#### THE CHANGING FACES OF WESLEY

When I was asked to write an article about my time at Wesley, my first thought was that after thirty years I would have no difficulty with such a task. The reality is however, there have been so many things that have occurred, that to write all these thoughts down would require a great deal more space than what I am permitted. My theme, therefore, is one that has not been dealt with and I am in a position to have seen the many physical changes that have occurred in Wesley over this time.


For instance when I came, back in 1967, the office block was on the top road, where the car park is at the moment. The road into the College at that time was not sealed, so the dust was a real problem. The school roll at this stage was about half of what we have now. Mr C Neate was Principal. There were no girls except those that lived on the campus, and naturally they were very popular amongst the student body.

It was in 1967 that we had for the first time seventh form students. The royalties from the scoria pits owned by the Board soared and the financial status of the school funds improved. This was the beginning of the major developments that were to take place. In this year, the new classroom-library-administration block was completed. The present office block was sifted from the top of the road to its present site. The library then is today room 9.

By 1969 the roll had crept up to 237 and the rooms off Harding Hall which were used as music rooms now became bedrooms for students.

Under Mr Tauroa's supervision, having succeeded Mr Neate a year earlier, the quad was transformed into the grass area we have today.

In 1974 the Chapel was enlarged, the interior lightened, the gallery added and the organ refurbished. With Mr Tauroa's appointment as Principal of Tuakau College in 1974, Mr McDougall was appointed Principal.



From the start, Mr McDougall saw the opportunity to join the state sector and integrate the school with state. This was achieved in 1977 when the College took a giant step forward and signed an integration agreement with the Government. Wesley was the first school to integrate with the State system and set a blue print for other schools to follow. The school baths were enlarged at this point and the technical block built.

In this same period, the roll had crept up to 305. New boarding accommodation - namely Caughey Hall, new classrooms, the Hames Music Centre, Chaplain's house and a refurbishment of the kitchen and laundry were all part of this era. The existing hall was also upgraded and the roads tarsealed.

1985 was a year that changed the face of Wesley. Girls were enrolled again at the College after nearly a hundred years. This boosted the roll to 330 boys and 22 girls. With a new Girls' Hostel this brought a new dimension to the College.

During this period the old dormitories in the Junior and Intermediate block were converted into prep rooms and a new complex - Denton Hall was built for the Junior School. To build these, two huge palm trees had to be cut down, which were a pride of the College. However, at least twenty footballs were found cradled amongst the palms, once more to be united with willing rugby fans.

Three years later in 1988, we saw the opening of the John McDougall Library. It was named in honour of the retiring Principal and his wife Pauline for the services both had given the College, in a time of considerable growth.

1994 was an important milestone in the history of the College. Under the leadership of Mr Cowley, preparation for the sesquicentenary year celebration was another milestone. A most impressive recreation hall was opened. Also around this time, the first Day Student complex was built called Watson Lounge, in memory of Graeme Watson, Senior Master of the College from 1966 to 1991. Since then, Te Paea Hall has been added to.

Wesley will continue to grow and old buildings will no doubt be replaced with new ones. But what is more important, is not the changing physical face of Wesley, but the growth and development of young people so they in turn can take their place and build their lives. We hope they utilize the opportunities and training given to them at this College. It is this growth, these opportunities that our young people have, which will determine the ultimate success of Wesley College.

# WESLEY COLLEGE PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

It is gratifying to be able to report so positively on the 1998 school year to date.

Again in 1998 we have had a great group of senior students in the College and it has been a privilege to be associated with them.

As at 1 March, the school roll stood at 413 students of whom 48 were girls and 75 were foreign students.

