



Editorial

It's the end of another year. Collegian is being published, as it is every year, to record and reflect on the life of the Wesley community in 2002. What has been achieved? What were the highlights, the important events, the proud moments, even the disappointments?

2002 hasn't been any old year. It's big. Sure, students have arrived and left. Staff have moved on, and new staff have arrived. In one case a new staff speed record for departure was achieved. But that's all pretty normal stuff. The real milestone has been the farewell to our Principal and the appointment of his replacement. That is cause for all of us to reflect more than usual on what the New Year will bring.

Over recent weeks there have been numerous farewells to Mr and Mrs Cowley, both formal and informal. We have recalled their immense contribution to the life of the College over many years. For me, as a recent arrival, it has been enlightening. I have had the opportunity to hear stories of Wesley from more than ten years ago and compare those accounts with the school I see today. Much of the progress is obvious - for example, fine new facilities, an increased roll and an improved financial position. But there have been other more important changes, in attitudes and customs - in short, to the culture of the place. Such change always comes at a price, for change can be difficult. But what I have detected is a near consensus that in many important respects Wesley is now a




better place than it was. That is some legacy.

As we look forward to a new era we can be certain that Weslev will continue to develop. There will be more change, and inevitably the fact of change itself may be a source of fear and (dare I say it). even loathing. Like it or not, in another ten years time Wesley will be a very different place again, and in the meantime each of us while we are here has a part to play in ensuring that it will also be better. Of course important constants will remain, and we should guard them jealously: the special character, the worthwhile traditions. opportunities to address the many challenges confronting Wesley should also be embraced. It is important to look forward, to be restless, to move. Nostalgia is an indulgence of the inert.

Students leaving Wesley: you too are entering a new season and are likely to be very different people in ten years time. If pursuing tertiary education or some other training you will be exposed to new ideas and insights. You will meet people from different backgrounds, experiences, cultures and religions. Every such encounter will shape you slightly. You will be given cause to question

assumptions, examine your attitudes and revise your opinions. You will know security, peace of mind and certainty. But inevitably there will also be disappointment, bruising, grief and doubt.

Scary? Of course. But not so scary when you consider your ability to ride the waves. Wesley has given you many gifts that will equip you in the years ahead. Not only brain training, but a range of other skills. Perhaps most important have been your experiences of Wesley as a community. Mr Cowley made this point at his farewell, when he described Wesley as both unique and special. It is most certainly both those things. The terms of its founding, the length of its existence, the intensity of its spirit, its cultural diversity, and the powerful inter-personal bonds inevitable in a school where so many live on site. That particular mix of ingredients is something that probably no other New Zealand school enjoys.



Perhaps one of the frustrations for Wesleyans is the mysterious nature of its character. It is actually really difficult to explain to those looking in why the place rocks. And there lies the challenge for us: to be positive and proud. Not proud in a conceited, defensive way, that admits of no criticism. But proud in the sense that we love what we are, know we have something important to offer. and are confident we will move from strength to strength.

Leavers, you emerge from Wesley into an increasingly challenging world, and I reckon you are well placed to take that world on. In short, your time here should have equipped you to make an important and meaningful contribution as citizens, and to be agents for respect, understanding, tolerance and peace.

The final word goes to Ben Okri, a Nigerian poet reflecting on the wonder of the Journey, to whom my Year 11 English class was introduced way back in February (before they discovered the pleasure of mocking my lack of hair). It is a special word for the leavers, but at the end of this year of all years is apt for us all.

"Be grateful for the manifold Dreams of creation And the many ways of the unnumbered peoples.

Be grateful for life as you live it.
And may a wonderful light
Always guide you on the unfolding road."



Doris and I wish to give Seasonal Greetings to all, and to pupil's leaving, all the best for the future, and to those coming back, see you next year! Have a great holiday.



There are many sports that the students can play, and the most popular seem to be volleyball, basketball and badminton, with most of the students excelling and demonstrating their skills enthusiastically.






The two squash courts do not appear to be as popular with the students, as other facilities are available.

Some students were then taught how to make tukutuku panels and to prepare flax for the making of piupiu. In all, the eight days spent weaving, were intense, enjoyable and filled with heaps of learning. All the Maori language classes were privileged to be part of Te Raranga Haraheke.

With great support from the school, families and Old Students, we came up with the two items that would rock the worlds of screaming people out there – the Mako and the Kailao.


High emotion struck the leavers at the build-ups to the big day, everyone in the group started to feel as one and at that very moment – we were ready.


The sounds of screaming girls and the beeping of car-horns excited us as the MC pronounced "Wesley Tongan Group next".


Entering the stage with the Mako caught the attention of the crowd and ending with the Kailao left everyone asking for more.

eleven players from year 7 and twelve from year 8.







Obituaries

Harold Denton 1913-2002

Born in Wanganui on 5th June, 1913, Harold Denton was almost a lifetime member of Wesley College.

He began his secondary schooling in 1927 at Wesley where his grandfather – Rev Dr William Morley had been principal from 1892-1893.

Harold was at various times a journalist, Army Captain, Operations Assistant for TEAL with a passion for tourism; and always had a strong interest and involvement in the Church. He was appointed President of PATA in 1972 and became a life member. Also in 1972 he was awarded the JSM by the King of Malaysia.

Harold was very proud of his children and encouraged them in their academic studies.

He was a member of the Wesley College Trust Board for 35 years and was Chairman for 15 of those years. Harold played a key role in developing the facilities at the College and led the Trust Board through many of the dormitory and classroom upgrades. In 1990, he was invested as a Fellow of Wesley.

Harold was a man of deep faith, of Christian ideals and principles and service to others. He is remembered with enormous affection by many people in different walks of life. At Wesley his name will be a continual reminder as long as boys make their beds and live in Denton Hall.

Robert Fordyce 1921-2002

Mr Fordyce, a former teacher of English, and History and Head of Foreign Languages in the College worked here from 1969 to 1976. He has had a long association with the College as his daughter and son also taught here at the school.

Robert Fordyce retired in 1977 and he is fondly remembered by some of the staff for his strong Christian faith, his passion for teaching, a loving family man and his enjoyment of the outdoors in his regular walks. He is survived by his wife Olive, his five children and his grandchildren.




