout all parts of the season:- A 74 - 6 early season win over Hato Petera; A mid-season 24 - 3 win over Pukekohe High School; A 72 - 3 'farewell' win for Mr Grinter over Western Heights and a 20 - 6 win over a very useful Old Boys team, however the highlight of the season was the 19 - 16 win over Auckland Secondary Schools Champion Mt Albert Grammar School.

These wins in particular displayed that this year's 1st XV still played with the skill and strength of it's predecessors, as Captain Phillip Pihema led a team that contained twelve of last year's New Zealand Champion squad.

Phillip made a working captain and took his job very seriously. No team could have asked for or got more effort from their captain. Phillip deservedly gains the "Contribution to Rugby" Award.

Vice captain Sam Nonoa gained the distinction of double National Representative at both Under 17

and Secondary Schoolboy level. He was top try scorer from fullback with 21 tries made by his athletic and elusive running. His selections at National level reflected Sam's class as both an attacker and a defender.

Jonah Lomu continued to display amazing rugby talents at both lock and No 8, as some of the 14 tries he scored were breath taking in their sheer power and athleticism. His selection for the New Zealand Under 17s is surely just the beginning for such an exceptional rugby talent.

Kenneth Pourewa continued to grace the rugby field with his sweet passing skills and gliding runs. As organizer of the backline he made the decisions and this was reflected in his vice-captaincy role for Counties Secondary Schools and the Northern Region Secondary Schools 'A' Team which won this year's National regional Tournament. Kenneth was then selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools to become a National Representative for the second year in succession, (N.Z. under 17s in 1990).

Joseph Vaha'i, (53 games) in his third year with the team, was a forward who thrived on hard work in both the tight and loose. His assistance to his captain and team in organising forward play was considerable and for this Joe receives the "Most Improved Player Award".

Marcus Topine, at tight-head prop, improved with every game of the 17 he notched up for the 1st XV. He contributed well to the solid performances of the "front five".

Dieter Schindler, who played in every game, produced skilful displays on the wing and later when called in to the centre. He crossed the line on twelve occasions.

Joshua Perham was a valuable utility player and was always "Mr

Reliable" in whatever position he played, (from half-back to wing three-quarter). He was the team's top try scorer with 92 points, (8 tries, 24 conversions and 4 penalties).

Flankers Les Shine and Sweeney Taufa were never far from the ball. Les scored five attractive tries and Sweeney covered every blade of grass with his tireless work at open-side loose forward.

Locks Eroni Puamau and Scott Mabey were hard working "powerhouse" forwards. Eroni had the knack of being in the right place at the right time and some of his five tries, from a full complement of 19 games, were most valuable ones. Scott always made good yardage with his grafting exploits in both the tight and second phase situations.

The 'find' of the season was undoubtedly Cassino Doyle who was converted from loose-forward to right wing-threequarter where his 'hard nosed' running earned him 16 tries from 15 appearances and selection for the North Island Under 16s for whom he also crossed the try line.

Lyall Bowsher, Duley Nicolson and Jason Perham were the other 'senior' members of the team at prop, loose-forward/lock and half-back respectively and made most valuable contributions to the team.

Nathan Stowell and Daniel Fotu made big impressions in the games they played at the latter end of the season. Nathan scored 56 points in 7 games and is developing well at first five-eight. Daniel, playing at left wing averaged a try a game in his 7 appearances and his tackling skills matched his scoring ability.

Tukiri Paki, Waho Walters made up the squad together with Peter Duff, George Manu and Siua Otukolo who made appearances in the final

few games of the season.

Special thanks again must go to the College, parents, old students and friends who continue to consistently support the 1st XV. Your support is and will always be greatly appreciated by the team.

Very special thanks must go to Mr Grinter for all the valuable work he did with the Wesley College 1st XV. The team and incumbent coach wishes him the very best in his promotion as Principal of Rotorua Boys' High School. He will be greatly missed, however, life must go on and I'm sure that Mr Grinter would be the first to emphasize this to next season's 1st XV as they set out to emulate those that have gone before them.