New teachers who commenced at the College included Mr Jim Field-Mitchell (HOD Technical) while Mrs Ann Field-Mitchell joined the College staff later in the year. At the beginning of the year we welcomed Ms Lorraine Fuller from Felixstowe, UK who had undertaken a teacher exchange with Mr Nick Leger who is due to return in time for the 1999 school year. Mr John Henderson and Mr Warrick Sanson were each appointed as Senior Masters at the College while Mr Chris Bean was appointed HOD Social Sciences and Mrs Annie Sio-Tema HOD English

In late March we farewelled our College Bursar Mrs Barbara Thoresen, who had served the school well over the last decade and welcomed our new Bursar, Mr Chris Johnston.

From its own resources the College employed five more teachers than provided by the Ministry of Education, and abolished the Activities Fee previously paid by parents so that parents also shared in the benefits of the bulk funding of teachers' salaries.

In late July, our two GAP students – Mike Baldock and Richard McPhail – returned to the UK to further their studies and in August we welcomed from the UK Patrick Stone and William Page.

In the NZQA examinations for 1997, the Entrance, results of Universities Bursaries and Scholarships were better than in the previous year. Candidates gained six A awards and six B awards and 21 candidates qualified for entrance to university. Etuini Ma'u, our 1997 Dux, was our most successful candidate, while Susana Vocea gained passes in six subjects. School Certificate results were the usual mixed bag but our top student scored a total of 360 in five subjects and a fourth form student scored a mark of 80% in Science.

Wesley NZEST Scholarship candidates performed quite well in the 1997 examination and although Etuini Ma'u gained 69% in Chemistry, only 'Isi Tupou with 55% in Economics gained a Credit pass.

Last year's senior students who took papers at the Manukau Institute of Technology in the New Zealand Diploma in Business achieved pleasing results. In the Accounting paper, Meleane Mataitonga, Susan Vocea and 'Isi Tupou gained A passes and in all, 8 of 11 candidates passed while in the Economics paper, 8 of 13 candidates passed while Meleane gained an A+ and 'Isi an A grade.

The three candidates who entered the 1997 Young Enterprise Scheme examinations at the Auckland Institute of Technology all gained passes while there were some pleasing exam results in the sixth form private external examination.

In the 1997 University of Otago Senior Science examination, Keith Izett, Ben Henry, Ji-Eun Lee (cash prize), Etuini Ma'u (cash prize), Joe Livu and 'Enny Keaki gained Distinction awards, and a further 19 students gained Merit passes.

In July of this year the College was advised that in the University of New South Wales 1998 Australian Schools Science competition, Keith Izett in Form 7 gained a Distinction pass while Emerson Taylor, also Form 7, gained a High Distinction pass.

A High Distinction pass is for those students who are in the top 1% of the country and a Distinction pass is awarded to the next 10%. This year a record 507,000 participated in the competition which is held annually throughout Australia, New Zealand and the Asia/Pacific region. In the Australian National Chemistry Quiz conducted by the Royal Australian Chemical Institute, Mary Lee gained a Certificate of Merit with Credit in the Senior Division, and Emerson Taylor gained a Certificate of Merit with Distinction in the same Division. In the Senior Schools' Science Quiz conducted by the University of Otago, Keith Izett performed with Merit while Emerson Taylor performed with Distinction and gained a cash prize. Distinction comprises the top 10% and Merit the top 15% for entrants in the In the Australian above quiz. Mathematics competition, Lachlan Bruce in the Senior Division gained a Distinction pass while a further 8 seniors gained Credit passes and 5 students gained Credit passes in the Intermediate Division and 6 students gained Credit passes in the Junior Division.

In sport, College students continued to excel, and it is impossible to do justice to all their achievements. Some that come to mind, however, include:-

- Billy Wallbridge-Paea, who participated in the Club National Athletics championships that were held in Wanganui, where he represented the Counties Manukau area.
- Danny Given who represented the College at the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Cross Country championships in Christchurch, and
- Head Prefect Koli Latailakepa who at the Westpac Trust Counties Manukau Sports Award Dinner was recognised with a significant award when he was presented with the "Fair Play" Award which is recognised across all sports and at all levels within the Region. The 1999 recipient was Errol Brain and it was a marvellous achievement of Koli's for a secondary school student to receive this Award.

