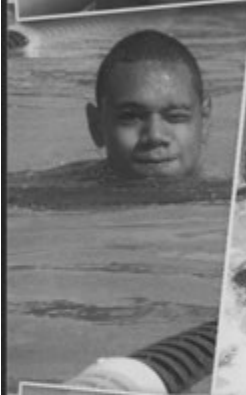

Editorial

Reflections on my Life and Wesley College



My career in education began in 1963 when I was awarded a Studentship to complete my university degree, undergo teacher training and then teach under a bond for the number of years I held the award.

This was a great scheme because it paid me a living wage while I was at University. In those days there were no tuition fees for tertiary study. The government effectively covered the costs and it benefitted by having a constant stream of trained teachers to utilize.

That was unfortunately a different time and a different place but I would probably not have gone to university had that facility not been there.

My parents died when I was quite young - 12 and 16 years old for mum and dad respectively. I never knew my dad because my parents had separated early in my life. When they had both gone what was I to do? I was fortunate to have a loving sister, 12 years older than me who agreed to take me in and provide for me through my teenage years and until my marriage in 1967. I was so grateful to have had someone there to pick me up and support me. For many students that is exactly what Wesley College does too.

Wesley is like the caring family which provides the necessities of life for a lot of young people who would otherwise miss out. This is why I grew to love this place and to feel valued by those whom we were able to nurture successfully into their young adult life.

Wesley does more than just provide food and shelter and education, it also provides community and spiritual nourishment so it eats into the heart and minds of its students and becomes an attachment for life. For a school of only around 300 students it is quite amazing to discover people all over the world who have a connection to Wesley. The student code becomes the enduring identity among past pupils... I remember the comment made by Jonah Lomu early in his rugby career when he was feeling somewhat lost in an overseas city a passer-by addressed him as LOMJO and he immediately knew he had a close friend nearby, someone who had shared the trials of a boarding school life.

The endearing features of Wesley which become ingrained in our souls are the Chapel Singing, the Choral Contests, the Inter-house sports events, the rugby, the drama, the artworks, the school Balls, the formal dinners, the hakas at swimming sports and on other spontaneous occasions. I will never know how or when the chants are learned so quickly and so completely by the whole school in what seems to be no time at all. The special Chapel services on the church calendar and the hosting of the Methodist Conference from time to time have been additional highlights.

I would have to rank the Prizegivings as one of the highlights of every year for me because that was when I got to meet and share the award winners with the school, their families and the wider community. I am and will continue to watch the progress through life of the school duxes and the head students. They are special people. I must also acknowledge the times I have spent with GAP students over the years. I have really appreciated these young people who have travelled from the other side of the world to expand their own horizons while helping out at our school.

In over 14 years I have absorbed the character of this school. I have been dismayed sometimes, stressed, and upset but I have also been elated and delighted to have worked with so many skilled and talented colleagues and to have been involved in the education of young people who will be our future leaders.

Thank-you Wesley College for what you have given me and may God bless all who have shared my time with me and be with those who are yet to come.

Always remember 'Fide Literis Labore' and of course 'Once a Wesleyan Always a Wesleyan'!

Principal's Prizegiving Address

Mrs Easther, honoured guests, ladies and gentlemen, fellow staff and pupils of Wesley College, it is my privilege to speak as Principal at this the 166th anniversary of the foundation of the school that we now know as Wesley College, Paerata.

At this ceremony I wish to highlight two events that have happened this year.

The first is the revision of our Special Character statement that was approved by the Minister of Education in May. The original 1976 document has been updated to provide a more contemporary view of the Methodist Church of New Zealand – Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa. The new statement was recently included in full in the Principal's Newsletter. It is a carefully worded document that provides the touchstone against which everything that we do is to be measured.

The second event that I wish to highlight is the recent visit of the Education Review Office. For some years the Review Office has taken a close interest in Wesley College. After listening to the feedback at the conclusion of this review, it is my belief that both hostel and school will return to the normal cycle of review. My heart was strangely warmed (if I may use that very Wesleyan phrase) as I heard comments describing students as proud of their school, confident and aspirational. In addition, the teaching staff were affirmed as being hard-working and being well placed to develop a curriculum to support student achievement. I compliment each of the senior staff members who are part of the curriculum lead team on their knowledge of current curriculum requirements and their energy to debate and put these requirements into practice. They are an example to us all. In my view this affirmation of adults can be extended to all those who are role models for the young people in our community. House Parents, Sports' Coaches and Managers, Office and Support Staff, Grounds, Laundry, Catering and Maintenance Staff all play their part. Many adults go beyond what might be expected and willingly contribute their time and gifts to ensure that students have the opportunity to succeed. I am expecting the unconfirmed report within the next few days. The Board of Trustees will then have a two-week opportunity to comment before the report becomes public. As soon as the report is public I will post it on the College website. Copies will be available from the Office.

