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Principal's Address

PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS AT PRIZEGIVING

Mrs Easther, Chair of the Board of Trustees, members of the Wesley College Board of Trustees and the Wesley College Trust Board, honoured guests, fellow staff and pupils of Wesley College; it is my privilege to speak as Principal at this the 167th anniversary of the foundation of the school that we now know as Wesley College, Paerata.

This year I wish to speak about two matters. The first is to highlight the changes that are happening with the award of the National Certificate of Educational Attainment [NCEA] and the second is to comment on the reflection of the Special Character that I see being increasingly adopted by senior students and in particular those who take on the role of prefect.

This year there have been changes to the literacy and numeracy requirements for the award of NCEA Level 1. We have had a transition year to adapt. From next year students may follow two pathways to achieve literacy and numeracy. One pathway is through prescibed English and Mathematics unit standards and the other pathway through prescribed achievement standards in a range of subjects.

Our experience this year is that Wesley College students have responded differently to these different pathways. In meeting the literacy requirements students have appreciated and responded to the change allowing them to gain the required credits in a range of subjects. There has been a different response to gaining standards in numeracy. All of this terminology may be a new and confusing language. Our responsibility is to ensure that next year's Year 11 students are clear about the pathway each one is following and also to make it clear to each student's parents which pathway is being followed so that there are no surprises.

A second NCEA development is that NCEA Level 2 is now being regarded as a benchmark for all those leaving school. Our guest, Dr Hutchinson, the Member of Parliament for Hunua, will smile when I say that the current government, of which he is a part, has set this as a priority. In 2010 sixty six percent of Wesley College school leavers achieved NCEA Level 2. This was slightly higher than the New Zealand average of sixty five percent. Our mission is to maintain and build on this level of achievement.

Creating opportunities for students to achieve at this level is not straight-forward. I commend teaching staff who devise the programmes and the classroom climate that allows students to achieve and, as importantly parents, hostel and support staff who create the conditions whereby students come to school each day from home or hostel with a positive attitude, willing to participate and learn.

A further change to the NCEA is the introduction this year of course endorsements. Starting this year a student who gains 14 credits at merit or excellence in one subject will receive a course endorsement for that subject. As I glance through my record of student achievement there are a number who will achieve course endorsements and I look forward to celebrating the achievement of those who make the grade. There is now an attainable additional qualification that many students will be able to aim for in Years 11, 12 and 13.

My second focus this afternoon is on what I see as a growing endorsement by senior students of the role that they play in creating a positive school environment. School environments maintained by students are much more lasting and effective than those created by adults!

Principal's Address

The student leaders this year have been exemplary in the way in which they have modelled the positive relationships that are the imperative of the Wesley College Special Character. Each one has made it her or his mission to live out positive relationships. My observation is clear. It is significant that this way of living has not diminished the respect that the leaders have received from their peers and those who are younger. Example, commitment, service and humility will always win out over fear, dominance, control and self-importance.

I commend Senior Prefect William Poese, Head Girl Stacee Cope and Head Boy Epalahame Faiva for their leadership of the team of prefects. I believe that they have created a legacy that will be noted in our community for the coming years as those who follow on model their leadership and behaviour on this year's group.

This week our Chapel theme has been 'moving on'. I recall the morning Chapel message that we shared yesterday as we drew this week to a close. The words from the book of Joshua, chapter 24 beginning at verse 15 were very apt. Listen again to these words: "But if serving the Lord seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your forefathers served beyond the river, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living. But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."

This is the challenge to all of us today and tomorrow and from now on – and particularly to each leaver who begin today to navigate uncharted strange waters. We may not have lived beyond the river named in scripture or know the gods of the Amorites. In our society these things have their equivalents. As emphasised by the Chairperson of the Trust Board, Rev Diana Tana, at last night's Leaver's Chapel, you know who you are and who you represent.

As your future unfolds you will experience new and exciting places. New and exciting opportunities. You will find that you are challenged. The challenges will be to your faith and in the end you will be held accountable for how you choose to live. Each of you will have choices to make. Wesley College trusts that your choices will be positive and life affirming for yourselves and your families and for your children who are yet to be born. Each of you will have the opportunity to put your mark on the world. Grasp every opportunity and make it your own. The words of the prophet Joshua are as real today as they were long ago. Choose this day - and every day - who you will serve.

In conclusion and to reinforce my charge I ask each of you as I ask myself the question once asked by the prophet Micah: "And what does the lord require of me?" And together may we answer in the manner that has become our custom: to act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with my God. God help me to:

do all the good I can, by all the means I can, in all the ways I can, in all the places I can, at all the times I can, to all the people I can, as long as I ever can. Amen!

We acknowledge with thanks all who have contributed to the work of the Chaplaincy Team in 2011. Your many hands make light work and our hearts together make our community strong in faith and in love.



1986 Wesley College 1st XV Reunion

It is hard to believe that 25 years have passed when the 1986 1XV made history in so many ways.