- The Wesley girls' soccer team convincingly won the Manukau Counties B Grade competition, while the College 1<sup>st</sup> Soccer XI again won the Counties Manukau A Grade competition and retained the John Adshead Challenge Cup, and seven Wesley students made the playing XI for the Counties Manukau Secondary Schools' Soccer rep team.
- Seilala Mapusua made his debut for the Counties Manukau Steelers rugby team and went on to play for the New Zealand Under 19 rugby team and both he and Hale Tu'uhoko were selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools' rugby team where they represented the College with distinction.
- Sione Kepu was the only schoolboy to be selected for the Nike New Zealand Youth rugby team to tour North America and Wales in November/December of this year.
- were selected for the Counties Manukau secondary schools rep team while three students were selected for the Roller Mills team, five for the Bill McLaren team and seven for the Counties Manukau Under 14 team, six for the Under 15 team, two for the Under 16 team and three for the under 17 team.

The Condor Rugby Football Club invited the College side to play in the National Finals of the New Zealand Secondary Schools Sevens held in Christchurch while the 1<sup>st</sup> rugby XV were runners up in the inaugural LENCO Cup competition, finished in the Top 8 of the New Zealand secondary schools Top 32 competition and won the World Tens Rugby competition held at Macquarie University in Sydney.

The 1<sup>st</sup> XV were delighted to receive sponsorship from Canterbury New Zealand and from the Police Blue Light Committee who are providing \$7,500 over the next three years.

In late March students from the College participated in the Maori and Pacific Islands cultural Festival participating in the non-competitive part of the Maori section as a Polynesian group. The 85 students who participated gave a brilliant performance after which the various leaders were interviewed and the performers were asked to do an encore.

Just before the end of Term 2, a group of ten students and 2 staff from the College represented New Zealand at the first Melanesian Arts Festival and Anniversary Independence of Celebrations in Honiara. The High Commissioner wrote to say that . . . "the Wesley group were exemplary and a credit to the College. They illustrated very well the extent to which new Zealand is becoming more and more a multi-cultural society and they also conveyed well the range of educational facilities available in New Zealand. We were most grateful for their help. As you may know, the Prime Minister thanked them personally during his speech. closing the celebrations. We have received from the general public here and from several senior leaders, glowing reports on their performances, on and off the stage. The publicity they received in the media here was excellent both for New Zealand and for the College too".

In late July the College was visited by a group of students and staff from Tokiwa High School and Mihagino Girls' High School which are in the Kita-kyushu City in Fukuoka prefecture.

In late July the College hosted a group of seven educators from Spain, Sweden and Hong Kong who were accompanied by a small delegation of AFS South Auckland Counties chapter members. The visiting educators were keen to visit a boarding school during their stay in New Zealand and appeared to be very impressed with what they saw and heard during their time at Wesley.

The College was pleased to host from Woodhouse Grove School in England,

Chris Gough and Anthony Ross who spent July and August at Wesley while Mark Price and Patrick Tongi have since left for the United Kingdom to spent Term 4 at Woodhouse Grove School.

On 29 October the College was delighted to welcome the Hon Major-General Sitiveni Rabuka, Prime Minister of the Republic of Fiji Islands and Mrs Rabuka on their first visit to Wesley College.

We are pleased that ShannonTauroa has been accepted for an American Field Service Scholarship exchange and has chosen Argentina as her preferred destination due to its total contrast in both language and culture, while Sarsha Wright has been chosen as a Rotary Exchange scholar to Belgium in 1999. This should be a wonderful experience for Sarsha and we wish her well.

We were delighted in late May when Braden Te Ao was presented at the Turangawaewae Marae with the first Waikato Raupatu Lands Trust cofunded secondary school scholarship which was initiated to identify and support secondary school students with outstanding academic and leadership abilities. The Wesley College Trust Board is the co-funding partner in this award.