There are some I wish to particularly thank at this time.

Teachers Mr Vunidilo, Miss Taylor and Mrs Autagavaia complete the team of their current appointment. Thank you. Two permanent teachers leave at the end of this year. Matua Sonny Livingstone and Mr Penisimani Tapueluelu have each added significantly to the life of the College and I thank them for the skills they have offered and wish them well for the future. Matua Sonny is currently in Auckland Hospital and we pray for his return to better health.

Mr and Mrs Reeve were honoured last night at our

Leavers' Dinner as they conclude some 45 years of association with the College. Doris and Owen advise me that while their formal association has come to an end they will continue to be part of our Parish and will continue to be very interested in our activities. We will continue to welcome them into this place.

Also honoured last night was Rev John Murray who has stepped down from the Wesley College Trust Board after 15 years' service. For most of this time he has been Chair of the Board and a Proprietor's Representative on the Board of Trustees. For the past two years he has been a member of the newly formed Hostel Council. I publicly thank John for his mentoring of the Principal during my 8 years in this role.

For those who leave Wesley College this year I share some words once spoken by the great humanitarian and Christian writer Albert Schweitzer. Albert Schweitzer was born into a privileged life in that part of Germany called Alsace. He chose to walk another way, renounce his privilege and to share his gifts as a doctor with the very poor in that country in West Africa we now know as Gabon. After his retirement Albert Schweitzer was the guest speaker at the graduating ceremony of an English public school. It is recorded that he made this comment to the leavers: I do not know what your destiny will be, but one thing I know is the ones among you who will be really happy are those who have sought and found how to serve. In the same spirit, I charge the Wesley College leavers of 2010 to offer yourselves in service to your communities. Albert Schweitzer is also recorded to have said: Sometimes our light goes out but it is blown into flame by another human being. Each of us owes deepest thanks to those who have rekindled this light. Each leaver and each person here present has the opportunity to hear these words that Schweitzer has gifted to us. Service to others and sharing the light is a responsibility we may all share and is a gift we may give to everyone.

In conclusion, I ask the question once asked by the prophet Micah: What does the Lord require of you? And, together may we answer in the words of our School Prayer: To act justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with my God. God help me to: do all the good I can, by all the means I can, in all the ways I can, at all the times I can, to all the people I can, as long as I ever can. Amen. No reira. He mere kirihemete me te tau hou ki a koutou katoa. Kia kaka, kia maia, kia manawanui ki nga whanau o te kariti. Tena koutou, tena koutou, tena tatou katoa.



Chaplaincy Report

The beginning of the school year coincided with the beginning of the Connexional year, hence a busy start for the Chaplaincy Team – fulfilling roles within the school as well as Connexional duties in the wider Methodist family. Wesley College was represented by the Chaplaincy Team and students at various Induction services during the month of February. They were for Rev Dale Peach at Waiuku, Rev Augusten Subhan at Papatoetoe, Rev Setaita Kinahoi-Veikune at Mangere, Vahefonua Tonga, Rev Kalo Kaisa at Mangere-Otahuhu, Rev 'Alipate 'Uhila at Glen Eden, and Rev Rex Nathan at Otarei Marae, Dargaville, Te Taha Maori. This is Wesley College's way of showing that we belong to the Methodist Church family.

The 'Service of Beginnings' to mark the start of the School Year is normally held on the first Sunday of the Term 1. This service is the responsibility of the Presidential Team of Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa. And due to the Presidential Team's commitment to the Waitangi Day Celebrations on the first week-end of School year, the Service of Beginnings was held on Thursday of the first week. This was led by President Rev Alan Upson (former Chaplain at Wesley College) and Vice-President Ms Lana Lazarus (a Trust Board member of the College). The School was proud to claim the President and Vice-President of the Church as our own.

Through the relationship with the wider Methodist family, Wesley College has been blessed with the financial contributions that assist our students. For example, the ongoing generous support of the Robert Gibson Trust every year; the Manukau District Synod this year supported the Year 13 camp and the Prefects' Training. Other help from the church includes the Hamilton East and the Hamilton Central Parishes paying for the school fees of two students. These are some of the gifts that help us reach out to some of our students who would not have otherwise been able to have such opportunities.

The Chaplaincy Team continues to guide, resource, advocate for and encourage the School community in living out of the Special Character of the School. Apart from the daily morning devotions, and distributing via email of the daily chapel message, copies of the School Prayer and Character Statement are in classrooms, hostels and in all students' diaries. The two Worship Services on Sundays continue to take place at 10am and 7pm.