On July 9th, 1986 a group of young lads from Paerata who were full of bravado and nothing much else took on one of the powerhouses of Auckland schools rugby in the form of Mt Albert Grammar School and to play them on Eden Park for the prestigious Moascar Cup. The game was curtain raiser to Auckland v Thames Valley Ranfurly Shield challenge. The 1XV fixture was a game that many thought Wesley could not win but in true school boy hero fashion Wesley did not keep to the script.

The game was a tight affair yet MAGS always seemed to be in control. However they did not expect the "never say die" attitude of the Wesley team. With two minutes left on the clock and MAGS leading 10-6 the Wesley forwards secure possession 25 metres out from a lineout, the backs react quickly and shift the ball wide, Russell Hana joins the end of the line from fullback and receives the ball at pace, he has enough speed to slip past the MAGS defence and score in the corner: its 10 all and a draw still does not mean you win the Cup. Up steps a calm and composed Grant Te Whare, from out wide and in a tricky wind he coolly slots the conversion to see Wesley sneak ahead 12-10. A tense one minute of extra time remains but when the referee blows fulltime the Wesley supporters invade Eden Park and alongside the players perform a mass haka in celebration.

1986 was a ground breaking year with not only winning the Moascar Cup but we secured our first ever victory over Te Aute College 10-3 and winning the Scarlett Trophy, victory against the Waikato 1xv champions Church College of NZ 19-12 at CCNZ, winning the Counties 1xv and 7s titles, Runners up in the Waikato Schools 7s final and NZ Condor 7s final.

Now our feats won't be remembered as fondly as the other five Wesley 1xv's who went on to become NZ Top 4 champions or the six Wesley sides that won the NZ Condor 7s trophy but we are only one of three Wesley teams to have ever won the Moascar Cup and to date the very last side to do

We were very lucky that out 1xv coach was also the NZ Schools coach. The success of this side was due to the expertise that Chris Grinter brought as a coach and the self belief he instilled in us as players. The success of future Wesley teams was built on the foundation of this team.

This team did not produce any international super stars like Jonah Lomu, Waisake Sotutu or Sitivini Sivivatu but it did for one year get everyone in the community excited that Wesley College could front up and compete at the highest level. Our bodies may be well out of shape now and ability to last 80 minutes has long gone but in our prime we were a very formidable team.


GUIDANCE COUNSELLOR - MICHELLE HAARE

Music

When I visited Wesley College for my interview for HOD Music and subsequent visits I felt a real sense of accomplishment at being appointed here. After having worked for a spell as Foundation Cathedral Director of Music and Organist at Taranaki Cathedral, New Plymouth, I realised how much I missed the daily interaction of enthusiastic young music students. Here at Wesley I could combine my love of musically educating adolescents, combined with organ playing, and my passion for church music and worship. At the age of 50, I had met my dream career!

So, for me, 2011 has been about the challenge of reforming the music department. Student numbers were concerning; I started with one student in Year 11 and ended up with five. I saw the huge potential of the Year 12 students with their love for band playing. I knew that with time (and coercing) I could broaden their musical horizons and allow them to experience more genres in music than they had previously known.

One of the first steps was to appoint several new itinerant teachers as quality instrumental teaching is at the heart of the secondary school music programme. Garrick Lynch was my first appointment as guitar teacher and made an instant impression on the students. Robert Howell bought his skills as a voice and piano teacher and has made an impression on teaching the students about correct vocal art. Ben Tapueluelu achieved good results with a small nucleus of brass players.

In the curriculum, most students achieved success amongst the research, performing and composition standards. In Term Four, I had a notable student from Auckland Teacher's College in Anne-Mare Lalakai who proved to be an excellent teacher. She assisted the students greatly with their compositional studies.

With some adjustments to its format and repertoire, 'Choral 2011' was a real success. Aspiring student choral conductors received guidance and experience and the senior students really 'stood up' to their leadership tasks. The test piece Lead me Lord became an established favourite at Chapel!

After many, many, years of water and rodent damage the Chapel Organ received a very necessary overhaul from the South Island Organ Company of Timaru and the improvement has been dramatic. The organ can now accompany singing so much better and my student organists

can now play organ repertoire and accompany hymns on it. My thanks to Principal Faulkner and the Trust Board for their support over the organ. I provide music for Sunday Chapel on two occasions per month and have thoroughly enjoyed working with Rev. Sylvia and Rev. Tasi.

Throughout the year music students went on trips to the Auckland Philharmonic Orchestra, performed in events at Pitt Street Methodist Church and Mt. Eden Methodist Church Centre. We also visited the music departments at Auckland University and MAINZ. At all times the music students represented Wesley College with pride and skill.

I am very excited about next year, especially with having had 'my year of initiation' behind me and having appointed new drum, brass and guitar teachers. From 2012, all Year 11-13 students will have to learn two instruments, a jazz ensemble will be added to the performance options, the Brass Band will grow numerically and all students will receive keyboard instruction. My vision is to have the Music Department of Wesley College stand proudly with that of any other mediumsized Auckland secondary school. Performance opportunities and reciprocal visits are in the planning. The Chapel Organ will receive further refurbishment and as a consequence I hope to have concerts on campus featuring Wesley students and others.

To all those Year 13 muso's leaving, I wish you well for the future. Music is a wonderfully creative pass-time and in this current world also a bourgeoning career option.


Library