During the July holidays Townsend represented the College on a visit to the Pacific Islands and on this occasion, visited the Solomon Islands and Papua New Guinea while Rev Tema and Mrs Tema visited Samoa and Tonga. Such trips enable staff to meet the parents of existing students, potential new students and various Government and Church representatives.

During the course of the year, the College was subjected to a number of reviews, the first of which was initiated by the Wesley College Trust Board and the second a Discretionary Audit conducted by the Education Review Office. Both of these Reviews

identified a number of governance and management issues to be addressed and an urgent need for the College's two governing bodies to work closely together.

Early in March, our College Prefects were appointed. I particularly wish to acknowledge their contribution to the 1998 school year and especially thank the Deputy Head Prefects Mary Lee and Seilala Mapusua, and Head Prefect, Koli Latailakepa, for their outstanding leadership throughout the year. I have enormous respect and admiration for our senior school Prefects and the Prefects as a whole for their leadership and contribution to College life.

We were grateful early in the year to provide the school campus to Camp Quality, a non-profit all volunteer organisation providing a camping experience and much more for children with cancer. In a similar way, the campus was provided to CCS New Zealand for a mini-olympics in mid-April when a large group comprising 300-350 people mostly disabled and wheelchair-bound athletes undertook their programme of competition.

In May and October the Auckland Regional Blood Services Collection team visited the College to collect blood donations from staff and senior students as part of the College's contribution to our wider community.

In mid-September the College Ball was held at the "Strand Function Centre" and the evening was a great success not only from the College's point of view but also it was acknowledged by the Function Centre's Manager and the Manager of transport services who commended our pupils on their behaviour.

To date this year, we have been notified of the academic successes of 12 former students who have graduated from New Zealand universities in a wide variety of disciplines but because of New Zealand's privacy laws we are not necessarily informed of all former students' successes.

In mid-December the High Court finally approved the disbursement of the Sherwood Trust money to the Wesley College Trust Board to be used for the provision of scholarships, for the erection of new buildings and the maintenance of existing ones. money will make an difference to the future of the College where a major day student centre is currently being built. We look forward with optimism to the erection of a whare wananga and the erection in 1999 of a new dining room, kitchen and laundry facilities. The nearly \$200,000 that the Wesley College board of Governors has spent on new drainage, sand slitting, sand blankets and the resowing of the turf on the front playing fields has resulted in a major improvement to this amenity.

In late October the second of our annual Coaches' Dinners was held with Peter Fatialofa as our guest speaker. Some 50 people were present and all in all it was a most successful occasion organised by John Henderson.

At the end of the year we will farewell Paul Burt after 33 years of faithful service to the College, and we wish he and his wife Betty all the best in his retirement. Also our Chaplain of the last four years – Rev George Bryant – and we wish him well for the future. We are delighted that Rev Stephen Tema has been appointed as Chaplain to a one year part-time position.

1998 has been a wonderful year in the life of the College. My thanks to all students but in particular to our senior students and our staff.

My thanks are extended to Miss Gail Townsend and her team for compiling and editing the "Collegian 1998" and I particularly wish to acknowledge and thank Gail's mother – Mrs Townsend – for her typing of this magazine.

#### MR PAUL BURT

Anyone who teaches more than 30 years at any one school deserves a gold medal. Mr Paul Burt did just that.

He joined the staff at Wesley in the second term, 1967, as a science and chemistry teacher, having previously taught in Kaeo and at St Stephens. Later he developed an interest in biology, gaining a responsibility position in the subject. He also gained a responsibility position in charge of audiovisual equipment.

For a period of 14 years he variously marked School Certificate, University Entrance and Combined Schools' exam papers in biology and science.

Extra-curricular activities included the photography club which processed all the school's own colour film for the school magazine and for other purposes as well as producing Christmas cards.