P. Williams and B. Coles reached the Semi-finals of the Junior Boys' Doubles Championship.

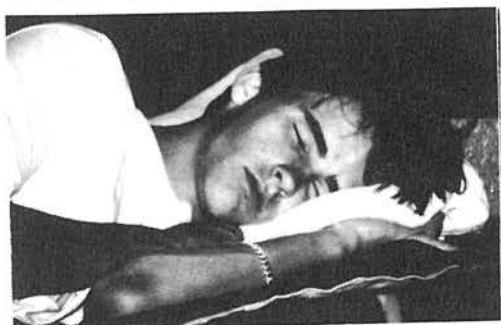

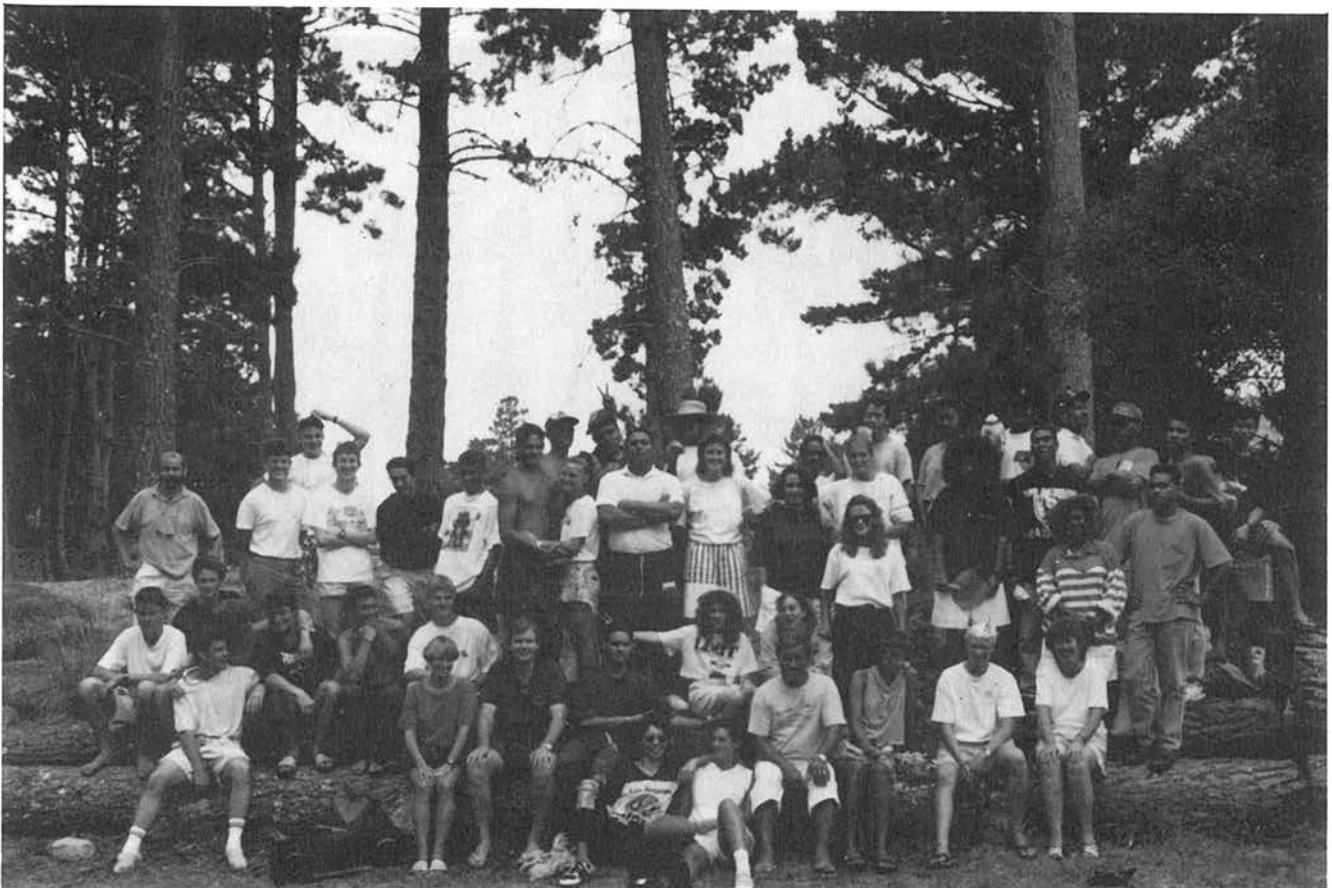

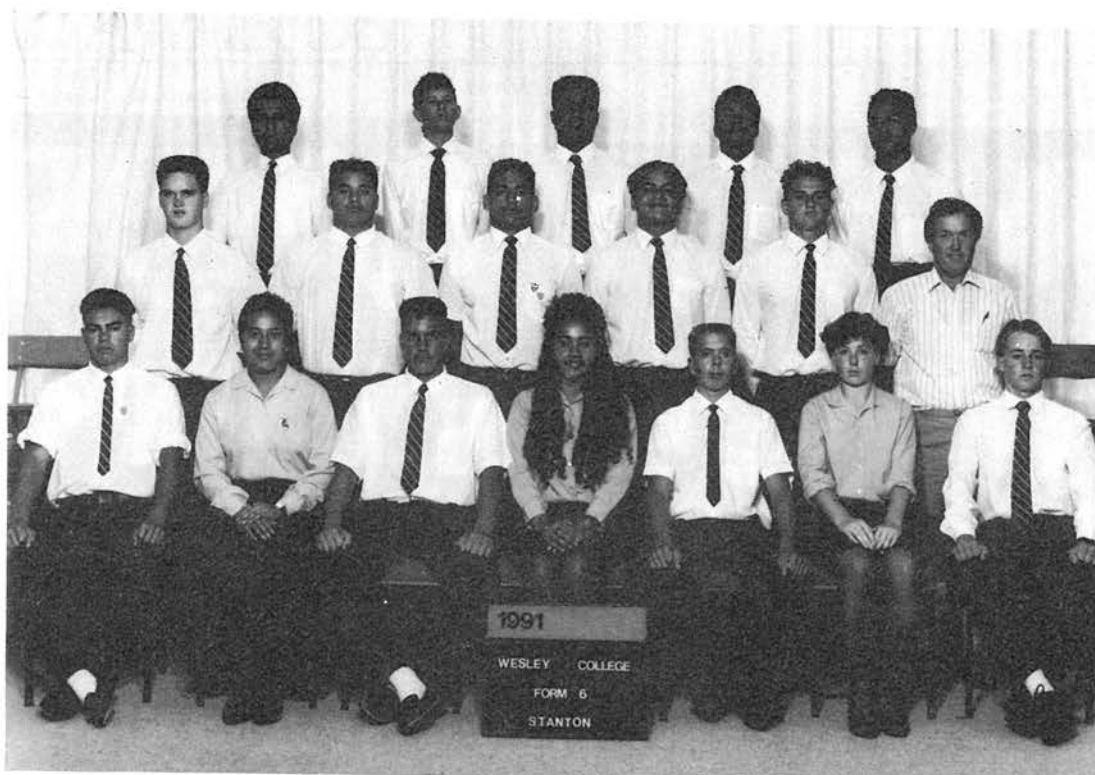