The Chaplaincy Team also continues with its Primary Task of Pastoral Care for the community. The settling in process this year took longer for some, especially the new students to 'boarding' for a variety of reasons. These included homesickness, unable to sleep in a new place, the dorm was too big, not used to sharing

space, not used to having own space, and all that is associated with settling into a new environment. Anyway, the open door policy of the Chaplaincy Team continues to encourage students, staff, caregivers, parents, and visitors to walk in and offload, as well as share their stories or just to clear their minds.

One of the biggest challenges we face is the presence of illegal and unacceptable stuff like marijuana in the school, brought in by students on their return from holidays. The school dealt with this in the best way possible, including referring to the police. However, it is a reality – the contradiction between what is acceptable at school and what is deemed acceptable at home.

The Chaplaincy Team for 2010 is the same as 2009. They are Whaea Paewhenua Nathan, Chaplain Maori, Rev Ali'itasi Salesa, Head of Life and Faith, Mr Ian Faulkner, Principal, Rev Stephen Tema, Deputy Principal Boarding and Rev Sylvia 'Akau'ola Tongotongo, Superintending Chaplain.

And strength for the journey:

I also like this College. Even if the boys try to give you a hard time sometimes, they are all good boys if you talk to them head to head and some of them have great

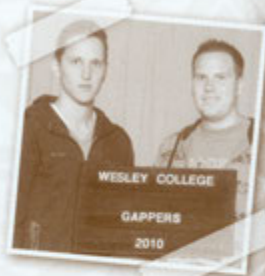
talents. I like to see that sport is so important for you because it's the same for me. I have played soccer for 17 years now and it's given me a chance to every other kind of sport.

Friends of Wesley

The time has come for Doris and I to finally decide to retire from running the tuck shop – with a combined age of 160 years, we feel it is time to go.

A little history about the "Friends of Wesley" – at a request from John McDougall – the Principal at the time – an invitation was sent to parents, caregivers and friends to attend a meeting at which the Friends of Wesley College Association was formed. This was in February 1977 and the first President was Ted Shaw, who served until 1983. Owen Reeve was then elected (1984-88). David Pilkington (1989-92) and Owen again, 1983. The Friends, as such, was disbanded in 1999 through lack of parent support, but Doris and I, with the help of our daughter Anne, carried on in order to operate the cheque account for the tuck shop.

When first formed at AGMs, we always held a panel discussion, in which the Principal, DP, Senior Master, Chaplain and the Matron gave a short description of their role and then invited questions.

During the early days, money was raised by running stalls etc. on Old Students' Days and at one stage we ran a big gala day. We also ran book displays and held games evenings and in the summer we organised family BBQs.

Up until the time the Friends were disbanded, approximately \$55,000 was distributed, and since then, about \$51,000 – a total of \$106,000. This may be broken down as following:

- Grounds, (including BBQ area, site maps, cricket nets etc).....\$3,300.00
- Paintings for Harding Hall.....\$750.00
- Classroom equipment\$14,500.00
- Sports equipment (including clothing)..\$16,500.00
- Musical instruments\$2200.00
- Gym equipment (rec centre).....\$7700.00
- Sound system (hall)\$450.00
- Cultural trips etc.\$5550.00
- Presentations.....\$1400.00
- Library.....\$13,700.00
- Chapel sound system\$4000.00
- Whare Wananga\$5000.00
- Sporting sponsorship for travel (also students to England and sports reps).....\$21,500.00
- Girls' hostel (including their magazine)...\$4,500.00
- Boys' hostel (including day centre).....\$4700.00
- AFS blazers.....\$2350.00

Doris and I are very sad at the thought of not having contact with the students during the week, but wherever possible, we will attend chapel, which we have been doing for the past 55 years.

We have really enjoyed our involvement with the students over so many years and it always makes our day when an old student comes up to us anywhere in New Zealand, Samoa, Fiji, Australia and other places and gives Doris a big hug, and shakes my hand, and in the case of a girl – I may even get a hug also!

So students, finally, be polite, say please, or you won't get served and a thank you is always appreciated.

To all students – set your targets, do your best and may you all achieve your ambitions.

May the joy of Christmas be with you all and may you have a peaceful blessed holiday.

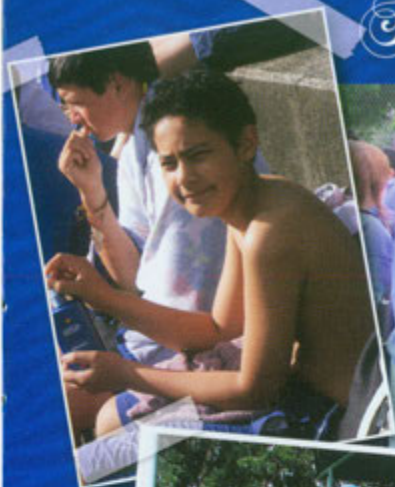