Mr Burt started a yacht club with 15 boys regularly racing at Clark's Beach. He coached a variety of rugby teams and more recently developed an interest in first eleven hockey. For 20 years he was in teacher-in-charge of Stanton House and for 15 years was in charge of the 'Day Boys'.


During his Wesley career Mr. Burt has witnessed many changes, the school having grown from less than 200 to its present size of over 400 as well as the first girls who came to Wesley. 'We were not quite sure how to handle them,' he confesses. 'We tended to isolate them at first'. However, we soon learnt quickly to integrate them.'

changes in the student body he noted that fee-paying students used to have 'drive and initiative'. They wanted to succeed. But too many today lack that initiative. There is, unfortunately, a lack of desire to improve oneself and more of a tendency to 'go along with the crowd'.

In his early days he was often seen with his head in a car engine. stripping it down. He is known to have been somewhat of a builder too, working with the maintenance staff one holiday period to construct a theatre-et in Room 5. which was demolished a couple of years ago. And he constructed his own holiday home and, in fact, has built three houses. Mr Burt's keen sense of humor is legendary, as is his stature as a 'family' man. For 12 years he and his family lived on the school property.

One of the longest-serving members of staff Mr Burt now retires - to help his daughter with a building program and, perhaps, do some relief teaching. We give thanks and praise for Mr Paul Burt's contribution and loyalty to Wesley College. We will surely miss him. We wish him a happy and fruitful retirement. Rev. G. Bryant



To those who are returning, I leave you with a proverb:







## The Honiara Trip

At the invitation of the New Zealand High Commission in Honiara a group of students attended the above festival. Leaving just before the end of term 2, the group were in Honiara for a total of 13 days. The group sponsored by the High Commission consisted of 10 students and 2 staff, thanks to funding made available by the Board we were able to take an additional 2 students. The group was also joined by another staff member and Riku Pentikainen our current AFS students.

The High Commission had planned that we used the first week to acclimatise to the rather drastic change in weather. We did so but also included a few warm-up performances. The first performance was at Chung Wah school . This is the old school of current students Mary Lee and Rachel Sibisopere. We also had 2 evenings of fellowship and performance with Kukum Catholic Parish and Wesley United Church. On the Sunday we attended Wesley United Church and the students sang during the service. The group was treated with a trip around the coast during this week and an interesting visit to a Clam Farm.

The second week of the trip was predominantly based around the official festival with 6 performances over the 4 days. As well as performances at the main Festival Village, The National Museum (2 performances) and KGVI Secondary School we also performed at Oil Plantation about 1 hour east of Honiara ( home of current student Bethry Maefunu) and at Kohimarama, Anglican mission in the Solomons which is an hour to the west of Honiara. Given the condition of the roads and amount of traffic in Honiara we were thankful that these last two performances were not the same day.

As well as the Wesley group there were 91 performers from Papua New Guinea, 102 from Vanuatu, 56 from Fiji, a group from New Caledonia and a small group from Taiwan in addition to the many groups from different regions of the Solomons involved in the Festival.

The student performances were appreciatively received their audiences.The performances were predominantly Solomon dances but also included Haka as well as items from Kiribati, Tonga and Samoa. A number of old boys would always be on hand and give encouragement and support to the students. Any person associated with the College can be very proud of the students who represented them both on the stage and in their general behaviour in public. It was a wonderful experience for all of them and they certainly made the most of it and participated in all opportunities offered to them.

Many people must be thanked for their role in supporting this trip. The Board for allowing the trip to happen and giving financial support. The families of our students in Honiara - the Poloso's, Pitisopa's, Harihiru and Sibisopere's and especially the Ziru family who hosted the 9 boys in their Guest House. Our thanks also to Rhys and Margaret Richards (the High Commissioner and his wife) not only for inviting Wesley College to the festival but for their hospitality in providing the pool, food and pig which were all greatly appreciated by the students.

This report only skims the surface of the experiences of the group in Honiara. The support offered to the group by the family of Wesley both here in New Zealand and in the Solomons is without appropriate words. It was an honour to work with the students and be with them at the Festival.



## The Honiara Trip

(THE STUDENT VERSION)

This year Wesley College was privileged to be chosen by the New Zealand High Commissioner in the Solomon Islands to represent New Zealand at the first ever Melanesian Arts Festival. The festival was held to bring together Vanuatu, New Caledonia, PNG, Fiji and the Solomon Islands to share their diverse cultures.

Our group of twelve students was selected by the school. This included, six from the Solomons, two from Tonga and New Zealand, and one each from PNG and Kiribati. All the dances were choreographed by us but it wasn't easy. We all found difficulties in both pronouncing words and learning the steps of the dances.

All too soon it was departure day, and it arrived with mixed feelings. Some of us were going home while some were leaving home for the first time, anxiously but excitedly anticipating the unknown.

Our flight lasted about six hours via Fiji. We were met at Henderson International Airport by a representative of the N.Z. High Commission and parents of the Solomon students with beautiful frangipani leis. The boys were whisked away to Pakoe Lodge owned by Calvin Ziru's family. We, the girls were taken to, our various homes by our families.

The first week was spent sight-seeing, practising and just basically settling into a new environment. This included the food, the places and the people. It was also a great change from a wet, cold winter to a hot and humid Solomon climate.

Our first 'rehearsal' performances were held at Chung Wah Primary School, the Kukum Catholic Parish and the Wesley United Church Youth Fellowship.

One of the highlights of the trip was our day out at Tambea Beach Resort which was a treat from the N.Z. High Commissioners wife. We had a buffet lunch and later went swimming, kayaking and Tiopira got his first taste of climbing a coconut tree. On the way back, sitting on the back of the utes, the boys could easily have passed for local S. Islanders with their red stained mouths. The effects of a local favourite....BETEL NUT

Another highlight was the family gettogether at Pakoe Lodge. It was a lively evening with lots of food to tuck into. Entertainment was provided by all... from a fierce Haka by Mr. Tema and Mr. Sibisopere to Ringrose's version of the N.Z. anthem......Veva's awesome hip work to 'Waikiki Tamure' was soon challenged by Riku and Ms Townsend's body movements to 'La bamba'. Mr. Tema's serenade with a ukelele to Mrs. Tema saw her swaying gracefully from side to side.

The next day we attended the Wesley United Church moming service and presented two items as a group and another by BLESS.

The last week was very busy with performances every day at different venues. These included the National Museum, the Annual Trade Show and satellite performances at out- of-town areas like Kohimarama and SIPL.

The main show for us was at the Festival Village. We were dressed in our different traditional costumes. From shell money, colourful grass skirts of the Tongan duo, Sola and Sione to the moko and body paints, we were hyped and took the crowd by storm. The Haka were led by Tiopira and Sione with the crowd favourite, the Botikuru led by Sam. The Samoan Sasa and Malaitan dances were also performed. It was a proud moment for all of us to come together and share a bit of our culture despite our different backgrounds.




Another highlight of the year, the Winstone House Speech Competition organised by Mrs Menzies was a great success.

Australian The Annual Mathematics Competition was held during the third term. This is a multi choice test where marks are subtracted for wrong answers. 
#### Social Sciences

Ring, ring, ring, back into class typing on the computer, writing about a blood dripping monster.


Ring, ring, ring, the bell goes for lunch. We go back to the tramps after eating in the dining room - thank-fully I wasn't on dining room duty.

A special thanks to Danny Given, Caleb Preston, Richard Mooney and their families who gave up their Saturday afternoons to support the team over the Christmas Holidays.



# 1st XV Report -1998

### GOALS

The goals for the season were set as follows:-

- 1. To constantly perform to the best of our abilities.
- 2.To retain the Counties-Manukau 1st Round trophy.
- 3.To represent Counties-Manukau in the top 32 and defend our Nike National Title.
- 4.To win the Lenco Cup Competition. (a new Waikato/ Bay of Plenty/ Counties-Manukau competition)
- 5.To retain the Counties-Manukau Sevens Title.
- 6. To win the NZ group and the world Schoolboys Tens Rugby (Australia).
- 7.To win all our traditional games and retain all trophies.
- 8.To gain representative honours for as many players as possible.

We retained the Counties- Manukau 1st Round Trophy, losing only to Waiuku college, (A game played on our behalf by the 2nd XV).

We were the top qualifier for the Lenco Cup. However, a change in format saw us having to play a semi-final and final. We defeated Matamata College in the semi-final, but narrowly lost the final to Western Heights, finishing as runner-up.

By defeating St Stephens and Papakura High defaulting we gained the honour to represent Counties Manukau in the national Top 32. We defeated Papatoetoe High (Top 32) and Westlake Boys (Top 16). We lost to Kelston Boys in the quarter final (Top 8).

The Counties-Manukau Sevens Title was won by defeating Pukekohe High School in the semi-final and Wesley 'B' in the Final. In the national sevens round robin, we lost to St.Kentigerns, the losing finalists.

A very successful one week tour of Australia took place in July. We were unbeaten in 2 games of 15-a-side and 7 games in the World Schoolboys Tens Rugby Tournament. By winning the NZ Group Tens Tournament, we gained the honour to represent New Zealand in the World Tens Tournament in Sydney. We conceded only 2 tries in winning this prestigious tournament which was televised live on Australian television.

We won our traditional games against Te Aute, St Stephens, Western Heights and the old boys. Due to circumstances beyond our control we did not play Rotorua Boys High School. However, we lost to Church College after successfully defending the trophy for the last five seasons.

Twelve players were selected for the Counties-Manukau Secondary Schools (one withdrew) 4 selected for Northerr region 'A', 2 for new Zealand Secondary Schools and 1 for New Zealand Under 19

The disappointments were few but included:-

- Losing the Lenco cup final to Western Heights by 3 points under trying circumstances.
- Losing to St Kentigerns in the National Sevens by 3 points due to poor refereeing.

- Losing the Vince Asher Memorial Trophy to Church college after holding it for the last five years.
- Playing with only 14 players only 15 minutes into the game against Kelston Boys and losing.
- Not making the trip to the World Cup Schoolboys Rugby in Zimbabwe.
- Not playing the traditional game against Rotorua Boys High, but hopefully it will be played next year.

### THE PLAYERS

The skills, strength and dedication displayed by the players of this years 1st XV were extra-ordinary. We had a very competitive forward pack, competing well in set pieces- scrums, line outs, rusks and mauls and in general support play.



#### Sports Coaches Dinner.


The annual Sports Coaches Dinner was held on the 22nd October.

## James Beever 1913 - 1998

Jim Beever, a prominent former Wesley student, later member of the Trust Board and Fellow of Wesley, died in October 1998.

His parents were immigrants from Yorkshire, staunch Methodists who settled at Huntly when it was a tent-town and his father was a miner there. Jim was sent to Wesley in 1926 at great sacrifice to find the fifty pound fee. He was keen on tennis and debating and in 1929 was Dux, Prefect and won a gold medal for Scripture. He was the first "Form Six" student.

At age 16 he became a pupil teacher, and over forty years taught in some twenty schools, graduated BA, Dip. Ed., Dip Tchg and was finally the Deputy Principal at Tamaki College.

Wesley meant much to him. He returned to College while with the army during the war. He was President of the Old Boys Association, and in 1996 was asked to join the Trust Board. He served on the College Committee, was closely involved with the progress towards Integration and took a great interest in the campus.

A kind and gentle man, he was studious and a serious botanist. It is fitting that the native grove and the fine avenue of trees which he planned and planted alongside the man entrance drive will endure and will remind us of him.
